Transport Chamber of Commerce Asks for Cooperation in Task of Establishing Highway.

Board of directors of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce met at Hotel Umpqua yesterday afternoon at the office of the chamber building making it impossible to meet there. The usual business was transacted. President Weaver presided.

Secretary read a letter from the Portland Artisans of Portland, who arrive in the city Sunday evening, August 3rd with a caravan of fifty to seventy-five automobiles. They wish to hold an outdoor service that evening and at the churches unite with such service. The matter referred to the Roseburg Ministerial Association.

Secretary read a telegram from McNary in regard to the establishment of a Douglas fir experiment in Douglas county. Vice-President Weaver appointed the following committee to handle the matter: Messrs. J. H. A. C. Seely and B. L. Eddy.

Secretary reported that he had the necessary arrangements made for the two weeks proposed "Stop Forest Fires Association" securing the cooperation of Scouts to solicit members of the association, and reported Douglas County Fire Patrol had offered two cash prizes of \$10.00 and \$5.00 to the boys securing the largest and largest number of members.

The membership drive will continue during the two weeks—June 25th to July 14th.

Communication was read from American Mining Congress announcing the twenty-seventh annual convention to be held at Sacramento, September 29th to October 4th. Secretary was instructed to take up the matter of appointing delegates to meet up with the Riddle Club.

FOOT AND MOUTH PLAGUE IS GOING

California Quarantines Being Lifted as Disease of Cattle Subsides.

STILL A FEW CASES

Occasional Flare-Ups Still Reported Although Several Weeks May Elapse Between Cases.

Except for occasional flare-ups the outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease in California is so effectively under control that agricultural and industrial conditions are now practically back to normal, the U. S. department of agriculture announces. Restrictions on tourists and automobile travel within the state have either been removed or so modified that there is practically no delay or inconvenience.

The last quarantine order, issued by the United States department of agriculture June 18, removed additional territory from quarantine restrictions. The territory released under this and other orders includes a large proportion of the area originally quarantined. The system of designating approved areas for the shipment of fruits and vegetables is working well and traffic is moving without interruptions.

In a statement issued by the department of agriculture June 20 all infected herds had been slaughtered and buried on that date with the exception of one herd in Merced county, which was found the previous day. The crews which disinfect premises are so organized that they can commence cleaning and disinfecting as soon as the diseased herds are slaughtered and buried. Claims for indemnity are being approved and handled promptly.

The treacherous nature of foot and mouth disease continues to be shown by its recurrence in localities even after several weeks have elapsed. In Tulare, Fresno and Merced counties infection was recently found which could be attributed only to virus believed to have been dormant for more than two weeks.

Dr. John R. Mohler, chief of the bureau of animal industry, recently left Washington to make personal observations of the foot and mouth disease situation in California. He will consult with Dr. U. G. Houck, who has been handling the control work for the department, and with other federal and state officials.

No cases of foot and mouth disease have occurred outside of California, although many have been reported. A suspicious case in Missouri proved to be the result of lead poisoning. The bureau has investigated reports of the disease in Colorado, Illinois, Ohio, and West Virginia, but with negative results. In Iowa the state board of health discovered a man having lesions resembling those of foot and mouth disease. The board of health made a complete diagnosis and also furnished the bureau of animal industry at Washington with experimental material for animal inoculations. Both
