PHILOLOGISTS DECIDE UPON NEW MEANING FOR "ALABAMA"

MONTGOMERY, Ala., July 2.—(A. P.)—Popular belief that "Alabama" translated from the tribal Indian tongue means "Here We Rest," has been dealt a jolt under the light of philological research.

This more pleasing translation, according to the 1923 issue of the Alabama Official and Statistical Register, just off the press, originated during the early fifties and gained widespread popularity through the writings of Judge A. H. Mook. "Alabama" was the name of a noted southern tribe of Indians, whose habitat was in what is now central

Alabama, the register says. The largest river of this territory was named after the Alabama Indians and the state derived its name from this river.

Recent investigations have brought forth an agreement between two prominent students of Indian dialects the book says. Rev. Allen Wright, a highly educated Choctaw, translates the word to signify "thicket-clearers." His opinion is that the word is compounded from "Alba," meaning a thicket, or mass of vegetation, and "amo," meaning to clear, or to gather up.

H. S. Halbert, another student of tribal dialects concurs in this belief, giving a slightly different translation, "vegetation gatherers." Compared with the heretofore readily accepted translation of "Here We Rest," the register says, this latest etymology may be regarded a trifle prosaic, but it reasons, it more nearly represents the character of Alabamians of today and of the past, who have depended upon their labor with the soil for livelihood.

PLANS ARE COMPLETE FOR POLITICAL MEET

CLEVELAND, Ohio, July 2.—Final plans for the conference of progressive political action convention here July 4, were to be discussed by the national committee at its first session in Cleveland today. The credentials committee also was expected to meet.

With the nomination of Senator La Follette virtually a certainty the committee was expected to discuss vice-presidential possibilities. This question apparently being the only important one not decided. Bishop Francis McConnell of the Methodist church, chairman of the interchurch world committee, D. B. Robertson, president of the brotherhood of locomotive firemen and engineers and virtually all of the progressive bloc of the Senators has been mentioned. Arthur E. Holder, executive secretary of the conference said. A revision of the national committee announced by Mr. Holder, adds an equal number of women.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, July 2.—Philip Bergh, of Roseburg, and Annabel Denn, of Camas Valley, are named on the tentative honor roll list for high grades made during the spring term at the University of Oregon. Mr. Bergh is a freshman in the school of business administration. Miss Denn received her degree from the school of music this year, graduating with honorable mention for general scholarship. The names of 113 students appear on the honor list, 51 men and 62 women, all of whom received grades of 11 or above in all subjects carried. Grades in physical education were not counted in compiling the list, which includes 30 seniors, 24 juniors, 23 sophomores, 28 freshmen, three specials and five law students. SACRAMENTO, Calif., July 2.—The state of California has contracted to pay indemnities to owners of livestock slaughtered in the campaign to eradicate the foot and mouth disease, approximately \$1,900,000. According to figures released today by H. W. Levers, chief accountant of the State Department of Agriculture, approximately one-fourth of this amount has actually been paid to the stockmen.

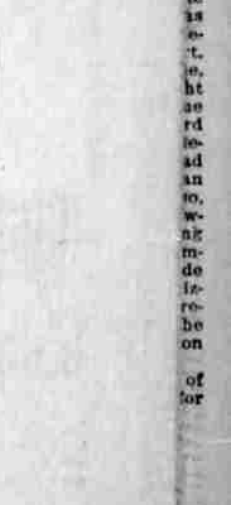
