NEW BUICK CAR ANNOUNCED TODAY

A new Buick six-cylinder model to be known as the Standard Six has been added to the Buick line and is being introduced after an extensive and unique advertising campaign. Only a few of these cars have reached the coast dealers up to the present time, but it is expected that they will soon be in great demand.

The new car has a wheel base of 114 3/8 inches, and other high lights in connection with it are its completely self-lubricating valve-in-head engine, four-wheel brakes and low-pressure tires.

An announcement from the Buick factory says:

The engine is a valve-in-head type with automatic lubrication throughout and with the cylinder head removable. The clutch and transmission form integral parts of the engine, which is suspended at three points from the main frame. The crankshaft is a drop-forging, extra heavy and balanced with four large bearings. Large valves are operated by noiseless, adjustable push rods through rocker arms, which are automatically lubricated from the engine. This motor produces 50 actual brake horsepower.

It has pressure feed lubrication to the crankshaft and connecting rod bearings. Also the camshaft and pump gears. The oil pump is of gear type, positive drive, driven by worm on the center of the camshaft. It has a maximum pressure of 30 pounds regulated by relief valve. FIRE RECORDS BROKEN IN JUNE

Thirteen Alarms Turned in During Past Month With Loss of \$20,000.

HOMES ARE DESTROYED

Two Residences Burned During Latter Part of Month—Many Grass Fires Because of Dry Weather

The month of June was a "Jonah" month for the fire department, for at previous records for frequency of fires were broken and more calls turned in than in any previous month in the history of the city. In fact there were more fires last month than have occurred in several of the recent years. Heretofore the maximum for an entire year has been 52 while already this year the total number of alarms is near the 40 mark with the dry season just well begun.

During the month of June the fire department was called out thirteen times, and fire losses amounting to around \$20,000 occurred, bringing the losses for the year up to about \$70,000.

The cost to the fire department for the calls last month, was \$189, while the department paid out \$124 in May. The allowance given the fire department by the council is only \$50 per month, so that the organization is now deeply in debt and some emergency measures are necessary in order to provide funds to pay off the firemen who receive \$1 each for every alarm and \$2 if it is necessary to use water or chemical in fighting the blaze.

The thirteen fires occurred on eleven different days, two alarms having been turned in on the 4th and on the 24th. The calls for the month were as follows:

BAN ON LIVESTOCK MODIFIED BY STATE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PORTLAND, Ore., July 1.—The ban on livestock from California, the result of the foot and mouth disease in that state, was modified by the state livestock sanitary board at a meeting here today.

The board unanimously adopted the recommendations of the western states livestock sanitary association which met at Reno recently. This allows sheep, horses and pet animals to enter the state, providing they originated from California counties free from the foot and mouth disease and all shrubs and nursery stocks, and fruits and vegetables to enter provided they are properly packed and verified as being from uninfected districts.

Livestock shipped to other districts through Oregon must have a health certificate and remain in locked cars unless unloaded in quarantined yards.

Laborers entering from California ranches must have certificates that they have not been in any infected regions, or be required to destroy all clothing and bedding.

Circuses and carnivals may enter the state with federal or state certificate of disinfection.

The California counties from which sheep may enter Oregon are: Lassen, Modoc, Plumas, Sierra, Nevada and Placer. Milk may only be shipped if pasteurized, and cans returning to Oregon from shipment to the south must be treated with formaldehyde. These modifications raise most of the bans on California counties except those who have been infected. Restrictions on infected counties will be modified at

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the end of a period of 21 days from which no infection has been reported.

Disinfection of auto camps coming into Oregon over the Pacific, Roosevelt and Eastern Oregon highways, will continue until all California, but hay fodder and straw may be brought into Oregon from a 15 mile strip along northern California, but hay fodder and straw from the rest of California are barred.

ADDITIONAL TRAFFIC LAWS ARE NEEDED

Some regulation to force motorists to come to a stop following a fire alarm is being urged by members of the fire department as a result of a number of near accidents during the past few days. The fire truck and firemen rushing to a fire are badly hampered by automobiles which give no right of way and block the traffic. The fire truck was called out at noon today for a grass fire on reservoir hill, and in going down Jackson street was allowed up by motorists who refused to give passing room. In one instance a driver pulled out from the curb directly in front of the truck. Another alarm for a grass fire near the dump grounds this afternoon, resulted in the same condition and the truck was unable to make its proper speed. Yesterday a fireman speeding to a fire was struck by an automobile turning across the line of traffic.

Unless something is done to regulate traffic during a fire there is going to be a serious accident. It is necessary for the fire truck to have full right of way, while going to and from a fire. In cities, automobiles are required to draw up to the curb, and it is quite noticeable that practically all tourists immediately clear the streets, but local people continue to block traffic. Firemen on their way to the blaze are given considerable leeway and have a right of way over other cars. Persons not connected with the fire department have no right to speed and must keep within the laws, and some regulation to prevent racing to fires at break-neck speed with no regard for traffic laws should be enforced.

GOVERNMENT MEN TO MAKE SURVEY

PORTLAND, Ore., July 1.—Dr. Elwood Mead, of Washington, D. C., new commissioner of reclamation, and G. C. Krueger, director of farm economics of the reclamation bureau, arrived in Portland today on an official inspection trip of various irrigation projects in Oregon. They will be joined here by F. E. Weymouth, chief engineer of the reclamation bureau, and then the party will visit the Vale, Baker and Umatilla projects.

Later one or more of the party will look over the Deschutes project. The object of the government survey of the Oregon irrigation situation is to classify soils, determine the financial condition of the water users and to fix the irrigable areas against which charges may be assessed.

"My trip is to get in touch with the existing and the proposed projects," said Mr. Mead. "I simply want to see for myself the work done, the condition of the present movements, the nature of the land and to learn the needs of the irrigation districts. I can make no promises, but will make as careful surveys as possible so as to make the needed recommendations in my coming report."

FORESTS REPORTED TO BE VERY DRY

Carl R. Neal, supervisor of the Umpqua National Forest, returned to his home in this city today after a ten day trip of inspection over the Diamond Lake district. He made the trip over the Tiller cutoff road which he reports to be in good condition except for about five miles. He made the 27 mile trip over this road in two and a half hours, indicating that the road is in fairly good shape. The situation from the fire standpoint is quite serious over the entire forest, he states. The timber is exceedingly dry and only a start is needed to make a heavy loss. Everything possible is being done to prevent fires from getting started and so far there have been no fires reported. Mr. Neal is suffering from a slight injury to his leg received when his horse fell with him.
