LOCAL COMPANY BACK FROM CAMP

National Guardsmen Return
From Annual Encamp-
ment at Camp Lewis.

GIVEN COMPLIMENT

Local Company Pronounced
Best in Appearance and
Bearing by Mustering
Officer on Final Day.

Company D 162nd Infantry, returned to Roseburg today following the annual summer encampment at Camp Lewis, where the guardsmen have had two weeks of intensive military training. The course this year was more detailed than any camp ever held by the Oregon National Guard. It is reported, and the company has been greatly benefited by the work done.

The instructions this year included much new work and was extremely thorough and practical. There was a good deal of range firing to enable the men to become familiar with the handling of their weapons, and maneuvering and battle practice to give them tactical instruction. In addition to the drilling and military instruction much attention was given to recreation. Directed group athletics, athletic competition, hikes to interesting points, trips to Mt. Rainier and many other diversions were furnished so that there were many enjoyable features to the camp in addition to the hard work.

The weather was sufficiently cool to prevent the hikes from being too hard on the men, while at the same time it was warm enough to be comfortable. The men made a number of short hikes, one long hike and an overnight camp.

The Roseburg company was complimented by the mustering officer at the final inspection because of the fine appearance made by the organization, the officer pronouncing the Roseburg company to be the best in the regiment in appearance and bearing.

Captain Lyle E. Masters returned from Virginia the day before the trips went to camp after completing a course of instruction at the officers' training camp there, and took command of the company during the encampment.

The troops left Camp Lewis yesterday following a review before Governor Pierce, and arrived here at 7 o'clock this morning on a special train bearing the Southern Oregon companies.

Mentioning the Hudson tunnels, Phelan said:

"In that work he gave equal pay to women for equal work."

Then in conclusion, Phelan added: "The vast machinery of the government now rumbles discordantly along the roads; the parts do not fit; the crew recalcitrant and rebellious and the chosen chief engineer has been succeeded by the creature of an accident."

"A century ago there came riding from the west a people's president, Andrew Jackson. Today there has come another man from the west, another Old Hickory, with the same sympathy for the common man, the same heritage of American ideals and an equal vision, courage and staunch determination."

"He will be, God willing, our next president."

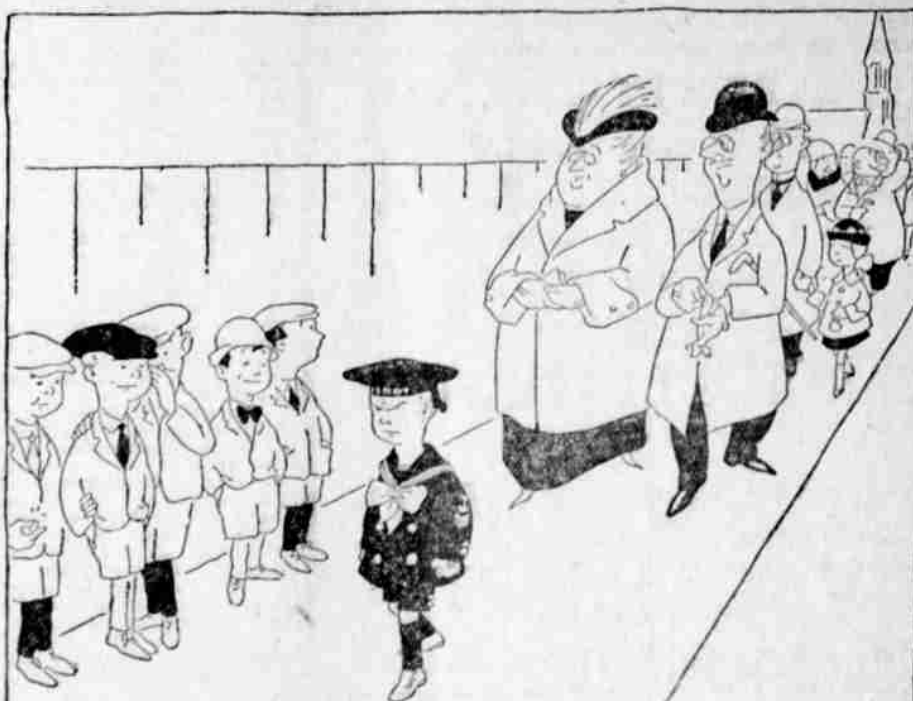
Murder of Deputy Stirs All Italy.
