DEMOCRATS FAIL 24TH BALLOT

Locally No Change in
Block of Yesterday—
convene at 8 o'clock.

1000 VOTE WEAKENS

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JAPAN ACCEPTS INVITE
(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
LONDON, July 1.—Japan has accepted the invitation to take part in the inter-allied conference on reparations to be held in London this month. It was announced by the British ambassador to Japan, Sir Duff Assheton, that the Japanese government had decided to send a delegation to the conference.

At the close of the sixteenth ballot, the first of the day, the leaders stood:
McAdoo 478; Smith 395.5; Davis 63; Robinson 46; Underwood 41.5.

These figures showed a net loss of one for McAdoo, no change for Smith, and a gain of two for John W. Davis. Robinson had jumped from 20 to 46.

The result of the 16th ballot:
Underwood 41.5; Robinson 46; McAdoo 478; Smith 395.5; Davis 63; Ralston 31; Ritchie 17.5; Cox 60; Glass 25; Brown 1; Bryan 11; Saulsbury 6; Davis of Kansas 11; Walsh 1; Copeland 11.

On the 17th ballot the leaders stood this way:
McAdoo 472.5; Smith 312.5; Davis 64; Underwood 42; Robinson 28.

McAdoo had lost 6.5-10; Smith gained seven; Davis gained one. There was no nomination and the election went on to the 18th ballot.

The figures announced for the 17th ballot were:
Underwood 42; McAdoo 471.5; Robinson 28; Smith 312.5; John W. Davis 64; Ralston 30; Copeland 11; Walsh 1.

The 18th ballot—third of today's proceedings—like its predecessors developed no presidential candidate. On the 18th ballot, the position of the leaders was as follows:
McAdoo 470.5; Smith 312.5; Davis 66.

McAdoo lost 1; Smith's vote was unchanged; Davis gained two. Totals in Eighteenth
The totals for the 18th ballot followed:
Underwood 39.5; McAdoo 470.5; Smith 312.5; Robinson 27; John W. Davis 66; Ritchie 18.5; Cox 60; Ralston 30; Copeland 11; Walsh 1.

The Smith people made a dent in the McAdoo block in the south during the 18th ballot when after argument Chairman Walsh ruled that the Florida vote should be counted: McAdoo 11 Smith 1; The McAdoo people had sought to hold the state solid for him under the unit rule and argued that the delegates had been elected at a presidential preference primary in which McAdoo had carried the state two to one.

Former Governor Gilchrist of Florida, argued that the primary was not binding on the delegates, but only while they thought McAdoo could win.

Bryan Fights Davis
William Jennings Bryan, launched an open fight on the convention floor against John W. Davis of West Virginia today during the taking of the 19th ballot.

Hearing that the Mississippi delegation was planning to go to Davis Bryan left his seat in the Florida delegation and went over to talk to the Mississippians.

"I tell you that LaFollette will take more votes from Davis than he will from the republicans," Bryan said, as he pleaded with the delegates not to get behind the West Virginian.

The Mississippi delegates argued against Bryan's stand, but he was determined. He stood in the center of the delegation and pleaded strongly.

Davis partisans in the delegation argued with Bryan that no democratic candidate, save from the east, had been elected in the past half century.

"I have been in battles of the party for more than a quarter of a century and never had much help from John W. Davis," Bryan answered emphatically.

Several McAdoo men in the delegation demanded that the delegation be polled again before the next roll call.

Bryan continued his broadside against the West Virginian.
"I know the temper of the north-west and I offer as my opinion to this delegation that you are throwing democratic chances to the wind in voting for Davis. His clients and his connections in the east make him desirable, but he can command no following in the northwest where the election will be decided."

Defends McAdoo
Some of the women delegates brought up the subject of McAdoo's oil connections.
"McAdoo never got close enough to Doheny to get the friendship of Wall street," Bryan countered. Later Bryan said he merely went over to see the delegation because rumors of a switch to Davis had reached him.

"I am interested in this fight: I want the party to win," he said. Bryan did not insist on a decision by the Mississippi delegation. When he finished his remarks about Davis he walked away.

JAPANESE MEET TO SHOW PROTEST

Thousands Congregate in
Capitol City to Show Dis-
favor of Exclusion Law.

NO VIOLENCE DISPLAYED

Only Untoward Incident Was
Tearing Down of Flag,
Which Is Not Connected
With Demonstration.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
TOKIO, July 1.—Crowds estimated to have ranged from 10,000 down to a few hundreds attended the meeting in Kyoto, sponsored by the military reservists, among them being several officers high in army's active list. Half as many, according to the best estimate, attended a similar meeting in Osaka.

Up to the present time (six p. m.) no untoward incidents have been reported except the cutting down of the American flag in the United States embassy compound in Tokyo, which it is believed, there is no reason to connect with any set programme of anti-American demonstration.

Both houses of the Japanese diet at their first sittings of the current session today and almost as their first business, passed resolutions strongly opposing the action of the United States in enacting, as part of its new immigration law, a clause prohibiting the entry of Japanese.

The house of Peers in its resolution expressed approval of the action already taken by the Japanese government with regard to the American enactment, that passed by the lower house asked the government to take all proper measures demanded by the situation. Both drafts assert the enactment is discriminatory.

SEATTLE CHIEF IS GIVEN BACK JOB

SEATTLE, July 1.—William B. Severns, removed Wednesday by Mrs. Henry Landes, acting Mayor, from the Seattle police department, was restored today by Mayor Edwin J. Brown, on his hasty return from the democratic national convention in New York City.

After alighting from the train Dr. Brown, hastened to his office where he signed a commission for Mr. Severns, whom he made chief two years ago. Severns at once succeeded Mrs. Landes as chief of police.

Dr. Brown said that Mrs. Landes had "put Seattle in a bad light all over the country" by removing Severns and by herself taking charge of the department Thursday. Mrs. Landes complained that the city needed a moral reformation and that she could not induce Severns to go to work. "I have been put in the position of having to defend my city," lamented Mayor Brown.

NORTH BEND HAS BAD APARTMENT FIRE

NORTH BEND, Ore., July 1.—A fire believed to have started in the basement of the Roger's apartment house here last night destroyed the apartment house and badly damaged an adjoining apartment, causing a loss estimated in the neighborhood of \$15,000.

Six families lost all their personal belongings and four others suffered losses more or less severe. A number of persons had narrow escapes from death and were forced into the street in their night clothes.

KLAN PARADES IN NORTH POWDER, ORE.

MAYOR RICE BANS ALL FIREWORKS

Extreme Dry Condition Makes
Greater Precautions Neces-
sary, Mayor Says.

PEOPLE ARE LEAVING

Residents Going to Celebra-
tions or on Picnics and
Will Not Be Able to
Guard Homes.

PROCLAMATION

In order to prevent serious fires on contrabands and to protect our city from such dangers, I hereby issue this proclamation:

All persons are hereby requested not to discharge any fire work, fire crackers or any other preparation of gun-powder within the city limits of this city during the exceeding dry weather of July, August and September and all persons desiring to burn any rubbish within the city are requested first to notify either the fire chief or the city recorder and secure permission for such bonfire and then to take extra precautions to prevent the fire from doing any damage.

Ordinance No. 127 of the city of Roseburg prohibits the discharge of any fire works or the building of any bonfire without first obtaining a permit therefor from the city recorder and because of the extraordinary weather conditions I deem it advisable to issue no permits for the discharge of fireworks during the period herein mentioned and no permits will be granted during this period for such fire works and any persons violating the ordinance herein referred to will be subject to fine.

I sincerely trust that the citizens of our fair city will cooperate with the officials in this respect and use all precautions possible to prevent additional fires such as we have been having.

Because of the extremely dry weather and the low humidity, Mayor N. Rice today issued instructions to the city police department to rigidly enforce the ordinance preventing the shooting of firecrackers, or fireworks of any kind within the city limits. The mayor also took advantage of this opportunity to place before the people the requirements of the city ordinance providing for permits for building bonfires within the city.

Not for many years has the city experienced such a fire danger as is now being faced. Everywhere the grass is dry and easily ignited. The (Continued on page four.)

HEALTH UNIT HAS BUSY TIME

Narrative Report for the Past
Quarter Indicates Much
Valuable Work Done.

DISEASES ARE VERY FEW

Only Three Cases of Conta-
gious Diseases Reported
in County During the
Past Week.

The narrative report of the Douglas county health unit shows a very active period. During the quarter 144 cases of communicable diseases were divided as follows: Tuberculosis 2, diphtheria 2, measles 97, whooping cough 9, chicken pox 9, pneumonia 2, scarlet fever 12, typhoid 1, mumps 1, influenza 4, scabies 1, small pox 1. The unit quarantined 140 of these cases, and 172, including some held over from last quarter, were released from quarantine. Only three cases were reported during the last week.

In health education the health officers gave eleven lectures and talks with 422 people in attendance; 897 pieces of literature were distributed; 30 press articles printed and 1 health exhibit made. The nurses gave eight talks to 396 school children. The film "Working for Dear Life," was shown in Myrtle Creek, Canyonville, Oakland, Roseburg and Glendale.

Dr. Belt visited all parts of the county and had conferences with the city authorities in Reedsport, Oakland, Myrtle Creek and Glendale. Special attention has been given to auto camps and 42 general inspections have been made and 22 water supplies investigated. 37 samples of water being taken.

The Myrtle Creek school was surveyed for diphtheria carriers and 99 swabs taken. These carriers were found and placed under treatment.

Among other work, the unit held a tuberculosis clinic in Roseburg where 26 people were examined; the nurses made 51 infant visits and 78 school children visits; 1571 school children were examined for defects.

The health officer made 59 visits to the county home, 55 home visits, 28 visits to the county jail, 74 visits to the hospital, performed 13 operations and treated 87 patients including 12 prisoners and 12 insane patients. The health officer has also had 148 office conferences, sent out 990 letters, and 425 telephone calls and traveled 5375 miles in the past three months.

ELECTRICAL STORM STARTS FOREST FIRES

MEDFORD INJUNCTION SUIT IS DISMISSED

PORTLAND, Ore., July 1.—The injunction suit brought by the Southern Pacific railroad company to restrain the city of Medford, its mayor and all other officials from the construction of a street through the station grounds at Medford, was dismissed late yesterday by Federal Judge Bean, under an agreement reached directly between the city and the railroad company.

TO REMOVE COLLEGE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 1.—The removal of Linfield college from its present location at McMinnville to some other place, not yet selected, was decided late yesterday by the board of directors. The school which was a Baptist denominational institution, was founded at McMinnville more than forty years ago. Portland and Spokane are reported to be among the possible locations.

TANKER GOES ASHORE IN SMOKE AND MIST

SEATTLE, July 1.—The tanker Stockton went ashore early today at Point Wilson, which is near Port Townsend, Washington, and at the northern end of Admiralty Inlet. The accident, was attributed to smoke from a forest fire on the Olympic peninsula and to mist.

MERCURY REACHES 108 AT PENDLETON

WILLAMETTE HEAD TO RENEW CONTRACT

SALEM, Ore., July 1.—Dr. Carl Gregg Doney, who a few weeks ago submitted his resignation as president of the Willamette University because of impaired health will accept an offer of the board of trustees, made last Saturday through a sub-committee, to take a year's leave of absence and then resume the presidency on a five year contract. He so stated here today, and added that during his absence the University will be administered by Dean Geo. H. Alden, and a committee of faculty members. Dr. Doney is undecided about his plans for next year. He will leave next week for California to attend the wedding of his son.

PLANS DISCUSSED FOR CHAUTAUQUA

D. E. Carr, manager of the Chautauqua ticket sale for Roseburg and vicinity, returned this morning from Portland where he attended a chautauqua conference. Representatives were present from many points in Oregon and Washington, and an all-day session was held yesterday. All matters relative to chautauqua, including contract terms, ticket prices, programs, etc., were thoroughly discussed from every angle.

This year's program is the best in the United States, Mr. Carr reports. He states that Mr. Ellison of the Ellison-White company made a trip through the east recently and compared the western circuit with the circuit there and found the program offered this season on the 7-day circuit to be the best of any. It is by far the best Ellison-White has ever offered, it is claimed. The statement contained in the Portland press that Sunday programs are to be held is a mistake, Mr. Carr says. There will be no Sunday programs on the 7-day circuits, a bitter fight having been waged on this issue.

Mr. Carr will give a complete report of the conference at the meeting of guarantors to be held at the Heinline Studio this evening at 7:30 p. m. This is a very important meeting as final plans are to be made for the ticket selling campaign and canvases to be held tomorrow. All persons interested in hearing the result of the conference, or who are interested in chautauqua work are invited to meet with the guarantors this evening.

PLANES HOP OFF FOR MAIL FLIGHT

Air Mail Service Across Con-
tinent Officially Opened
This Morning.

LEAVE EACH COAST

Plane Leaves San Francisco
Early Today and Two
More Leave Atlantic
Coast at 11 O'Clock.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SAN FRANCISCO, July 1.—Pilot Clair K. Vance hopped off on the first leg of the new day and night air mail service from here to New York at 5:75 a. m. today.

A small crowd braved the early morning chill and the fog to speed Vance on his way. Post office clerks had a hard time packing into his plane all the mail deposited here for aerial delivery in the east and there was some apprehension, when the fog forced him to circle back, that it had been overloaded. This was allayed, however, when the flier got his bearings and shot toward the coast range.

Three special mail boxes, set up on downtown corners yesterday, were filled and refilled as rapidly with letters for transport on the first carrier of the service that a full plane load of air mail was taken up by the collectors within 20 minutes. Crowds stood in line for an hour awaiting to deposit their missives.

The first letter deposited was addressed to President Coolidge. It was mailed by M. H. De Young, publisher of the San Francisco Chronicle and thanked the executive for inauguration of a means of bringing the government closer to the western public.

Postmaster James H. Power and Mrs. Power sent packages of fresh California flowers to President and Mrs. Coolidge.

MINEOLA, New York, July 1.—Two airplanes, each with a 350 pound cargo took off at Hazelhurst field shortly after 11 a. m. eastern daylight time, headed for San Francisco, on the maiden westward run of the day-night transcontinental mail service, formally installed today.

SALT LAKE CITY, July 1.—Lieutenant Russel Maughan arrived here from San Francisco at 11:30 a. m. mountain time. He landed his plane at the local air mail field.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, July 1.—Wesley Smith, coast-to-coast air mail flyer arrived here from New York at 2:35 p. m., eastern standard time, 17 minutes ahead of scheduled time.

RENO, Nev., July 1.—Pilot Claire Vance, arrived at the Reno air mail field from San Francisco at 7:43 a. m., and pilot Levisse left for Elko at 8:15 a. m.

Pilot Paul Scott hopped off for Salt Lake City, the next stop on the route eastward to New York at 11 o'clock, Pacific time.

ELKO, Nev., July 1.—Pilot Levisse of the United States aerial mail service arrived here from Reno, Nev., at 10:38 a. m. (Pacific time) with mail which Pilot Claire Vance deposited from San Francisco this morning.
