HIGHLIGHTS IN YESTERDAY'S CONVENTION

(Summarized from Associated Press Dispatches.)

The convention was called to order yesterday at 1 o'clock, after adjournment of a lengthy night session Thursday in which the sixty-first roll call was read with little change in the relative standing of the leaders. The deadlock appeared as hopeless with the opening call following the patriotic program yesterday, the 62nd call showing little change.

At the beginning of the 63rd ballot McAdoo managers were reading letters from their candidate, which encouraged them in the fight and stressed the point that they were to be calm and confident. The statement concluded: "What does it mean if the ballots go 63 or even 163? If it goes to 163 it means we are much nearer the goal."

This ballot saw the withdrawal of two of the most popular favorite sons—Senator Ralston, of Indiana, and former Governor Cox of Ohio. The Indiana delegation after a caucus decided to give 20 of their candidate's 30 votes to McAdoo for at least five successive ballots in order to test his strength. The other ten ballots were to be cast for Smith. It turned out, however, that many of the votes were cast promiscuously about the field of dark horses with some strengthening in McAdoo's lines.

During the call of this ballot it came to light that the Tennessee delegation which had been instructed to vote solidly for McAdoo, was wavering considerably and were discussing whether or not it took a majority of the votes to hold the delegation to the candidate whom they had previously been giving their votes. McAdoo retained their support, however, when Chairman Walsh ruled in the affirmative.

Little evidences of change appeared up until the 65th ballot was called for. The Kentucky delegation invited Margaret Wilson to cast their 26 votes for McAdoo. She did so with emphasis. With the withdrawal of Cox the Ohio votes were cast for Newton D. Baker, former secretary of war. It was during this ballot that General Cole, of Massachusetts, offered a resolution proposing that if the convention had not selected a nominee on the ballot concluding at 5 o'clock (eastern daylight time) the convention recess until 8 o'clock for an executive session. There was much squabbling over this motion which finally resulted in a roll call, the result of which clearly demonstrated the McAdoo power of veto over the Smith forces.

A second and more evident control of the veto came when Franklin Roosevelt proposed that the convention accept Governor Smith's offer to appear before it and speak. There were shouts of "No, no, no!" and when the vote was taken by roll call, the McAdoo people won a decisive victory. This resolution, like the Cole motion, required a two-thirds vote to pass and received little better than a third, proving the convention deadlocked even on such minor matters.

After the call of the 66th ballot of the convention, a number of calls exceeding by nine any previous record of a democratic national convention, the session was recessed until 8 o'clock last night with the following record for the day:

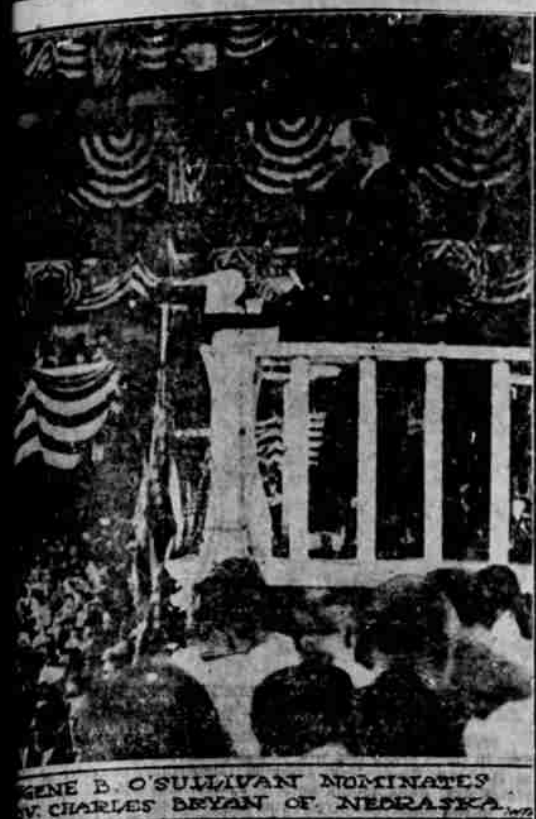

INITIATIVE MEASURES ON OREGON BALLOT

SALEM, Ore., July 4.—The Oregon ballot at the November election will contain four initiative and four referendum measures. Yesterday was the last day for filing completed initiative petitions with the Secretary of State. Of the referendum measures three are proposed constitutional amendments referred to the people by the legislature and the other is a referendum by the people on a legislative act prohibiting traf-

fic in milk and butter substituted.

The third required a literacy test for voters, providing for the condemnation of roads and waterways for the transportation of materials beneficial to irrigation and drainage and amend the state soldiers' bonus and loan law extending its benefits to veterans of the Spanish American war. The four initiative measures that will go on the ballot are:

Providing for a board of naturalization; making operation under the workmen's compensation act compulsory; repeal of state income tax act; and a bill to abolish the public service commission.
