TEN INDICTED.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, June 20.—Ten persons were indicted by the federal grand jury today for the sensational hold-up and robbery of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul fast mail train of \$2,075,000 the night of June 12 at Roundout, Illinois.

TOLL INCREASES.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) DICKINSON, N. D., June 20.—The toll of the tornado which struck Dickinson and vicinity Wednesday, was increased to eight today, when reports verified the killing of a family of four twenty miles north of Dickinson.

JAP'S BODIES FOUND.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SAN PEDRO, Calif., June 20.—The bullet torn bodies of two Japanese, believed by police to have been murdered and tossed from a passing car, were found today by Sergeant E. E. Baldwin and Patrolman John Parsons opposite the firing grounds of Fort McArthur, near the Palo Verde hills north of here.

LINER ASHORE.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SAN FRANCISCO, June 20.—The Pacific Mail liner, Columbia, bound from San Francisco to Baltimore and New York with a capacity list of passengers and freight is ashore on Canoe Island, off the coast of Costa Rica, but is in no danger, it was stated in a message received by the company's offices here today. The question of transferring the passengers to other vessels will be decided later in the day the company announced. The sea is said to be calm.

WOMAN HORSEWHIPPED.

ALEXANDRIA, La., June 20.—Charging that she was taken from her home by three women and horse whipped, Mrs. Lillian Bonnette has filed suit for \$75,000 in district court against Mrs. Gertrude Balla, Mrs. Amelia Jordan and Mrs. Tessie Hattchett, whom she named as her alleged assailants.

Mrs. Bonnette is the mother of a boy of seven and a girl nine years old. Officials have not announced the reason for the assault.

PLAYERS SUSPENDED.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, June 20.—Fighting and boisterous conduct will not be tolerated in the playing of an American league game, President Ban Johnson declared today in announcing that the players involved in the riotous Detroit-New York game at Detroit last Friday had been fined as well as suspended. Bob Meusel of the Yankees, who President Johnson says was responsible for the outbreak, was suspended for ten days and fined \$100, while pitcher Bert Cole of the Tigers was suspended for ten days and fined \$50.

Babe Ruth, while escaping suspension, was hit in the pocketbook for \$50. President Johnson said that Ruth's "frenzied effort to participate in the trouble, was reprehensible."

SALEM, June 20.—Fred H. Curry yesterday submitted to the state fair board his resignation as secretary of the board and manager of the state fair. The resignation will be acted upon and his successor elected. It was said, at a meeting of the board next Wednesday. Curry was elected secretary of the board in 1923 and conducted the state fair of last year.

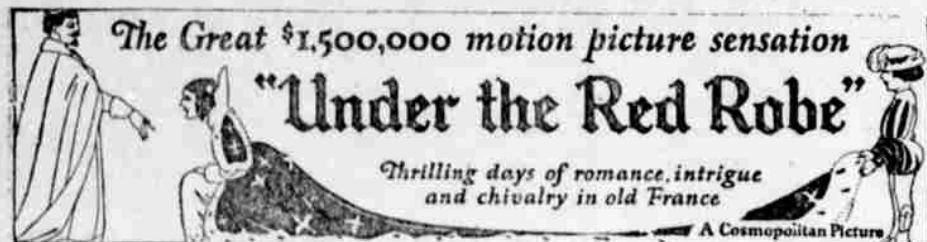
