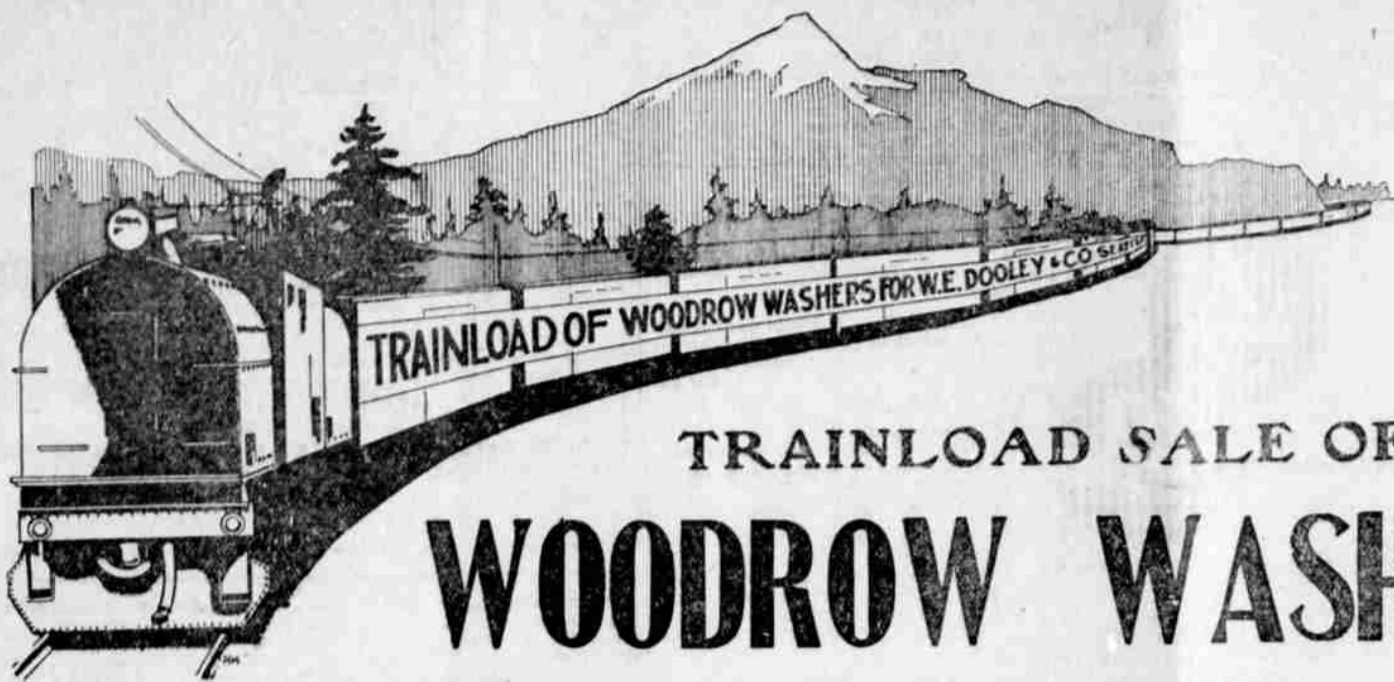

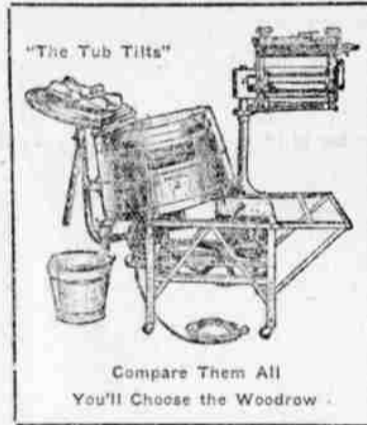

SCIENCE HUNTS TRACE OF MAN IN MONGOLIA

Having established to their own satisfaction the fact that man existed 600,000 years ago, scientists will now attempt to trace his origin back another million years.

Led by Roy Chapman Andrews, who returned from Asia a year ago with a nest of 28 dinosaur eggs ten million years old, another expedition sailed from the United States May 25th for China. Thence the party will proceed into the heart of the Gobi desert, in Mongolia, where it is hoped a five-year search will reveal further amazing secrets concerning the early life of man, beast and reptile.

As in the previous expedition, the scientists will rely on American-built motor cars and trucks for transportation, although roads are unknown in most of the vast territory to be explored. Mr. Andrews recently visited Dodge Brothers factory in Detroit, where five cars were being equipped for the expedition. Mr. Andrews expressed great satisfaction with the new equipment and repeated that he attributed a great share of the success of his last memorable expedition to the remarkable endurance of Dodge Brothers cars. Fifteen scientists representing twelve branches of learning, chosen from 4,000 applicants constitute the party.

While scientists differ on the subject, especially since the discovery of the 600,000 year old Foxhill man in England, Mr. Andrews is of the belief that man evolved in Asia and that it will be in the younger rocks of Mongolia, if anywhere, that traces of his first activities will be found. He is strongly supported in this theory by such an eminent scientist as Henry Fairfield Osborn who was referred to by William Jennings Bryan, in their famous debate on evolution, as "a tall professor who comes down out of the trees to push good people who believe in God off the sidewalk."

"When we found the ten-million-year-old dinosaur eggs, we were examining rocks older than humanity," said Mr. Andrews. "But now we are going to the rocks where human remains are more likely to exist. It is a gamble, but we think the prospects justify gambling."

In their quest the scientists will push farther west than they have ever gone before, working both to the north and the south of the Altai mountains. As the beginning of exploration will be made about 1,000 miles from the nearest base, Kalgan, it will be necessary to organize with especial care. Arrangements have been made for 200 camels to carry provisions ahead of the motor trucks.

BARK PEELERS ARE ATTACKED BY COUGAR

MARSHFIELD, Ore., July 5.—(United Press.)—A vicious fight with a cougar by campers armed only with an axe was recounted in stories reaching here from the mountains where many vacationists are spending their holidays.

Earl Laskey, Joe Laskey and Melvin Olson, chittim bark peelers, fought the animal off while it tore at Olson's knapsack to get at the food he carried.

The Laskeys were down in a canyon searching for water and a camping place while Olson rested on a log with the pack on his back. Without warning the big cat sprang from the darkness upon the spot where the odor of meat emanated. Olson fought with the animal and was getting the worst of it when the Laskeys, alerted by their comrade's cries, came to the rescue and beat off the famished animal.

The cougar, which is a notoriously cowardly beast unless famished, had been following the trio for several miles in the darkness, they reported. Several times they saw his fiery eyes gazing at them from underbrush. Apparently he chose the moment for attack when he saw Olson alone and apparently helpless.

Many cougar have been seen in the higher levels this year, according to reports received here, but this is the first instance of attack reported so far.

TISDALE RESIGNS AS TREASURER OF SUTHERLIN

Charles H. Tisdale, who has been treasurer of the city of Sutherlin the past several years, has handed in his resignation, and the matter will come before the city council at its regular meeting on Saturday night, July 5, says the Sutherlin Sun.

Mr. Tisdale has also sent in his resignation as clerk of the school board, which position he has held for several years and to which he was reelected at the annual school meeting held two weeks ago.

These resignations are due to the fact that it will be necessary for Mr. Tisdale to be in Portland during the next several months on business connected with the settlement of the estate of his father-in-law, the late E. C. Johnson, he having been named in the will as executor. During his absence E. E. Humphrey will fill his place as cashier at the First State Bank.

Mr. Tisdale has proved a most efficient and capable treasurer of the city and clerk of the school board, and that he finds it necessary to resign these positions is regretted by all.

KANSAS NATURAL GAS MAY BE REPLENISHED BY DEPOSITS OF SHALE

NEEDHAM, Kans., July 5.—Natural gas experts and users of the product who have felt apprehension over the possible failure of sand gas wells, see in the development of the shale gas industry hope that perhaps for another generation or longer the supply will be bountiful.

When the great natural gas fields in this section began to show exhaustion, oil men as well as the people saw the impending return to other fields. In 1923 several practical gas men began to discuss the possibilities of developing what are known as shale gas or brown lime gas wells on a commercial scale. These men recalled that at various places in this section there were small gas wells which had been producing steadily ever since they were drilled. But the gas from these wells was wet. How to com-

mercialize the product by finding a method of separating the water from the gas became the question.

A group of Needham men organized to handle the new industry on a large scale. The company leased hundreds of acres of land in this vicinity and drilling operations were started. Wells were drilled with great success, and the men insisted they contained little of the superfluous wet in drilling for sand gas. In addition they said, there are gas-bearing shales drilled will have remarkable longevity. The industrial potential of lime gas is a large factor.

The source of shale gas remains unexplained, although the U. S. Bureau of Mines has advanced the theory that the gas, which is produced in concentrating the shale and salt water below the Oswego limes, is absorbed in the water and carried away thousands of miles. The large amount of gas absorbed by the water is given as the reason for the fact that the gas does not decrease when being drawn upon. The bur-

geo believes that null many thousands of wells have been drilled, the decrease of the shale gas supply will not be appreciable.

Approximately 500 wells are producing shale gas, some of them through plugs, some outside of the tubing, and others through apparatus leased for farmers use. Many of them have produced consistently for upward of 20 years.

Shale gas comes from the tubing a perfect mixture of water and gas. It is received into a standing separator, the gas going out of the top and the water returning to a connection at the bottom of the separator, through a pipe line, thence into the big hole between the drive pipe and tubing. Chemical tests show that shale gas contains 95.2 percent methane and ethane and practically no nitrogen or oxygen, which are noncombustible gases.

The lime gas contains, at 80 degrees Fahrenheit and at eight-pound pressure, 850 to 900 BTU's (British Thermal Units). This con-

tent is higher than that of many sand gases, which fact is pointed out as a cash by its value as a domestic or industrial fuel.
