PORTLAND, Ore., July 27.—Driving along the base line road near here early this morning, Herbert C. Cronkhite reported to the police he found a woman lying by the side of the road, dazed and complaining that her head was hurt. He lifted her into his car, he said, and was starting toward Portland when three men drove up in another car, seized the woman, forced her into their car, and drove away.

HIGH SCORES AT TRAPSHOOT

Portland Men Drop Only Two
Birds Out of Possible 150
at Meet Saturday.

LONG RUNS MADE

Walt Cordon and Frank Troeh
Break 117 Birds Each
Without Miss—Coquille
Makes Good Score.

The second day of the registered shoot held by the Roseburg Rod and Gun club on July 4 and 5, was a decided success, with an attendance as large as on the first day. Several of the shooters developed sore shoulders from the prolonged firing of the two days, and did not participate in all of the events, but practically all entered in the 150-bird event, which was the feature of the day. Charles Nash and Frank Troeh, both of Portland, were high men in this shoot, each breaking 148 birds. Troeh and Walt Cordon, the latter of Roseburg, made exceptionally long runs of 117 birds.

E. Graham of Coquille, who finished first in the July 4 shoot, was a close third in the firing Saturday, knocking down 147 clay pigeons. The Coquille squad was again among the leaders, being beaten only by one picked squad, made up of the high men picked from among the list of Class A shooters.

Mrs. Gus Knight, of San Bernardino, who was shooting against her husband, and who beat him in both the 150 event and the handicap on the first day was defeated Saturday in both events, but made an excellent score.
