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NO PLATFORM IS YET AGREED UPON

Farmer-Labor Group in St. Paul Conventin Reaches Stage for Ticket.

PARTY IS ORGANIZED

Communists Give Up Plan for Launching of Party, Leaving Plan of Mahoney Only One in Field.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

ST. PAUL, June 19.—Adoption of a platform and nomination of a provisional national ticket remained before the new farmer-labor party convention, when it convened today. This stage was reached in a session which lasted until last midnight.

Formation of the party went through practically without debate, when the convention learned that the communists had given up their plan for immediate launching of a national organization. This left the plan favored by William Mahoney, St. Paul, Union laborite, the only one in the field.

It was modified however, by the inclusion of a provision that the national committee of the new party should include two members from each national political group affiliated with the organization. This opened the gateway for representation as such, of the workers' party and the federated farmer-labor party organization, headed by William Z. Foster and C. E. Ruthenberg, who openly told the convention they were communists.

Whatever ticket is nominated by the convention will be provisional, the national committee which the convention agreed to organize having been empowered to negotiate with other farmer-labor organizations in an effort to agree upon candidates. This left the way open for an endorsement of Senator Robert M. La Follette if he decided after the June 24 conference at Cleveland, to run as an independent candidate.

The senator blocked all thought of direct endorsement by this convention last night, when he sent word through John F. Sinclair of Minneapolis, that he would not consider any action in his behalf by the new party.

The new party is to start out on a provisional basis with state and national conventions set for some time after the November election. The 1924 convention is to be devoted to organization work in the states under the general plan of enrolling membership in the farmer-labor co-operative organizations and district political units used in Minnesota. The organization committee declared its creation should be free from any alliance with or subject to the control of any organization controlled by a foreign country.

It was equally emphatic in declaring the party apart from any organization serving the interests of those who profit from the private ownership of the great monopolies.

Both the republican and democratic parties were placed in this class. Economic, industrial and occupational groups were declared the proper foundation units upon which the structure might be built.

Foster told the convention that he and his followers had given up their idea of organization in order to promote harmony and prevent a split in the convention. The abandoned plan would have created an independent organization, functioning on its own behalf and accepting affiliations from other bodies only when they conformed to its tenet.

David A. Gorman, delegate from the Central labor council of Los Angeles, and chairman of the nomination committee presented the following one-sentence report from that committee:

"The committee on nominations recommends to the convention that it shall proceed with nominations for President and Vice-president of the United States in accordance with the provision of the organization report which was unanimously adopted."

W. D. Taylor of Nebraska, offered a minority report as follows:

"We favor Robert M. La Follette for president if he should become a candidate. "Please note," he said, "that this is based upon a condition and a hope on my part that the Cleveland conference will result in some action that will give the basis for a farm party that will truly represent farmers and laborers."

He accented the word "farmers."

BREAD DAY AT COOKING SCHOOL

ply Meat Market, will conduct a meat cutting demonstration, starting at 2 o'clock. Mr. Kimball will cut up a side of beef, and the demonstration is expected to be especially interesting as few housewives know how to order or buy the right cuts of meat.

At the closing session of the school Miss Dangler will cook a well balanced fish dinner, including dessert. The dinner will be a revelation to many who wish to vary their menus, and will include a new way of baking fish.

Today's menu follows: MILK BREAD—Use 1 cup of scalded milk, 1 cup of boiling water, 2 ta-

blespoons of sugar, 2 tablespoons of shortening (1 tablespoon of butter and 1 tablespoon of white shortening), 2½ teaspoons of salt, 1 Fleischman's Yeast cake and 6 cups of bread flour. TO MAKE—Place 1 cup of milk in double boiler and scald, bring 1 cup of water to the boiling point. When the milk is scalded, add the sugar and the salt and the shortening and then pour the boiling water into this. Set the hot mixture into a pan of cold water to cool. Now dissolve 1 yeast cake in 1½ cup of lukewarm water and when the milk and water solution is cooled to lukewarm, add the yeast cake. Sift 6 cups of flour into your large bread bowl and when the liquid mixture is ready to use, pour into the flour and mix thoroughly and then turn out onto bread board and knead for at least 20 minutes. Then set to ferment till double in bulk and then knead again and place in bread pans for second fermentation and when again double in bulk, bake for 60 minutes. Preheat Hotpoint Range Oven to 400. Turn top off when bread is placed in oven. Turn lower unit to Medium and leave for 30 minutes and then turn all off, and bake for 30 minutes on stored heat.

NUT BREAD—Use 2 eggs, 2 cups of sweet milk, 2 cups of graham flour and 2 cups of white flour (sifted), 3 rounding teaspoons of Royal Baking Powder, 1 cup of sugar, 1 cup of walnuts chopped fine and 1 cup of dates chopped fine. TO MAKE—Beat the eggs till light colored. Add the milk; then sift the flour and to it add the Royal Baking Powder. Then to this add the graham flour (sifted), and then add both mixtures to the first mixture and beat thoroughly, and then add the walnuts to which you have added a teaspoon of salt and then add the chopped dates. Let stand for 25 minutes.

Pre-heat Hotpoint Range Oven to 350 degrees. Turn top unit off and lower unit to medium. Bake 30 minutes at 350 and then 30 minutes at 300 degrees. Or set the temperature control for 350. Bake 60 minutes.

FRUIT ROLLS—Use 2 cups of flour (after sifting), 4 teaspoons of Royal Baking Powder, 3 tablespoons of butter, 2½ cup of sweet milk, 1½ cup of finely chopped raisins; 2 tablespoons of finely chopped citron. TO MAKE—Mix and sift thoroughly the dry ingredients, cut in the shortening and then add the milk, slowly mixing to a soft dough. Roll to a rectangular sheet and have about ¼ of an inch in thickness. Brush over with melted butter and then spread with the fruit. Now sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon, which you have mixed and sifted together. Roll up like a jelly roll, cut off in pieces about ¾ of an inch in thickness. Place in well-oiled baking pan, cut side down, and

Pre-heat Hotpoint Electric Oven to 450 degrees. Turn top off and set the temperature control for 400 degrees. Bake for 15 minutes.

OVEN DINNER—Use 6 pound standing prime rib roast, 8 carrots, 6 medium-sized potatoes, 6 medium-sized white onions. TO PREPARE—Fare the potatoes and scrape the carrots, and also peel the onions. Wash thoroughly and then place in the cooking containers (tightly covered utensils for oven cooking, preferred). Over each vegetable pour 1 cup of boiling water, and season with salt and pepper and butter.

Pre-heat Hotpoint Range Oven to 500 degrees and sear meat for about 5 minutes with both units on high heat. Then turn top unit off, soon as the meat is thoroughly seared and leave lower unit on full heat for 45 minutes. Place the vegetables into the oven as soon as the top unit is turned off. At the end of 45 minutes, turn off all heat, or set the temperature control for 350 degrees. If meat is desired rare, bake for 15 minutes per pound. If medium, 18 minutes per pound, and if well done, from 20 to 22 minutes per pound. This dinner cooked on basis of 18 minutes per pound, resulting that food is in oven for 6 a pound roast for 1 hour and 45 minutes. Cooking for 1 hour on stored heat.

WOBBLES ARRESTED FOR DISEASE SPREAD

SAN FRANCISCO, June 19.—A roundup of members of the Industrial Workers of the World in Washington, Oregon, California, Nevada and Arizona is to be conducted by the United States department of justice, because of the alleged activity of the organization in these states in spreading the foot and mouth disease in California and illegally aiding in the general boycott of California goods, it was announced today by Grove L. Fink, Assistant United States District Attorney.

The campaign was directed from the I. W. W. Headquarters in Chicago, Fink said. The defendants will be prosecuted under a section of the Sherman anti-trust act, which penalizes any illegal act that will result in any way in blocking interstate trade.

The names of the men arrested in San Luis Obispo, California, and another in Sacramento, it was announced by Fink. Infected dogs were used to spread the infection over a large area, Fink said.

The names of the men arrested are being kept secret. Wholesale arrests are expected, according to Fink.

CANADIAN POSTAL SERVICE DISRUPTED

OTTAWA, Ont., June 19.—Headquarters of the federation of postal employees was given definite word that the deferred strike of postal employees into effect at 5 p. m. today.

Postal service in various parts of the dominion was reported disrupted early today as the result of a partial miscarriage of orders issued last night by executives of the Federation of Postal employees deferring for 24 hours a strike which was to have been effective at 5 p. m. today. In many postal stations in Montreal, Windsor, Sandwich and other small towns, workers had walked out before instructions deferring the strike had been received. Later many workers returned to their jobs but a considerable number were said to have stayed out with the result that the service was hampered.

DETROIT, June 19.—Every train entering the border cities of Windsor, Sandwich and Walkerville, Ontario, last night and today, carried armed guards as a precaution against possible demonstrations of striking members of the postal employees union of Canada, who walked out last night.

MONTREAL, June 19.—The order supposedly sent by officials of the Canadian Federation of Postal Employees deferring yesterday's strike edit for 24 hours today was branded as false in a telegram to local postal employees. As a result of the message 1300 Montreal postal workers left their jobs today.
