EMERGENCY BOARD TO PASS ON APPLICATION

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SALEM, Ore., June 29.—The state emergency board is meeting here this morning to pass on the application of the state income tax department for a deficiency appropriation of \$25,000 to meet the current expenses of the department.

SALEM, Ore., June 29.—The State Emergency Board this morning voted to allow \$14,150 of the \$21,900 deficiency appropriation asked by the State income tax department, leaving off \$6,750 that was asked for in the way of traveling expenses and other incidental expense including \$1750 for special legal services.

Governor Pierce argued for allowance of the entire \$21,900 but finally voted for the revised appropriation.

TODAY'S TRAGEDIES

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

CHICAGO, Ill., June 30.—Beaten to death and their bodies carefully covered by sheets or blankets, the bodies of Otto Eder, taxicab chauffeur, his wife, Frances, and their three sons, Roy, 11 years old; Harvey 6 and Jack 3, were found in their home late last night.

There was no disorder in the house and no attempt at robbery was apparent.

Police said they thought the family had been killed by a half-witted relative or a boarder filled with a lust to slay.

"It looks to me like the work of a man amply filled with a lust to kill," said Henry A. Wolf, chief of Police of Elmhurst, the suburb in which the Eders had lived.

THE DALLES, Ore., June 30.—Stanley Jordan, 25, of Portland, was instantly killed last night in an automobile accident on The Dalles-California highway, ten miles from here.

The car in which Jordan and his father, A. R. Linkley, were riding tipped over on a curve, pinning the occupants beneath it. Jordan's skull was crushed.

PORTLAND, June 30.—Robert Francis Merrill, aged three years was killed when the car in which he and his parents were riding overturned last night while passing another automobile on the highway near La Center. The other occupants of the car were badly cut and bruised.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—Gilbert Goldstrom, 25, was thrown or jumped to his death from the west end of the Burnside bridge here shortly after midnight this morning.

His body with both legs broken, was taken from the river an hour and a half later. Jack Roberts, watchman on nearby docks, reported that he heard Goldstrom cry out as he struck the water.

Officials at the coronor's office and at the police headquarters expressed the belief that Goldstrom jumped from the bridge suicidal intent and that his legs were broken by striking the edge of a wharf in his fall.

Friends of the dead man says he left home earlier in the evening with some money and a gold watch on his person. Police reported that neither were found on the body when it was taken from the river.

LONG BEACH, Calif., Henry Mayer, 48, president of a large mercantile company at Pasadena, reputed to be wealthy, and Mrs. Charles W. Davis were shot and killed in a struggle in an apartment here today. The woman's husband is held pending investigation of the shooting.

ASSOCIATION IS IN FINE SHAPE

Annual Meeting of Umpqua Savings and Loan Association Held Last Week.

STOCK IS INCREASED

Secretary's Report Shows Capital Stock Increased to \$1,000,000—Earnings Are 8 Per Cent.

The seventh annual meeting of the stockholders of the Umpqua Savings & Loan Association was held Thursday evening at the office of the secretary, H. O. Pargeter, at which time the annual report of the secretary, giving a detailed statement of the condition of the affairs of the association for the past year was submitted to the stockholders for their consideration, and was unanimously approved.

The report of the secretary gives the earnings as a fraction over eight per cent and shows the association to be in a flourishing condition. The association has made great strides during the past year. Recently the capital stock was increased from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000 and is selling readily.

The association now has 158 loans in force mostly on new construction, during the year a total of 70 loans being made amounting to \$83,424.45. Of these, 25 were made on new buildings and a like number of loans for improvement purposes.

The association is a purely mutual company, all shareholders participating alike in all dividends exactly in proportion to the amount they have invested. It is cooperative and through the application of cooperative principles it is able to accomplish for the individual what he could not accomplish alone.

The investor's money is placed in first mortgage loans on improved city property not to exceed fifty per cent of the valuation of the property, as required by the state law, and the security becomes better each month on the principal. All securities of the association are placed in a depository designated by the state and cannot be withdrawn without written authority of the state. Large or small sums may be invested at the beginning of any month, interest being figured on monthly balances.
