Douglas County saddle horses, which was won by Geo. Clayton's Shamrock in 55 seconds. E. G. Young's Tickle-grass was a close second and R. Neely's Ruby was a long third. Each horse had the lead at different stages of the event, and it was any horse's race up to the last 300 yards.

Two Shetland ponies ran a corks of a quarter-mile dash, and barely a half a hand separated them at the finish. Sparkle, owned by Hiram Powell, carried his young lady rider to victory, over his rival Billy, owned by Johnny Walker. Don Rowe's Mickey, the third entrant, was badly distanced.

In the baseball game that preceded the races, Rice Hill drubbed Dillard by the score of 8 to 1.

A thousand or more spectators who assembled for the scheduled wrestling bout between Ralph Hand, of Cottage Grove, and Ted Thye, of Portland, were disappointed at Thye's unexplained failure to appear, but the crowd was well pleased at the contest which took place instead, between Hand and Ray McCarroll, the Pendleton heavyweight grappler, who outwrestled the Cottage Grove man about 20 pounds.

McCarroll captured the first fall with a tie hold in 26 minutes, and Hand won the match by taking the next two falls, with wristlocks, the first in four minutes, the final one in 3 minutes. This was the fourth bout between the men and Hand's first victory over the Pendleton bulldogger. Their third battle occurred at Cottage Grove two nights ago, with a fall to the credit of each. McCarroll won the match in three minutes by stunning Hand with an accidental kick over his right eye during a scrimmage. Last night's affair at Oakland was a clean, fast contest in which both men showed plenty of speed and skill, and the delighted crowd gave them many a round of applause.

Preliminary to the wrestling, Bud Riley, 160, of Cottage Grove, and Bill Poole, 165, the 20-year-old "Striding" of Monroe, Oregon, boxed six rounds to a draw. It was apparent that over a longer route the

semi-bald headed Riley would have gone to the canvas before the heavier and more rugged youth. The ring veteran's year of experience and better knowledge of the game enabled him to make the short grade. Avoiding long range slugging, Riley resorted to infighting and clinching throughout the battle, at which the crowd frequently expressed displeasure. Riley ended the first round with a bloody ear, and in the second he nearly went through the ropes. He battled on gamely, however, and in the fifth he checked Poole with two stiff jolts to the face. In the final round, the milling was more open and at the finish both fighters were bleeding at the nose and very tired.

The spacious dancing pavilion did a capacity business until long past midnight, and the grounds generally were a scene of the fullest enjoyment unmarred by any unpleasant disturbances. Throughout the entire day the very best of order was maintained, a matter greatly to the credit of the Gobbler and the officers who assisted them. This is a noteworthy fact considering that it was the first affair of any magnitude to be pulled off by the Gobbler and they had as their guests by far the largest throng of people ever assembled in Oakland. Estimates of the attendance ranged as high as 6,000, based largely on the report of a traffic officer that between 1500 and 2000 automobiles alone went through the entrance gates.

Today's program will consist of a baseball game between Rice Hill and Cottage Grove, another good batch of horse races, band concert and dancing.

of the veterans of the county will be able to find such witnesses at the Armory, but newcomers, or persons who are not well known, may have to make provision for such witnesses.

It is necessary for the applicant to be able to furnish the date of entrance into service and date of discharge, and his army or navy serial number. All applications will be checked against the service record at Washington, D. C.

The local post is very anxious to have every veteran in Douglas county present on one of the two nights, as every effort will be put forth to get in all applications from this county at that time. Veterans should keep in mind that applications must be made through the American Legion, so should arrange to be present.

The bonus bill provides that veterans shall receive credit for their service at the rate of \$1 per day for home service and \$1.25 per day for foreign service, excluding the first 60 days for which a bonus has already been granted. The minimum payment is

All who had less than 50 days service over and above the first 60 days, will receive their bonus in cash, but others will receive an insurance policy, which roughly estimated will be about two and one-half times the amount of credit given for service. This compensation certificate, will have a loan value of about 90 per cent after the second year.
