WEEK OF VOTING IS TOTAL FAILURE

man Mack, leaders of the Smith candidacy for the presidential nomination called a general conference today of all managers of favorite son candidates, some of those attending the meeting believed an agreement might be perfected by which a candidate acceptable to all would be supported by their united forces.

Governor Brandon of Alabama said in the conference room in the convention hall that he believed a "question ticket" would be made up soon and with the united Smith and favorite son support it would receive the two-thirds vote required for a nomination. Thus ending the deadlock.

A resolution to adjourn the democratic national convention and reconvene again in Kansas City was greeted with laughter at first in the convention today, but later developed such evidences of support that a roll call was ordered on the question of its adoption. Only a simple majority was needed.

Totals on adjournment votes.

All votes cast, 1,990. Necessary to carry 546. Aye 82.7. Nays 1007.2.

A move to organize a steering committee, with a member from each delegation to settle the presidential nomination deadlock was undertaken this morning. Representatives from the Missouri and Arkansas delegations conferred with Governor Brennan, the Illinois leader, and suggested the committee as a way to settle the deadlock.

Mr. Brennan was told that the situation was becoming intolerable to many of the delegates and the proposition was made that a committee be formed that could meet while the balloting was going on. This Missouri representative thought that a solution could be reached by this method.

Brennan seemed impressed with the suggestion and said that he would confer immediately with the other leaders and determine if the plan was desirable.

The Illinois leader had a long conference thereafter with members of the national committee. Meantime the McAdoo followers renewed their efforts on the floor to induce favorable son candidates to drop out.

Most of the support for the adjournment proposal seemed to be in the states in the immediate vicinity of Kansas City and it was apparent early in the roll call that the McAdoo delegates, who often have complained that there candidate could not get a square deal in New York, had refused to stand solidly for a revival of the scene of hostilities at the Missouri City. The votes of favorite son states were also thrown to the opposition.

After the Kansas City adjournment proposal had been voted down Thomas H. Ball, a delegate at large from Texas, presented the plan for elimination of favorite sons in a slightly different form. His resolution provided that the low man should be dropped on each ballot, until only two remained; that five ballots then be taken; and that if no nomination resulted the unit rule binding state delegations be dissolved and the delegates vote their personal convictions. The candidate having the majority then would be declared the nominee. A point of order against the Ball resolutions was overruled by Chairman Walsh.

When the question on adoption of the resolution finally was put, its supporters were drowned out by an avalanche of "Noes," and the convention went on to its 74th ballot for a nominee.

While the McAdoo forces were seeking unsuccessfully for formal resolution today to drive favorite sons out of the field of deadlock candidates before the democratic convention, the Smith supporters countered with an attempt to form a combination with the favorite son contingent in the hope of finding a compromise candidate who could be put over.

Those in charge of the candidacies of John W. Davis, Robinson of Arkansas, Glass of Virginia and others in the favorite son class went into conference with the Smith managers, who seemed ready to concede that the time had come for compromise and the doors were closed beforehand to any possibility of the choice falling on McAdoo.

Some of those who took part in discussion were very hopeful that a compromise selection soon would be made and the convention freed from the deadlock that has held it helpless through a week of balloting.

Previously the convention had thrown out quickly and by a viva voce vote a similar but somewhat more drastic proposal submitted by Edward M. Simmons, a delegate at large from Oklahoma, but when the question was put on the Hitchcock resolution the responses seemed more encouraging and a roll call was ordered. Governor Smith reached a new high water mark in the balloting for a presidential nominee when Ohio broke up her block of 48 votes which had been going to favorite sons, gave Smith 20 and McAdoo none.

Another handful of votes was taken from McAdoo in Michigan and given to Smith.

The total given to Smith was only three votes short of the number that would be necessary to veto the nomination of another under the two thirds rule.

DRIVER OF AUTO DIES AT WHEEL

Coroner M. E. Ritter was called to Riddle this afternoon to investigate the death of a man believed to be H. L. Call of Hornbrook, California, Call, according to information received, was driving an automobile for a party of mining engineers who have been looking over the Lewis Ledge mining properties. He and a companion were traveling over a bad stretch of road when the passenger noticed that the machine was wobbling very badly. He turned to Call and told him to be careful and noticed that the driver was leaning back in his seat apparently in a stupor. Just at that instant the auto started over the bank and the companion stepped out just as the car hurtled over the grade.

Dr. Barrett was called but the man was dead, apparently before the auto left the road. The body bore only a few bruises, none of which would have caused death.

A steering committee with a member from each state to try to smooth out the situation to the satisfaction of two-thirds of the delegates, Brennan at first seemed to be well disposed toward the plan but opposition developed immediately among the titular leaders of the Smith cohorts and there seemed to be little chance of progress.

It was pointed out that McAdoo, having control in a majority of states might exercise a dominating power on any such committee. Meantime the convention was voting down another proposal to eliminate favorite sons and to abolish, after a time, both the unit rule and the two-thirds rule. The proposition brought forward by a McAdoo delegate from Texas did not receive sufficient support to warrant a roll call.

The first consequential shift of votes on the balloting for a nominee came on the 74th ballot, which was the fourth to be taken at today's session. Michigan, which had been voting 25 for McAdoo and five for Smith, changed to nine and a half for McAdoo, 13 1/2 for Smith, 6 for Davis and one for Cox.

Scattering his vote for the first time, Ohio, which had voted solidly for Cox and then for Newton D. Baker, passed out twenty and a half votes to Smith and distributed the others over a wide field of favorite sons. In the breakup, McAdoo did not get a single Ohio vote.

The solid block of 48 votes locked up in Ohio for Cox and then for Baker had been regarded by the McAdoo and Smith managers as one of the principal stumbling blocks to advance, their standing in the convention balloting. The absence of any McAdoo votes in the lineup once the block was broken, however, appeared to have had the effect of leaving the situation very much where it was.

BAD GRASS FIRE NEAR TEN MILE

The grass fire Thursday evening at the C. J. Williams place at Ten Mile, burned over more than 80 acres of land, destroyed a big grain field, took out all of the small bridges on the farm, and burned over a mile of rail fencing. The barn and buildings, however, were saved from destruction by a determined effort on the part of neighbors.

Word that the fire was endangering the barn and farm buildings was received by the News-Review late in the afternoon. Word was promptly relayed to the local fire department and an alarm was sounded bringing a number of the volunteers together. Wet sacks, a portable water pump and chemical tanks were hastily loaded into Trevis Dwyer's machine and a quick trip made to the burning district, but by the time the men reached the scene the fire had been turned from the buildings.

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AMERICAN DRAFT IS TO BE CONSIDERED

GENEVA, July 5.—The draft treaty on disarmament and security recently prepared by a group of prominent Americans may form a subject of discussion at the next assembly of the league of nations in September. The disarmament section of the league had decided to print the treaty as an annex to the official report which it will submit to the assembly and this action automatically throws the subject on the agenda making debate on the floor possible.

The officials of the disarmament department are greatly impressed by the American draft which in many ways they deem a distinct improvement over the league pact over mutual assistance, especially commend the judicial of the United States and the utilization of the World Court of Justice.

give progressives an opportunity to unite for a common object, and because we can best serve the people.

"In this campaign he will denounce every form of special privilege, championed by the forces of conservatism and reaction, increasingly endangering the life, liberty and happiness of the American people. His clarion call will go out to progressives every where to strengthen their position in congress; to fight for the control of the agencies that shall determine the election of the president; to proclaim again and again the fundamental principles of the progressive reform and so far as possible to reform the old instrumentalities of political action.

Declaring that La Follette "never dodges, never compromises, never knows defeat," Mr. Nelson said that the Wisconsin senator "never deserts, but always builds."

"Today at the climax of his career," continued Mr. Nelson, "the little lion of the United States Senate not only holds the balance of power in Congress, but will demonstrate that he holds the balance of power in the country."

"Robert M. La Follette will be the next president of the United States or will have the decisive say as to who shall be the nation's chief. His political career has been clean, courageous and straight-forward from beginning to end.

"He has always stood for the people of the representative government."

Postponement of a vice-presidential nomination was agreed upon by leaders of the conference today. The convention asked for the postponement of the selection of such a candidate until a committee could confer with senator La Follette after the democratic situation has worked itself out.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, July 5.—William Mahoney, St. Paul was definitely barred from the conference for progressive political actions by adoption of a special report of the credentials committee.

The report, said Mahoney's organization, the Farmer-Labor federation of Minnesota, was entitled to representation, but that he, by his actions in the St. Louis session of the conference last February and his promotion of the June 17 convention at St. Paul, had made him obnoxious to this organization.

FARM POINTERS

Killing the weeds is the principal object of cultivating row crops such as corn and potatoes, says G. H. Hyslop of the U. S. C. experiment station since weeds are the principal sources of moisture. Cultivation, many persons think, is chiefly to stir up the ground to give the roots a chance to spread and to hold moisture.

Cultivation that goes no deeper than is necessary to get the weeds is said by Professor Hyslop to be most successful. When it goes much deeper than this it not only costs more but may do considerable damage by bringing moist earth to the surface and by snipping off many of the feeding roots.

When a potato or corn field has a loose dry layer of soil on top, and is free from weeds, there is nothing to cultivate for.
