Efforts of the commercial fish commission to have the Smith River Falls dynamited to increase spawning areas is meeting with considerable opposition, and Governor Pierce has informed the Reedsport chamber of commerce that he has requested that a hearing be granted all parties before such action is taken. The governor was requested to ask the fish commission to delay action by the Roseburg chamber of commerce and the Rod and Gun club which desire to see the matter thoroughly investigated before one of the most beautiful scenic spots in the western part of the county is sacrificed to commercialism.

For several years there has been much agitation about the Smith River Falls, some claim being made that they obstructed runs of fish and prevented spawning in the upper reaches of Smith River. Recently the commission decided to blast out the obstruction, and the powder is now in the ground ready to proceed. Yesterday the Reedsport chamber of commerce through Maurice Richards, secretary, wired the Roseburg chamber that the falls will be destroyed unless something is done at once to block the move. Commercial fishing interests are blamed by the Reedsport chamber for the project of blasting out the falls.

It is claimed that the destruction of these falls will in no measure increase the commercial fishing, and will not affect the game fishing up stream. In a letter to Ed Walker, local deputy game warden, A. E. Burghdoff states that from investigations he has made Smith River is not a commercial fishing stream. "For the last two years we have attempted to take eggs at these falls but have failed miserably," Mr. Burghdoff says in his letter. "As a matter of fact no salmon nor steelheads showed up at the falls in either the last two years and less than 200 trout were taken over a period of three months during the last season. The same condition was effective in 1922 and while I do not question that the falls would be a serious obstruction to fish going up the stream, nevertheless except at extremely low stages of water the fish can pass quite readily over the falls. We found it necessary to build a bulkhead on the falls to stop the few trout that did come upstream."

Persons, who have spent much time fishing in that vicinity, report that salmon and commercial fish are scarce in Smith River, and that there are plenty of trout above the falls, and that during the periods when trout run in from the salt water, there is sufficient water over the falls to permit them to pass, and that the only time they are blocked is in the summer, during the extremely low water, but as there are no runs on at that time the falls are no hindrance.

The Smith River falls are very beautiful. They are situated about 25 miles from the mouth of the river, and nearly all visitors in the lower Umpqua district make a trip to see this sight. With the completion of the road down the river, and the construction of the Roseburg highway, the falls will be a wonderful tourist attraction, and there is a strong sentiment that they should not be removed. A ruling of the fish commission that the South Umpqua dam at Roseburg be opened, has been complied with, and a large hole has been blown in the dam to permit fish to get through.

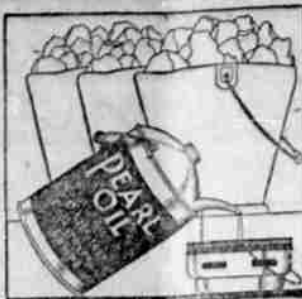

OLD TOMBS OF FOURTH CENTURY SOUGHT IN MOSCOW KIEVIAN.

DORPAT, Estonia, June 20.—Search for the secret library of Ivan IV, known as "The Terrible," has been taken up by the Soviet authorities in Moscow according to word received here by descendants of Doctor Paul Westermann, a clergyman of Dorpat, who originally started the task some 200 years ago. Records kept by Dr. Westermann which are in possession of his relatives, show that the library now being sought consisted chiefly of books in the old Greek and Slavonic languages dating back as far as the fourth century. Many of these had been taken to Moscow by the Greek princess, Sophie Palaeologina at the time she became the bride of Ivan IV.

Even this terrible became obsessed with the idea that efforts were being made by all the world to rob him of his treasure, especially his library, and it was on this account that he concluded to remove the

COLONIAL COTTON EXPECTED TO RELIEVE BRITISH DEFICIT

LONDON, June 20.—In nearly every part of the British empire where cotton is grown conditions were satisfactory last year, according to the annual report of the British Cotton Growing Association.

It is generally admitted, says the report, that 1923 was one of the most unprofitable ever experienced in the history of the cotton milling industry in Great Britain, due to shortage of raw materials. The great bulk of the mills using American cotton worked on short time, and the earning power of the operatives was seriously curtailed. This condition is being overcome by the increased production of the British colonies.

After detailing the progress made in cotton growing in various parts of the empire the report concludes:

"The increased quantities of cotton produced during the year in many parts of the empire is very gratifying especially at a time when the prospects for a greater production in America appear to be getting more remote every year. It cannot be denied that the cotton industry in Great Britain has been passing

TRAINING CAMP TO OPEN

MONTEREY, CAL., June 20.—More than 3000 young men are expected to attend the citizens training camp at Del Monte, near here, starting June 26, according to army officers preparing facilities for the annual period of sport and training for potential soldiers for war time.

Last year 2500 men attended the camp, many of them former service men who saw service over seas. Rigorous drilling, all kinds of out of door sports and other varieties of recreation are on the program. Military discipline with regular routine forms the backbone of the training plan.

Completion and supervision of the camp is under the direction of Major-General Charles G. Morton, commander of the Ninth Corps area, regular army; Brigadier-General Joseph E. Kuhn, area Executive, and Colonel Ernest Smith, General Morton's chief of staff, who will be camp commander.

The camp site is being fashioned after the manner of a war-time cantonment. New roads are being built, drill grounds planted with coarse grain to eliminate dust, water mains extended beyond the system in use last year, and lighting facilities practically doubled. A community house, gift of citizens of the Monterey peninsula is being erected and will be the social center of the camp.
