## CALIFORNIA TO ASK RULERS OF SPAIN TO CROSS ATLANTIC

(By Associated Press.)

SAN FRANCISCO, June 26.—Plans have been made for an international pilgrimage to one of the cradles of civilization on the Pacific Coast of the United States, the spot near Monterey, Calif., where Father Junipero Serra, the first Spanish padre, landed and established the first mission in California in 1776.

The celebration, to be centered in the restored chapel of Carmel Mission, will begin October 12 and last

a week. Those to whom special invitations will be issued will include the king and queen of Spain, the Spanish ambassador at Washington, the president of Mexico and a number of other noted Spaniards and Mexicans.

The ancient Spanish mission overlooks the Pacific ocean. The body of Father Serra is buried beside the altar in the chapel, but during the observance the coffin will be removed, in the course of a memorial service, and placed in a beautiful sarcophagus which is being completed by Jo Mora, the sculptor, in his studio at Pebble Beach, Cal. The sarcophagus will be unveiled at an elaborate ceremony on October 19, the Sunday that will mark the conclusion of the pageant.

Thousands are expected to gather for the celebration. In addition to the religious services, there will be music, dances and entertainment typical of the period represented. The fiestas, fandangoes, barbeques and masquerades that characterized the Spanish occupation of California will be reproduced faithfully.

Father Serra is credited not only with founding a spiritual heritage for his people in the new land, and with administering to many of their secular needs, but also with planting the seeds, brought from Spain, for the first farm in western America.

During the observance the flags of Spain, Mexico and the United States will fly together over the historic customs house of Monterey. A prevailing note will be the costumes of the old mission days, a period that survives today in the geographical names and type of architecture of California.

Laura Bride Powers, an art critic, is announced as the originator of the pilgrimage and pageant. The details were first made public from San Carlos church in Monterey by Father Ramon M. Mestres.

## WOMAN ELECTED HEAD STATE FAIR BOARD

SALEM, Ore., June 25.—The state fair board at a meeting here today unanimously elected Mrs. Ella Schultz Wilson as secretary of the board and manager of the state fair to succeed Fred H. Curry, resigned. Curry's resignation was accepted effective July 1. He said that he had no future plans except a visit to his home in Union county for a few days.

Mrs. Wilson has been associated with the state fair for 19 years, serving under secretaries A. L. Jones, A. H. Lea and Fred H. Curry.

Curry was elected in 1923 to succeed Lea and had charge of the fair last year. His resignation resulted from his having been appointed at Rainier a few weeks ago for driving an automobile while intoxicated.

## LARGE OREGON FIRMS WITHDRAW UNDER ACT

SALEM, Oregon, June 25.—One mainly to a drive against the State Workmen's Compensation act, a larger number of large Oregon concerns than usual, most of them logging and lumbering concerns, notified the Industrial Accident Commission during the month of May that they would withdraw from operation under the act. Fully 90 per cent of them, however, upon investigation have changed their minds, according to Clifford Ekins, chairman of the commission and have this month notified the commission that they would remain under its provisions.

The law provides that firms wishing to withdraw from operation under the act, must so notify the commission during the month of May and if they later wish to withdraw their rejection, they are required to notify the commission before July 1.
