HEARST AND SMITH MAY MAKE A PACT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

NEW YORK, June 19.—Three New York newspapers, the Times, the Herald-Tribune and the World, today declare that the peace pact is about to be made between Governor Smith and William Randolph Hearst, who by the publisher will not oppose his political enemy for the presidential nomination.

Mr. Hearst's newspaper, the American, makes no mention of the subject. The other papers say that Mayor Hylan is acting in the role of mediator between the governor and the publisher.

George E. Brennan, Illinois democratic leader, is said to favor heartily a Smith-Hearst armistice. Brennan is a Smith supporter.

Senator Copeland, who has considerable mention as a possible strong dark horse and who is known to be on friendly terms with Mr. Hearst,

SET RECORD IN MAKING REPAIRS

An excellent record for speed in making repairs was set by local Pacific Telephone and Telegraph workmen following the fire at the Deer Creek Barn last week, according to John R. Farrington, manager of the local exchange.

At 11:40 p. m. the heat from the burning building melted the cable, and burned down the poles, taking out cables carrying 7 toll circuits and 109 cable circuits, the latter supplying over 400 customers. A message was sent by way of San Francisco, Salt Lake, Denver and Seattle to the Portland office, and at 1:05 p. m. a reply was received announcing that material for repairs would be shipped at once.

At 4:10 a. m. a truck loaded with 14 tons of materials left Portland, reaching Roseburg at 12 noon.

In the meantime splicers, and repairmen were on the job, and new poles and supports were set and everything put in readiness for the arrival of the cable.

Prior to this time, during the course of the fire, local men were busy getting the toll circuits back into shape for emergency operation at 1:55 a. m. Just 2 hours and 5 minutes after the lines went down service between Portland and San Francisco was reestablished.

By 8 p. m. service for local patrons had been resumed, and all damage repaired.

At the time of the fire there were two men available in Roseburg, and by 5 a. m. there were 11 men, some from Eugene, Canby Valley, Bridge and Knappton.

KLAN PERMIT IS REVOKED BY POLICE

OAKLAND, Calif., June 19.—A permit granted the Ku Klux Klan to hold a parade of approximately 10,000 of its members from all parts of the state in Oakland on July 4, was revoked by the police today after they had been informed that a disturbance during the parade was contemplated. The police announced that more than 300 individuals and organizations had protested against the parade.

The Klan is to hold its state convention, beginning July 4. It obtained the permit on the stipulation that no masks were to be worn during the parade.

The protests flooded in, however, and the police were later given "reliable information" that there would be trouble.

POLICE SEARCHING FOR "MASTER MIND"

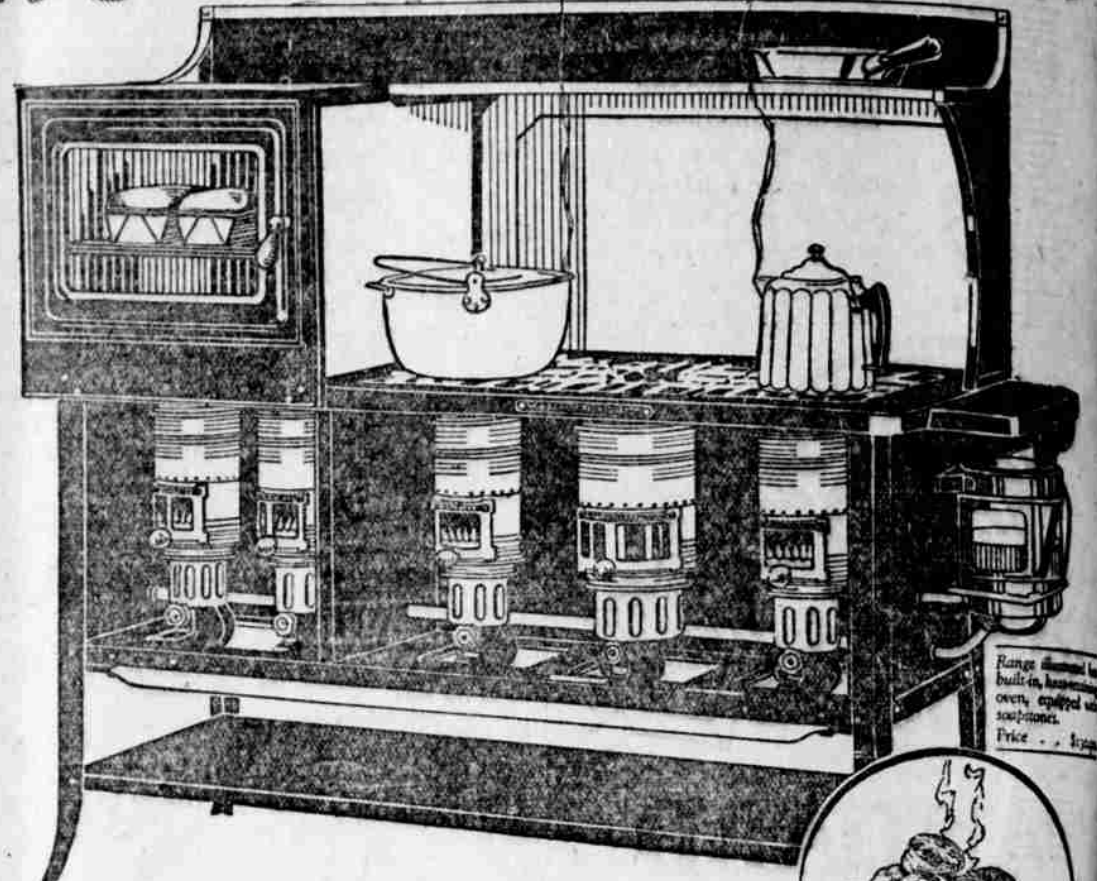
CHICAGO, June 19.—Search for the "master mind" who planned the hold-up of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul mail train here a week ago when eight bandits obtained \$2,000,000 in cash and securities was begun by postal authorities today. Ernest Fontaine, Chicago, Semper Grant, escaped life term from the state penitentiary, and Blackie Wilson, also an escaped Texas convict, are wanted as the remainder of the band, which police believed was implicated in recent mail robberies at Harvey, Illinois, and Indiana Harbor, Ohio.

A federal warrant charging James Murray, politician, with being an accessory to the robbery, was issued last night. His bonds were fixed at \$100,000.

Walter Anderson, of Roseburg, charged with sale of intoxicating liquor, entered a plea of guilty in the justice court at Roseburg late yesterday afternoon and paid a fine of \$200.
