INDIAN WHO HAD HISTORIC MISSION IN ALASKA DIES

(By Associated Press.) DOUGLAS, Alaska, July 5.—Dick Morgan, an Indian who died recently, was a historic character of Alaska. He was recalled by the Rev. A. P. Kasseharoff, of Juneau.

Morgan, whom the United States naval authorities had employed as a policeman nearly 50 years ago, was sent with a message from Captain L. A. Boersha to settle differences that had arisen between the Kockwastahn and Gannadi tribes north of Sitka.

Morgan informed the chiefs of the warring factions that they were to preserve order and to permit the white men to go through the Yukon passes.

Morgan returned February 12, 1889, with word to Captain Boersha that the Indian factions would remain peaceful and that the white men could

enter the country without fear. As a result of this policy the Chilkat country was opened to miners.

MODIFICATIONS MADE IN DISEASE EMBARGO

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

SALEM, Ore., July 2.—Governor Pierce today signed a proclamation making extensive modifications in the foot and mouth disease quarantine against California and in effect adopting the modifications recommended by the Reno conference. The movements permitted from California into Oregon are from territory that has been free from the disease at all times or for a period of the last 60 days. All commodities, animals or products coming in must be under federal certificate.

The new order removes the fumigation requirement from fruits and vegetables and takes the ban off greenhouse products. Wool and hides are allowed to be shipped into Oregon. The order allows sheep from California to move through Oregon, but there probably will be no traffic of this kind since the sheep go in the other direction.

All livestock within a 15 mile zone south of the California-Oregon boundary are allowed to come in if they have been in that zone for the last 30 days and have passed federal inspection. Dogs and cats are allowed to come if dipped.

A new restriction made by the order is that it keeps out of this state dressed carcasses of all animals and vaccines and veterinary biologics manufactured in California. Heretofore these have been permitted.

Train and automobile fumigation is removed, but auto inspection is still required.

Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, received a telegram from Arizona officials today saying that state would adopt the Reno ratifications on Monday, July 7, and that it has stopped automobile and train fumigation.

MOTOR CARS LINE UP FOR 250 MILE RACE AT KANSAS CITY

KANSAS CITY, July 3.—(A. P.)—With 16 automobile drivers entered in the 250 mile national championship classic here July 4, motor racing interest in America will focus on Kansas City. Virtually all of the famous drivers will be entered.

Indications are that the race will be the most exciting ever seen in competition between the Duesenbergs, Millers and Durant teams. Duesenberg surprised many motor fans in the racing world at Indianapolis this year when the car won the 500 mile race, although it failed to make a showing in the Altoona 250 mile race, June 14.

The world's speed record of 116 miles an hour is held by Harlan Ferguson, youthful Kansas City driver, hung up at Los Angeles last February in dry cool weather. Ferguson's three stood up well under the grind and he made the entire distance without a stop.

The average at Altoona June 14 was 114 miles an hour, although it is believed a wet track was partly responsible for the slower time.

According to history, Weinfelder in 1512 was a town of some 1000 inhabitants. There was an epidemic of smallpox which removed all excepting a few of the population. Afterward the town was visited by a fire which destroyed everything excepting the stones which formed the walls of the houses. Later there were wars and armies swept through these parts and in time the site of the village was covered with earth and shrubbery and trees.

Some years ago the forest was cut down and peasants began tilling the fields over the site of the old village which is supposed to have had the curse of an evil spirit cast upon it because of outrages committed upon neighbors by some of the robber villagers who made their headquarters in Weinfelder.

ONE IN EVERY 200 BRITISHERS CALLED MENTALLY DEFICIENT

LONDON, July 5.—More than 150,000 persons in Great Britain, or one in every 200, are mentally deficient, Minister of Health Wheatley declared in an address at a conference here. Referring to the number of such persons confined in prisons for various offenses, he said that he had wondered "whether the person who sent the mentally defective person to be punished for something which he did, and could not avoid doing, was not himself a fit subject for care."

"If a person is not gifted by God with the power of resisting evil," the minister concluded, "it is a question whether we, who have been gifted with that power, are entitled to punish that person in the light of our understanding."

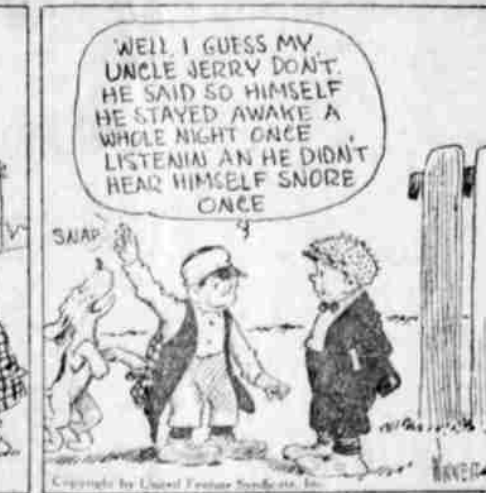
