What God Says about—BODILY CONTROL

"I keep under my body and bring it in subjection."

Who owns the house where you live? I mean your body? It's a house, that's what it is—but that is very important. Paul told us who owned his house, and he told the Corinthian believers that their bodies belonged to God. And God wants us to understand that what Paul said on the subject was really His word.

So we are only tenants, we don't own our own bodies. The difference between real Christians and other folks is that the one acknowledges God's ownership and the other doesn't.

If God owns my body it's my business to bring it into subjection to His Spirit. Oftentimes this means treating it rough, for the original word means to bruise, where it says "keep under." God intends that His Spirit shall get the best of the desires of his body in order that the Spirit of Love may control our lives.

There is nothing new about this teaching, for Paul says that the athletes in the Corinthian games hardened their bodies by vigorous treatment.

VETERANARIAN TO ATTEND MEETING

SALEM, June 20.—Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian and several Oregon sheep raisers, will attend a conference at Reno, Nevada, Monday, when prospective modifications of foot and mouth disease restrictions applying to livestock will be discussed.

Oregon sheep men of the Lakeview country are anxious that movements of their sheep through northern California to Nevada be allowed to facilitate shipments to Chicago. This also is said to be desired by Californians. Otherwise it will be necessary for the Lakeview producers to drive their sheep across the desert to Crane and Bend in order to reach railway transportation.

Also the possible elimination for automobile disinfection stations at several state lines will be discussed. These are now maintained as far east as Wyoming, necessitating the disinfecting process at each state line. Those who oppose this regulation as drastic contend that one disinfecting process is enough.

SPEED RECORD BROKEN ON MEDFORD SPEEDWAY

MEDFORD, June 20.—A track record of 78.3 miles per hour was set at the races yesterday afternoon on the Jackson county speedway when Jack Ross of Seattle, made six laps, or 6.75 miles at that average rate of speed. Ross took first place in all three main events, the six, ten and twenty lap races. Never in the history of the speedway has anyone lapped the track as fast as Ross did yesterday. The best previous time for one lap was 12 seconds, made in June 1923 by V. Bassett, riding a motorcycle, from a flying start. Ross' average lap time from a standing start was 51.7 seconds. Nine starters lined up for the six lap event. Clark Walker took second place, and George Grigsby of Silverton, took third place. Time 5 minutes, 10.25 seconds.

It is the present purpose to declare in strong and unqualified terms that the United States must find a way to cooperate with some sort of league or association without repeating the 1920 declaration for complete acceptance of the covenant of Versailles.

With regard to the world court, the plank as it stands, directly accuses the republican party of equivocation and declares it is attempting to lift bodily cardinal democratic policy by advocating membership in the court.

Wayne H. Wheeler asserted in a formal statement that a wet plank would have no "more show than at Cleveland."

"I think the convention will adopt a law enforcement plank," he said, "and defeat any beer and wine candidate for the head or tail of the ticket."

BALTIMORE, Md., June 20.—A copyrighted dispatch from the staff correspondent at New York to the Baltimore SUN today says that Woodrow Wilson's last political will and testament, "a document of party principle and possibility" is to be laid by a group of his followers before the members of the resolutions committee, when the time comes to write the democratic platform.

The "memorandum" as it is called, takes this position on foreign relations:

"Straight out and straight-forward membership of the United States in the league of nations and an abandonment of a 'farfetched' policy of 'unofficial observation'."

"Adherence of this nation to the justice under the auspices of the league and with no nullifying reservations."

"On domestic matters, the former president and his political associates agreed upon these policies:

"A liberal attitude toward prohibition, but with law enforcement whatever the law may be."

"Revision downward of federal taxation as radically and as rapidly as the state of the treasury will permit."

"A careful and scientific revision downward of the tariff to promote foreign trade and to prevent the exploitation of the many for the aggrandizement of the few."

"Relief for the farmer by granting to him additional credit when needed."

"Re-examination of the whole transportation problem by congress looking toward lower rates and with the possible creation of a new department of transportation having representation in the cabinet."

"A direct declaration for religious freedom, the separation of church and state and the condemnation of any sect or order which would openly or covertly impair any religious right."

The document, the correspondent says, was drafted by Mr. Wilson a few months before his death, in collaboration with eight or nine of his closest friends.

John T. Flood, assistant manager of the Association Against the Prohibition Act, claims that a large majority of convention votes will be cast by his organization.

G. C. Carlin, manager of Senator Underwood's campaign, has announced that he and his backers would join with George E. Brennan of Illinois, in forcing the Klan fight to the front. There will be no "pusy-footing" on the question, Carlin said.

MAY BURN BRUSH.
Word was received by the Douglas County Fire Patrol that following the modification of the proclamation of Governor Pierce regarding the burning of slashings, burning permits may be issued until the forests again become dry. The recent rains eliminated much of the fire danger, and Governor Pierce, who issued a proclamation forbidding all burning, modified the order to permit slashings to be disposed of until an emergency again occurred. Under this ruling the fire patrol will issue permits until another restriction is placed. A warning is issued, however, that all slashings burned must be burned only under a permit, and anyone starting a fire without authority will be prosecuted.
