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FIRE PREVENTION PROGRAM PLANNED

By proclamation of Governor

Pierce, the period of June 30th to July 14th has been designated as

"Stop Forest Fires" weeks throughout the increasing fire menace in heavily timbered districts.

The Oregon State Chamber of Commerce has interested itself in this matter and has written the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce asking for co-operation. Under the plan as outlined each community will start a membership drive for the individual organization being in the largest number of applications for membership will be forwarded to the State Chamber, where membership cards will be issued, together with literature and windshield stickers urging fire prevention.

No fees will be charged. The object of the campaign is to impress upon the individual a sense of his own responsibility in the matter of stopping forest fires and protecting our great timber resources.

It is proposed to organize a central committee in each town or city in the state that has a Chamber of Commerce. Such civic bodies will sponsor the activities and will assume leadership of the central committee. The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce will act as leader in Roseburg and vicinity.
