ALBANY, June 25.—(Special to The News-Review.)—The twenty-third convention of the Oregon Association closed today, passing a resolution favoring the establishing of free clinics for children and the making of examinations by school nurses including the feet and spines of the children. Dean Becker, of the Kirksville college of osteopathy and surgery spoke on the osteopathic treatment of acute infections. A large children's clinic was held. Some of the best authorities hold that 23 per cent of all children have some degree of curvature that will cause serious disturbances later in life and should be discovered and corrected early. The next meeting will be held in Portland. The officers elected were Dr. Marshall of Salem, president; Dr. S. L. DeLapp, of Roseburg, vice-president; Dr. Beaumont, of Portland, secretary. The members of the association attending the convention were royally entertained by the people of Albany.

FARM NEWS

(By B. W. Cooney.)

Control of mice in hay has been a real problem with a number of farmers in the county. Mice are often responsible for the loss of two or three tons of hay each year in a 25-ton mow. Much more is made unsalable on account of mice eating the hay in their destructive way. This loss can be avoided by the use of poisoned rolled oats at a cost of a few cents per year.

Make triangular boxes from old six

inch boards nailed together. The boxes and bait will come from placing them about four to six feet apart on the floor of the mow, placed in such a manner as to be about one foot or 18 inches under the edges of the hay when mowed or stacked.

The boxes before placing are baited with about one teaspoon of poisoned rolled oats each. The county agent is prepared to supply the poison sufficient to treat four or five pounds of oats at a cost of 25 or 30 cents. This much bait should be sufficient to protect a large hay mow or stack. The real value of the control consists of placing the boxes of bait in place before the hay or feed is stacked.

PAVING ACTION TO BE DELAYED

A special meeting of the city council called for 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon failed to materialize for lack of a quorum. At an informal discussion, however, it was decided that the amount of repairs necessary this year is not sufficient to warrant the expenditure of a large sum of money in the purchase of a paving plant. It was decided that the city should go ahead with its present equipment and patch the places where immediate work is necessary and leave the remainder of the work until next year when a large paving plant will probably be brought in and resurfacing and repairs done under contract.

The order was said to be the first step toward a case designed to test the validity of the liquor treaty with Great Britain.

PORTLAND MAN HELD FOR ALLEGED FRAUD

PORTLAND, Ore., June 25.—A secret indictment charging that John L. Etheridge planned a bond fraud and used the United States mails to carry out his scheme was brought against Etheridge late yesterday and

the former head of the Morris Brothers' bond house placed under arrest by United States marshal Clarence H. Hotchkiss.

Etheridge posted \$1,000 bond for his appearance in Federal court to answer the charges, and was released.

The charges grew out of handling a Seattle improvement district bond issue, according to Joseph O. Stearns who had been assigned to prosecute the case for the government.

PORTLAND, June 25.—About \$2,250 in cash, checks and diamonds was stolen from the May Motor Company here by thieves who broke in

some time last night, according to a report made to the police today by Al May, proprietor of the agency.

The robbers forced open the door of a fire proof filing cabinet with tools from the repair shop. They made away with the money box which contained, according to May, about \$1,200 in cash, \$100 in checks and three diamond rings worth about \$300.
