PORTLAND, June 19.—The fifty second annual reunion of the Oregon Pioneer Association opened here today with an elaborate program planned for the pioneers of early days in Oregon.

The convention opened with an address of welcome by Acting Mayor Higelow and the response by J. D. Chitwood, president of the association. A committee on resolutions was appointed to represent at the night session.

The principal address of the morning was delivered by George M. Brown, associate justice of the Oregon supreme court.

The convention will reconvene tonight for a business session, when the presentation of communications will be made, the report of the resolutions committee will be heard and officials of the ensuing year will be elected. A feature number of the evening program will be "Reminiscence of Pioneer Days" by pioneers called from the audience.

ACCUSED MINISTER GRANTED NEW TRIAL

MEXICO, Mo., June 18.—The Rev. A. Q. Burns, minister of this city, who last night was found guilty of assault with intent to kill for the shooting of Howard Conger, traveling salesman of Lincoln, Nebraska, was granted a new trial today. Date of the trial was set for July 11.

Mr. Burns, who was doing graduate work in Chicago, returned to Mexico, when he said he learned that Conger had made improper advances toward his wife.

Conger denied he had ever attempted to force his attentions upon Mrs. Burns.

On the day of the shooting, Conger said, he saw Mrs. Burns on the street, accompanied by her husband, whom he had never met. As he was about to pass the couple, Conger said, Burns began shooting.

No words passed between them. Conger testified he was unarmed.

BANDITS REDUCE RANSOM ON MAN

CANTON, June 18.—Chinese bandits holding E. H. Carne of Australia, one of the four missionaries captured by them late last month, now are asking only \$30,000 ransom for his release. It was learned here today.

News of the reduction in ransom, the original demand having been \$200,000 and a large quantity of arms and ammunition, was brought to Wuchow yesterday by Rex Ray, one of the American missionaries, who escaped from the bandits during a heavy storm. He reached Wuchow yesterday.
