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DIRECTIONS FOR CANNING GIVEN

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, CORVALLIS, June 20.—Di-
rections for preventing botulism
poisoning in home canned fruit
and vegetables have been given in a
bulletin, 374, issued by the extension
service. The bulletin was prepared
to answer inquiries on safe home
canning. Time tables and simple di-
rections are included. Copies can be
had free on request.

Careful attention in selecting raw
vegetables or fruit is the best safe-
guard. It pays to use only clean,
fresh, sound, fruit and vegetables. If
material shows signs of spoiling the
result is apt to be disappointing. No
amount of cooking will make fruit
with decayed spots as good as fresh.

It is a good plan to cook the fruit
or vegetables before placing it in the
jars. A short pre-cooking shrinks
them so the jar holds more.

No food value is lost, if the liquor
that the fruit or vegetables were
cooked in is added when the jars are
filled. Liquor from vegetables con-
tains salts valuable for upbuilding
the body. Fruit juices are used to
make the syrup. A certain fruit sug-
ar is thus made use of.

If the material is put into the jars
while hot, much time is saved. This
is especially important with thick,
pasty mixtures, that heat through
slowly in the canner. The few jars
that will go into the steam cooker
made it necessary to work rapidly.
It will take longer to heat the jars
up again if the material cools down.

The steam pressure cooker is recom-
mended by the federal department
of agriculture for all vegetables ex-
cept tomatoes. An open vessel with
water boiling gives good results with
fruit. A good thermometer is desir-
able.

Glass jars are sealed as soon as
removed from the cooker. A vacuum
forms as the jar cools, and if the
lids are not tightened before the con-
tents cool, spoilage may result.

Cans and jars are kept under ob-
servation at room temperature for at
least a week to detect spoilage. The
bad jars are discarded as botulism
poisoning comes from food that has
spoiled after canning.

Careful inspection of canned fruit
and vegetables, before used for food,
helps detect spoiled cans or jars. Tin
cans should not be bugged at the ends.
Glass jars should neither show signs
of leaking around the rubber, nor
top bulged. When the can or jar is
opened, the contents should appear
sound and natural in color and tex-
ture, with no off smell.

If the container is tin, notice the
appearance of the inside, says the
bulletin. It should be clean and
bright or well lacquered, not exten-
sively blackened or markedly cor-
roded. Destroy all food showing
signs of spoiling. Take no chances.
Under no circumstances taste any
canned vegetable before boiling. In
case the liquid in the can is not suf-
ficient to cover the product, add
boiling water and boil for 5 minutes.

If the foregoing instructions are
followed, there need be no fear of
botulism or other poisoning from can-
ned food, say authorities.

CONVENTION TO BE AS USUAL

NEW YORK, June 20.—The ten-
tative program of the Democratic
National Convention follows closely
the schedule of procedure which has
prevailed in previous national
sessions of the party. Many leaders be-
lieve the convention will last ten or
eleven days.

The first formal assembly of the 2-
500 delegates and alternates at the
main auditorium, Madison Square
Garden will be at noon on Tuesday,
June 24.

Cordell Hull of Tennessee, chair-
man of the Democratic National Con-
vention committee, will call the con-
vention to order, and a member of
the New York City clergy will pro-
nounce an invocation. Mr. Hull's in-
troduction of the temporary chair-
man, Senator Pat Harrison of Missis-
sippi, will be followed by the Sen-
ator's keynote speech.

Mayor John F. Hylan of New York
will deliver an address formally wel-
coming the convention to this city,
and adjournment will be taken, prob-
ably about 2:30 p. m., until noon
Wednesday.

The report of the committee on
Permanent Organization will start the
second day of the convention, after
which the committee on rules will re-
port. Meanwhile, the committee on
resolutions will commence its work
and start drafting the platform. The
report of the credentials committee
will conclude the regular business of
the Wednesday session.

With the permanent chairman pre-
siding, the convention will open its
third day at noon. Thursday will be
opened with the reports of the com-
mittees.

The platform probably will be pre-
sented to the convention on Friday.
The nomination of candidates for the
presidency, which a score already
are in sight, will begin late Friday or
early Saturday accompanied by the
traditional hand-clapping, singing and
holy demonstrations as each candi-
date's name is put forward.

Thus the convention will adhere to
a prescribed formula for only the
first five days. If nominations are
not made immediately, there will be
continuous day and night sessions,
except on Sundays and continuous

balloting until a nominee for presi-
dent and a running mate for the vice-
presidency shall emerge from the
fray victorious.

The 1920 convention at San Fran-
cisco lasted nine days. Some local
party counselors predict the impend-
ing convulsion, confronted by so many
candidates to choose from, will be
kept busy for 11 days. Should their
prognostications prove correct, the
democratic candidates would be nam-
ed on the fourth of July.

CRIPPLED LINER RACES WITH TIME

ST. JOHNS, N. F., June 20.—
How a liner, crippled and slowly
leaking, raced for time through a
blind fog to the New Foundland
coast, was told, when two battered
steamers found their way into this
port last night after colliding off
Cape Race. The liners were the
Italian steamer Clara Camus, which
crept into port with her forward
peak driven back to the fore-castle
winch by the collision, and the Cana-
dian-Pacific liner Metagama, bear-
ing 700 passengers bound for Mont-
real from Glasgow. The Metaga-
ma, listing heavily, was beached on
a shoal in St. Johns harbor.

Cool action by the Metagama's
officers averted a panic aboard the
craft when the passengers rushed on
deck after the collision had sent the
craft reeling.

Although other ships had appear-
ed to give assistance, the vessel
would not make transfer of
passengers in the dense fog.

The captain beached his ship on
a mud bank. Passengers will be
taken off today or tomorrow.

KOEN IS DENIED CHANGE OF VENUE

COQUILLE, Ore., June 20.—E.
A. Koen was granted the right to
have his libel suit against the Coos
Bay Times tried before some judge
other than J. C. Kendall yesterday
but was denied a change of venue.
The motion for either a change of
judge or of venue was made by W.
T. Stoll and A. K. Peck, attorneys
for Koen. An affidavit alleging pre-
judice on the part of Judge Kendall
against the plaintiff was filed some
time ago.

Judge Kendall commented quite ex-
tensively on the action of the plain-
tiff in charging prejudice. The court
stated that he had never seen Koen,
did not know him, had never talked
to him, would not be able to pick him
out of a "crowd of two." He had
never heard of him prior to the start-
ing of the libel suit.

The surest way of proving that
there was no prejudice in his mind,
the court said, would be to grant the
request for another judge without ask-
ing further argument.

"I know nothing of the merits of
the controversy," the judge said, "and
find myself wondering as to the rea-
son for this belief that I am prej-
udiced against the plaintiff." He ex-
pressed himself as being sorry that
an occasion should have arisen which
should bring forth such allegations
before the case had been even com-
menced.
