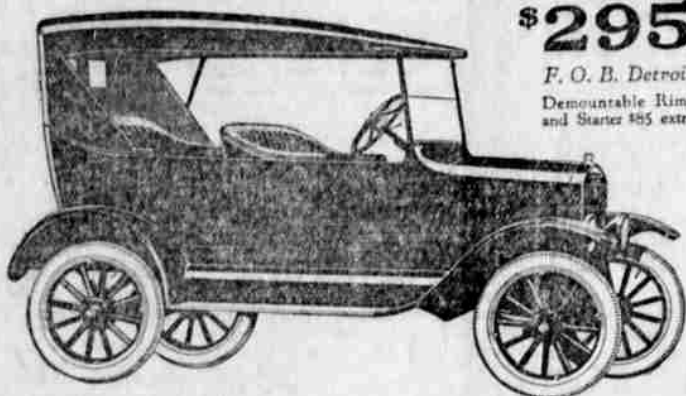


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MOVIE SHOOTING IS BEING HEARD TODAY

LOS ANGELES, June 18.—Trial of Horace A. Greer, former chauffeur for Mabel Normand, film actress, was resumed here today with minor testimony to the forefront. Greer is accused of shooting Courtland S. Dines, oil man of Denver, at a party in Dines' apartments last New Year's night.

The defense has declared it will put Greer on the stand to tell "what actually happened." If the defendant testifies, it is understood, he will do so late today.

Inasmuch as Dines, who was hit by the three bullets fired during the party, found it difficult to remember anything about the affair when he testified several months ago at Greer's preliminary hearing, even admitting that he could not remember who shot him, attorneys and spectators alike were eager to learn how much Greer would be able to remember today.

At yesterday's session, neither Mabel Normand nor Edna Purviance, the two motion picture actresses who were with Dines at the party, were in the court room; nor was Dines himself present. A policeman who testified that Greer surrendered voluntarily after the shooting, was the chief witness.

DOUGLAS COUNTY GETS MOST SETTLERS

Word comes from Mr. W. G. Ide, Manager of the Agricultural Department of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce, that Douglas County tops the list of all the counties of the state in the matter of new settlers secured thus far this year. The records of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce show that Douglas County has secured twenty-four new settlers since January 1st, and through correspondence on file at the local chamber office it is apparent that within a short time this number will be doubled. For instance, yesterday word was received that three families from Brooklyn, N. Y., were getting ready to ship their household effects by boat from New York to Portland, and thence by rail or truck to Roseburg, each family wishing to purchase a small place in the country where they could do diversified farming. There are many others who are about to decide upon their future Oregon home, and seem to think that Douglas County presents the best opportunities for them. A consistent campaign of publicity and letter writing by the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce has been worked thus far this year and with new literature that is now being planned it is expected that better results will be obtained through the Chamber's work.

PLAINTIFFS WIN SUIT.

The suit of Ed Walton and Ed. Elliott against August Heck, local baker, to collect \$18 alleged to be due for work in constructing a strawberry carnival float, resulted in a verdict for the plaintiffs in the sum of \$15. The jury further decided that the respective sides should each pay their costs. It is understood that a new trial will be asked on the grounds that the jury had no right to specify regarding the costs.

Meeting Postponed.

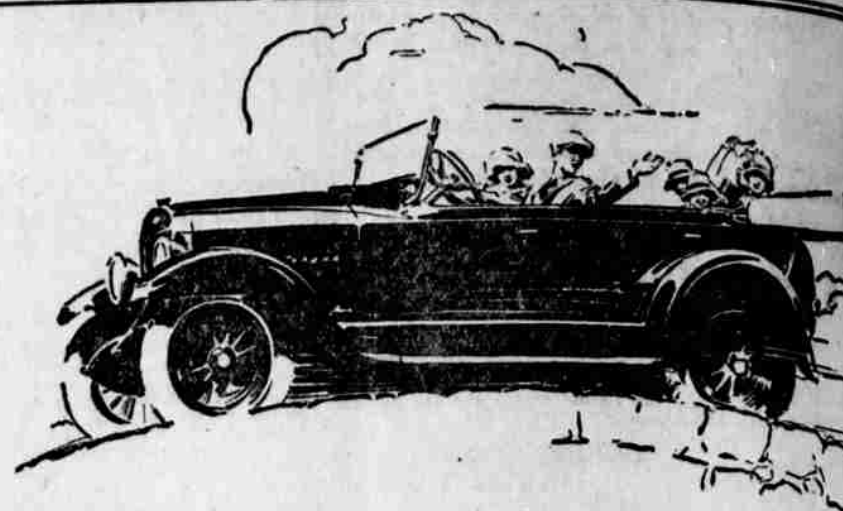

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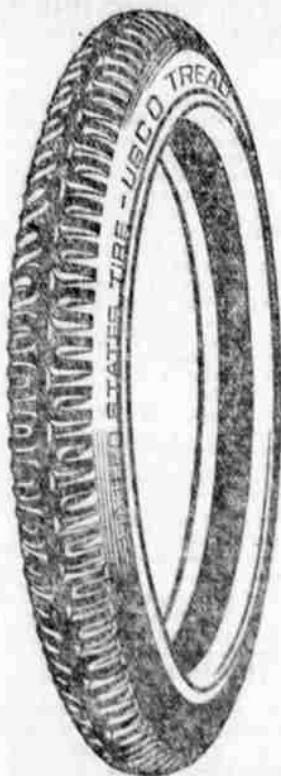
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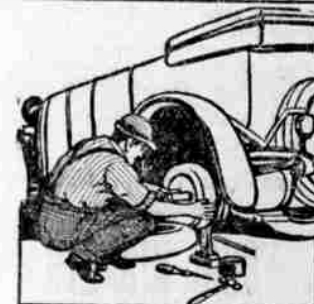
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
