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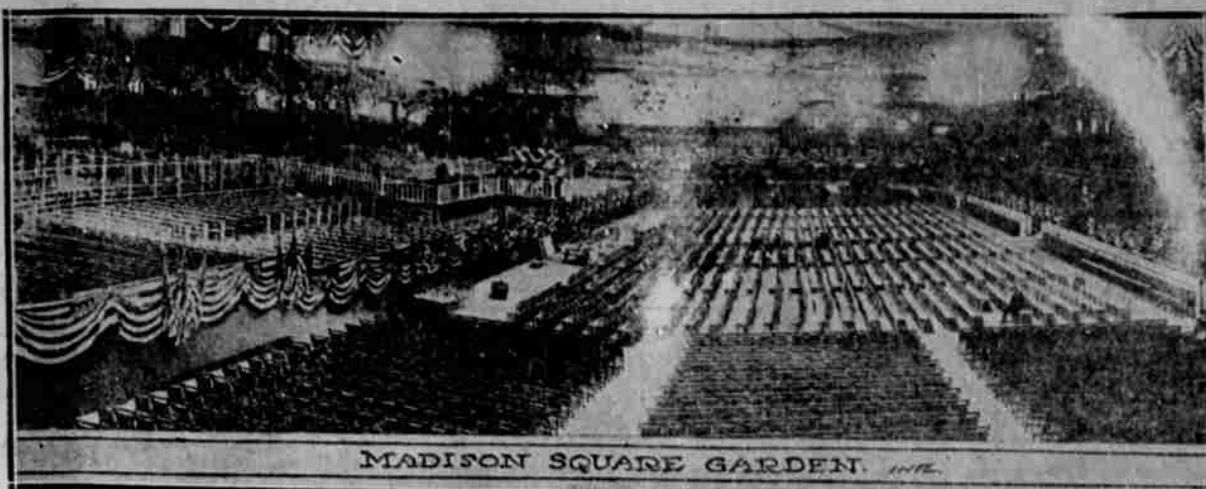
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CONVERT MADISON SQUARE GARDEN INTO SPLENDID CONVENTION HALL

DEMOCRATS HOLD STORMY SESSION

the authority of government." The Bishop concluded his prayer with a repetition of the Lord's prayer, and the convention joined him.

The prayer over, the delegates began talking about again and while there still was some disorder, the chair recognized Mrs. Leroy Springs of South Carolina, to make the report of the credentials committee. The band blared out "Oh, You Beautiful Doll."

T. H. Ball of Houston, Tex., then was recognized to make the report of the committee on organization he presented the name of Senator Walsh of Montana, for permanent chairman and the convention broke into its first applause and cheers of the day. Mr. Walsh sat quietly smiling while the convention gave him a demonstration.

Mr. Ball, asked unanimous approval to the selection of Miss May Kennedy of the Bronx for vice-chairman of the convention. There was no objection and a woman for the first time in party history, took that place.

During the reading of the report, Chairman Hull reached the platform. He looked a little refreshed after his sick spell, but it was evident that he was still suffering from heat and overwork. The report on the committee was adopted without objection.

The Senator who attracted the attention of the country and the world with his work of investigating the Teapot Dome scandal, took the platform, the convention gave three cheers for Walsh.

Mr. Harrison presented Senator Walsh as a "great Democrat and the greatest investigator in the history of this country," while the convention roared "atta boy."

While the delegates took up the state standards and began their procession about the hall, the band took up "Keep the Home Fires Burning." Mr. Walsh took the chair and calmly surveyed the marching throng.

The demonstration wound up with cheers, howls, and rebel yells for "Walsh."

He finally got the hall quiet and went ahead with his prepared address.

Senator Walsh aroused a demonstration when during his arraignment of the administration in connection with the Teapot Dome scandal, he had not challenged the name of a single democratic office holder involved.

While he was speaking somebody sent to the speaker's platform an elaborately prepared little black cat. It contained such inscriptions: "Graft—Thousand Oillands" and "Graft—Thousand Oillands" and "Dohney Falls."

The audience broke into his peroration when he said in conclusion, "The honor of our country, the prosperity of our people demand that we return to the ideals of Woodrow Wilson." The demonstration continued for a moment and then Mr. Walsh silenced it so that he might finish the sentence, "that we resume the place he won for us—the moral leadership of the world."

Demonstrations broke out anew and the delegates formed another marching club.

While the Wilson demonstration was continuing, a white dove which apparently had gotten in through the apertures in the roof flew over the delegates and made three circles over the convention hall before it came to rest on a gallery rail. The dove then, with every eye in the hall following its flight, made another turn and came to rest on one of the flag standards in the balconies. David R. Francis of Missouri, one of the veterans of the party, came up on the platform and chatted with Senator Walsh, while the convention was getting settled again.

In the interval a great many of the old party leaders went up on the platform and did a little hand shaking with convention managers. Finally chairman Walsh called the convention to order again and introduced Police Commissioner Enright, who announced that at the conclusion of the session, buses would be provided for trips to Graystone-on-the-Hudson, the former home of Samuel J. Tilden.

The chair recognized Senator Glass of Virginia. There was a brief demonstration of cheers and hand-clapping while Senator Glass stood smiling. He introduced the formal resolution providing for the organization of the National committee. After the convention adjourned the resolution was adopted.

Then chairman Walsh recognized Lew Ellingham, chairman of the committee on rules and order of business. He presented the committee reports providing for the use of rules of the last convention in-

cluding the much discussed two-thirds rule.

The order of business which the report proposes, is that the nominating speeches for presidential candidates be made before the report of the platform committee. The report was adopted without dissent.

Lincoln Dixon of Indiana, presented a resolution to empower the national committee to fix the time and place of the next convention. It also was a routing resolution. It was adopted.

Then, quite unexpectedly, Chairman Walsh, announced that the next order of business would be the presentation of the candidates for the presidential nomination.

There was interval while the speakers' place was arranged for the speakers. Meanwhile the band played "The Old Gray Mare." She ain't what she used to be! The clerk called the roll of states for the presidential nominations and Forney Johnston took the platform to nominate Senator Oscar Underwood.

The convention displayed no more interest in the first nominating speech than it generally does to any, until Mr. Johnston got along to the point where he began to make references to the Ku Klux Klan issue, then the convention began to sit up and take notice. He drew the first prolonged applause when he referred to the historic action of the party with regard to "the know-nothing" movement of years ago.

When Mr. Johnston brought the convention into a demonstration by the most direct reference to the Klan he had yet made, about half the delegates stood up and cheered and the other half remained silent in their seats. Nearly all of the delegates from Georgia, Missouri, Iowa, Texas, Oklahoma and California remained seated.

That anti-Klan element in the convention openly regarded the demonstration as an anti-Klan demonstration and pointed out the delegations which were not participating.

In concluding Mr. Johnston read the anti-Klan plank he had proposed to the platform committee. When he got to the phrase which specifically named the Ku Klux Klan another demonstration broke out. A parade started and there were contests over whether certain state standards were to go in. There was a scramble around the Missouri standard. A Smith delegate raised the standard and several women rushed to take it away from him it was finally forced back into position. Mrs. Milford Riggs an elderly lady planted herself at the standard, determined to keep it out of the anti-Klan demonstration.

A 200-pound policeman supported her.

In the Colorado delegation there was another scramble approaching the proportions of a fist fight. In the melee in which some clothing was torn and much hair rumpled, the standard was wrecked and the contenders when separated were in possession of the pieces. The band swung into the "Star Spangled Banner," which brought all the scammers to attention.

A good many American flags which had been used as decorations were torn down during the scrambling. There had been about a dozen

lights and near fights and most of the states whose standards had not gone into the anti-Klan demonstration had McAdoo delegates forming little groups of guards around them.

When Mr. Johnston finished his address, there was an organized demonstration for Senator Underwood, then former Governor C. H. Brough of Arkansas, took the platform and nominated Senator Robinson, Democratic leader in the Senate. The Arkansas delegation led in cheering Senator Robinson after the nominating speech was concluded. The band swung into "Old Black Joe" and half the convention joined in the singing. There was no organized demonstration for the Arkansas Senator.

When former Senator Phelan took the platform to make the McAdoo nomination speech, he was greeted by several minutes of cheering.

The California delegation and several others stood on their chairs waving the State flags and shouting. The band played "California, Here I Come!"

Mrs. McAdoo heard Senator Phelan's speech from her box directly opposite the speakers stand.

During the speech the word was passed around that after the convention had concluded its demonstration for Mr. McAdoo the convention probably would adjourn until tomorrow.

As Mr. Phelan drew toward the close of his speech the managers of McAdoo demonstration gave their last orders. The whole front of the hall was blanketed solid by the McAdoo men and women, waiting for the word to cut loose. Throughout the delegates spaces were McAdoo lieutenants, each in charge of a group.

With the concluding words of Mr. Phelan's speech, the McAdoo demonstrators cut loose. Four women trumpeters arose and started things off with a volley of shrill notes then two men in cowboy costumes bearing on their shoulders Miss Josephine Norman of San Francisco, dressed in a costume of red, white and blue. Behind her danced Miss Marjorie O'Day of Los Angeles dressed in a dress of gold. Two men unrolled a banner 20 feet long. The demonstration was noisy and prolonged and it was as apparent that many of the demonstrators were not delegates as it was that many delegates were remaining in their seats and taking no part in the show. The Colorado standard was the center of another row and in a scramble it was torn down again and the inscription was torn up.

A big fellow in a white duck suit held it fast against all comers. Governor Sweet took a hand in the proceedings and tried to take the standard into the procession, but five or six delegates landed on the governor and took it from him.

After the demonstration had been going on for less than a half hour, it was apparent that the band was making most of the noise and that the great majority of the delegates were back in their places watching the professional demonstrators doing their stuff up and down the aisles.

The Smith people got busy while the McAdoo demonstration was on and a large number of their rosters began. The chant: "Smith, Smith, Smith." A McAdoo cheer leader hearing the noise of course thought it was "Mac, Mac, MacAdoo" and for two minutes led the cheering for Smith without knowing it.

With the aid of megaphones, the Smith folks turned to "Oh, Oh, Oh!" When the Smith howlers got into the game, the McAdoo folks took on new energies. The result of the contest between the two factions was that the aisles were soon again choked with a mass of milling, swirling, perspiring people, jostling or scrambling along shouting their heads off and having their clothes rumpled.

The four lady trumpeters, took a place in the center aisle and played America, while girls in the red, white and blue waved a flag.

After 12 minutes more the rumble still was going on in the same way. The McAdoo people were chanting McAdoo and the Smith people were chanting "Oh!" to the same rhythm.

The McAdoo managers let it be known that they expected to keep the demonstration going at least an hour and possibly longer. At the end of an hour, chairman Walsh began rapping for order. A good many of the delegates spaces were empty by this time.

The word had been passed about that the plan was to adjourn after the demonstration and many delegates had taken advantage of it. Chairman Walsh whacked vigorously and persistently and the cheering and yelling stopped, but the aisles were still full of a milling throng.

Amid the disorder and turmoil a motion was put to adjourn until 10:30 tomorrow morning amid much confusion the motion was put and carried with a roar of ayes.

The convention poured out of the doors into the fresh air and called it a day. The demonstrators for the various candidates were soaked, exhausted and voiceless.
