COOKING SCHOOL INTEREST GROWS

flour. Put batter into an un-oiled angel-food pan.

Place the cake in the Hotpoint Electric Range oven cold. Set temperature control for 350 degrees. Top unit off. Lower unit on High for 35 minutes. Then finish on stored heat. Bake for 60 minutes altogether.

GOLD CAKE with double cooked White Mountain icing.

GINGERBREAD—Use 1 1/2 cup of butter, 1 cup of sugar, 1 well-beaten egg and 2 1/2 cups of molasses. Beat thoroughly. To 1 cup of sour milk, add 1 teaspoon soda, stir in the soda thoroughly and then, add this alternately with 2 cups of flour to the first mixture. With the flour sift 2 teaspoons of ginger, 1 teaspoon of cinnamon, teaspoon of salt and 1 teaspoon of Royal Baking Powder. Beat thoroughly and pour into a well oiled and floured baking pan.

Pre-Heat Hotpoint Electric Range Oven to 400 degrees. Top off. Lower on full, bake for 40 minutes.

LEMON SAUCE FOR GINGERBREAD—Use 1 cup of sugar, 2 tablespoons of cornstarch, pinch salt, and 1 cup hot water, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1 teaspoon lemon rind and 6 marshmallows. To MAKE—Mix together the sugar and the cornstarch add the salt and then the hot water. Place in double boiler and cook until clear. Then remove from range and add 2 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 teaspoon lemon rind and the 6 marshmallows cut fine. After the marshmallows are added, beat with egg beater until mixture is smooth.

HOTPOINT APPLE SNOWBALLS—Carefully core and pare 6 medium size tart apples. Into the Hotpoint Cooker place enough boiling water to come to the top of the rack and on the rack place the apples. Replace cover of the cooker and turn unit to High for 15 minutes and then reduce to Low for 15 minutes. Remove apples to a platter. Then make a frosting of 2 cups of sugar and 1 cup of boiling water. Place pan on the speed unit of the Hotpoint Electric Range and cook until it spins a thread. Pour this over the beaten whites of two eggs, and when of the proper consistency for spreading, cover the apples and then roll in shredded coconut. Top with red currant jelly.

BARN DANCE TO BE GIVEN BY LEGION

Proceeds to Be Given to Equip Drum Corps and Pay Off Debt.

STATE PRIZE WON

Roseburg People Should Be Proud of Showing Made by Umpqua Post's Drum Corps.

A special meeting of Umpqua Post of the American Legion was held last night to plan for the second annual barn dance, which will be staged at the Armory on Friday, June 27. The barn dance given by the Legion last year was one of the snappiest and best entertainments of the entire season, and people of Roseburg have been looking forward to the one which the Legion has been planning for this year.

The proceeds are to go to Umpqua post's drum corps, which was successful at the recent state convention in taking first prize, and winning the cup for state competition. It will be necessary for the corps to hold the cup for three years in order to retain it permanently and every effort will be put forth to go back stronger than ever next year.

"Roseburg has a right to be very proud of this drum corps," Dr. E. B. Stewart, commander of the Umpqua Post said today. "The boys went up against a stiff handicap and won because they were the best."

"Few people realize what the Roseburg boys had to overcome in this competition. La Grande was there with a corps made up of 30 members. They were uniformed in snappy blue outfits cut on a military style. These uniforms cost more than \$1,000 and were bought by the citizens of La Grande, who sent the drum corps to Portland as an advertising feature. Then came Eugene with brilliant colored military uniforms, which cost a large sum, led by a drum major, and presenting a flashing appearance."

"Roseburg came next—13 men against 30 in each of the others. Their uniforms prepared in two days by women of Roseburg were blue Tams and blouses, with white duck trousers. Because of the rules of the parade that all marchers must be in uniform, we couldn't even carry our colors as we didn't have the uniforms for our men. We had to take out a drummer to lead the bunch, but somehow our Blue Devil outfit seemed to strike the crowd as a relief from the military display and they went wild over the Roseburg boys."

"You can talk all you please about advertising, but the Umpqua post's drum corps gave Roseburg and the Umpqua Valley more advertising than any other medium, and people are not going to forget the way the Roseburg boys beat music out of their drums, and blared forth upon their bugles during the four days of the festival."

"Then at night we competed for the state prize. La Grande went first, with their beautiful uniforms, marching around the field and coming in front of the judges' stand in the face of a huge flood light. It was a beautiful spectacle, and the crowds cheered loudly."

"Eugene followed, and flashed around the field in a blaze of color. Roseburg came on with their thirteen men, and somehow the excellent playing seemed to make a big hit with the crowd, and the roar of the drums was drowned out in the storm of applause which went up. As the marchers came down upon the judging stand, the drummers were almost unable to hear their own instruments, so loud was the reception given our musicians. Their cadence was perfect, and the drums and bugles were in perfect union. Even in their trick breaks and pauses they performed perfectly. No drummer missed a stroke. Every bugler was blowing perfect tones, and it was an exhibition that will long be remembered."

"On the following day Roseburg received another honor, when our drum corps was placed at the head of the procession for National Commander Quinn, being the only one in the parade."

The La Grande and Eugene drum corps had the support of the citizens and residents of their respective cities, but Roseburg's thirteen men went without financial help of any kind. The legion has purchased the drums and equipment and uniforms and the post went into debt more than \$150 to provide uniforms, give transportation to the corps. Roseburg people have been asked for nothing and have given nothing to this cause, which will advertise Roseburg more than almost anything else in the future.

The Legion is now preparing to stage a barn dance, which will be an entertainment well worth the small admission price which will be charged. This will be an opportunity for those who appreciate what the post is doing, and to show their appreciation by their attendance. All parties are to go to the corps to pay for new equipment which is to be ordered.

It is hoped to have an organization of 20 men by the time the next legion convention meets in Prineville.
