SMITH LEADS MADDOO IN FIGHT

Best Record Since Start
Reached by McAdoo Today
When Total Is 310.

STON BOOM BREAKS

For in Third Place With
Votes as Convention
Adjourns on the 93rd
Ballot of Meet.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

ROSE SQUARE GARDEN, July 8.—Six more futile today—bringing its total to 310—of the democratic national convention adjourning for a six hour session in the hope of finding a way through the whirlpool of lines continued to disintegrate the day's balloting. Gov. Smith's forces held fast and discussed and looked for movement for Senator Ralston actually developed on the floor. The word went out to flop votes for Ralston and in total votes his place had risen to 310 with a total of 196-4.

McAdoo numbers were hampered today during the balloting to a new low record votes—the lowest point in the fortunes ever have touched the convention began. They were a bit however, on the list of the day and stood at the convention adjourned. The Smith vote closed at 310-4 of its highest mark at the balloting.

McAdoo's forces had suffered from the close of last balloting and today's opening vote, closed well toward a new low standing at 68. Sen. Ralston, beginning at a figure of 196-4, closed at 196-4. The day's balloting was a struggle for the Ralston boom.

UNITED STATES IS FIRST IN OLYMPICS

Third Day of International Contest
Sees American Athletes in
First Place With a
Wide Margin.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

OLYMPIC STADIUM, Colombes, France, July 8.—Making a clean sweep of the first three places in the shotput and sending the stars and stripes up three stadium masts for the first time, the United States today swept into a commanding lead for the Olympic track and field championships. The twenty one points gained in this event ran the total for America up to 98 or nearly double Finland's total of 54.

The French public is not turning out in large numbers for the Olympic games and only about 2,000 spectators were present just before the opening of the third day's competition. The majority were foreigners. The weather today was sultry.

Finland's emblem was run up the Olympic pole as the opening ceremony of the day in honor of Lehtonen's victory in the Pentathlon last night, when the games were finished under sundown, too late for the flag raising ceremony under the Olympic flag.

Clarence Houser, the California collegian gave the United States its second successive triumph in the field events of the day by winning the shotput after DeHart Hubbard, of the University of Michigan had captured the broad jump, while Glen Hartranft of Leland Stanford, and Ralph Hills of Princeton took second and third places, and Norman Anderson of the University of Southern California fifth place in the terrific battle of the shotput giants.

Torpedo, of Finland, was fourth in the shotput and Nicklander, another Finn was sixth but Perhola, the Olympic champion, was unplugged. Houser's winning toss was 49 ft. 2 inches.

CAL COOLIDGE, JR. DIES LAST NIGHT

Brave Struggle Against Acute
Blood Poisoning Ends at
10:30 Yesterday.

FOUGHT TO THE LAST

Slight Injury Received Last
Monday Slowly Grew
Worse Until Death
Defeated Science.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—The White House, scene of many nation's sorrows, again became the house of mourning today, while the whole American people, it seemed, poured in their messages of sympathy at the death of President Coolidge's 16 year old boy, Calvin, Jr. Not since Lincoln's time had such a youthful member of a president's family been called by death and never under more tragic circumstances.

From the time young Calvin died at 10:30 o'clock last night at Walter Reed Army Hospital, all through the forenoon and afternoon messages came to the stricken parents in their first great sorrow.

Callers left a word of sympathy and tributes to the plucky, but always losing fight the boy waged against death.

A flag at half mast on the White House and a white crepe token of mourning on the door told of the bereavement within. Around the casket a detachment of sailors and marines from the presidential yacht, Mayflower stood guard.

Floral tributes in great numbers were banked about.

President Coolidge bore up well with his grief and friends of the family said they had been no sign of a break down by Mrs. Coolidge. Both were careworn after sleepless nights spent with their son.

John Coolidge, with whom Calvin was playing tennis when he sustained the tiny injury that caused his death, remained with his mother.

Lieutenant Edgar Allan Poe of the marines with the six marine standing guard around the casket, will accompany the funeral party and the guard will act as pallbearers. President Coolidge went to the executive office and for a short time early today and was visited there by many officials and others who wished to extend their sympathy.

Tentative plans for the funeral of Calvin Coolidge, Jr., were under consideration today to include a simple service at the White House at 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, the body then to be taken to Northampton, Mass., the Coolidge home, where another service will be held, with burial Thursday at Plymouth, Vermont, where the president was born.

WASHINGTON, July 8.—Death once more cast its shadow today over the White House, claiming Calvin Coolidge, Jr., 16 year old son of the president.

A courageous struggle of five days that stood off the final claim of acute blood poisoning to the utmost ended last night. The younger son of the president to which he was removed last Saturday that every resource of medical science might be invoked to save his life.

Wasted in strength by the ravaging disease of septic poisoning that resulted from an almost unnoticed blister on his foot, developed while playing tennis a week ago, the youth fought a futile battle throughout yesterday. Losing ground steadily, he yet amazed his physicians by the tenacity with which he clung to the slender thread of life and his fortitude under the complications that attended the spread of the treacherous disease, he collapsed early in the night and death occurred at 10:30 o'clock.

FILIPINO SCOUTS ARE HELD BY GOVERNMENT

MANILA, July 8.—Twenty-three alleged leaders of a secret clique formed among the Philippine Scouts to advance demonstrations for allowances and pay equal to those given to white soldiers, were arrested at Fort McKinley today.

Eight were arrested previously. The twenty-three were held for investigation. These leaders are understood to have planned a demonstration for August second when they intended, military authorities say, to present a petition for increased pay and allowances to Government-General Leonard Wood and the commanding officer of the Philippine war department of the army.

LATE WIRE NEWS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PARIS, July 8.—A compromise plan for continuing the reparations committee in control of execution of the Dawes plan will be proposed to Prime Minister MacDonald of Great Britain by Premier Herriot when the French and British Premiers meet this afternoon. It is stated. The reparations commission under this arrangement would decide whether Germany was in default, but a separate body would be created to determine whether default was voluntary.

A note explaining the French attitude on reparations which Premier Herriot drafted in collaboration with his advisers, was approved by the cabinet today. After being presented to Mr. MacDonald it will be sent to the various allied powers.

MC MINNVILLE, Ore., July 8.—The republican state central committee will meet in Portland on July 19, according to notices sent out by Walter L. Toole, Jr., state chairman of the committee. The morning session will be devoted to the appointment of committee including the credentials and rules committees.

The election of officers and reports of committees will probably take place at the afternoon meeting. Indications point to the selection of Senator L. L. Paterson of Boise, manager of the Oregon Coolidge campaign, as chairman of the new committee according to Toole. He stated that reports reaching him from all parts of the state showed the selection of Paterson would meet the approval of republicans generally.

PORTLAND, July 8.—The five naval seaplanes engaged in a flight up the Pacific coast to the Sand Point, Wash., aviation field, will leave here Friday morning on the last leg of the trip.

The airplane tender Aroostook and her five charges reached Portland by relay Sunday and yesterday after contending with bad weather most of the way up the coast.

SACRAMENTO, Calif., July 8.—Declaring that with the fire which early today destroyed the grammar school at Woodland, Yolo county, early today, school fire losses in California since December 1923 has aggregated one million dollars. Will C. Wood, state superintendent of public instruction, today issued an urgent warning to school authorities to guard their schools at night.

Mr. Wood said that nearly all the blazes appeared to have been of incendiary origin, he expressed the belief that the fire was the work of an arsonist moving about the state or an organized arson ring.

LA GRANDE, Ore., July 8.—Tom Hodson, held on larceny charges and Verne Small, serving a sentence for violation of the prohibition laws, escaped from the city jail here last night. Officers started a search for the two men.

WOMEN CHARGED HAVING BOOZE

Mrs. Martha Fate and Daughter,
Fern Nye, Accused
of Possessing Liquor.

MAN IS ALSO ACCUSED

Woman Claims Informant
Was Actuated by Jealousy
—Sheriff Calls Off
Convention Trip.

Sheriff Sam Starmer has definitely determined that he will not attend the reunion of Spanish American War Veterans at Grants Pass next week.

Mrs. Fern Nye, who occupied a cell in the county jail for an extended period recently is back in custody on a charge of having liquor in her possession.

The two above statements may appear absolutely irrelevant and disconnected, but such is not the case. They are closely related and are wonderful examples of the application of the rule of cause and effect. And thereby hangs a tale.

Next week the Spanish American War Veterans are holding a convention in Grants Pass. Sheriff Starmer is one of the veterans who helped teach Spain a healthy respect for the American flag and until today had every intention of attending the coming convention. He was even a candidate for initiation into the Order of Serpents, the humorous branch of the veteran organization.

Mrs. Fern Nye and her mother, Martha Fate, reside on a small ranch in the Days Creek district. Several months ago officers found several quarts of intoxicating liquor in the farm home and took Mrs. Nye to the county jail to reside temporarily. She made her home behind the barred windows for a short period of time when officers became convinced that the unsanitary condition of the house was not conducive to the health of female inhabitants and ordered her release.

According to information gathered from official sources a young man named A. F. James obtained employment at the Nye home. For some reason he became angered and last night gave the officers information that there was a quantity of liquor on the place. A raid was made and Sheriff Starmer and his deputies found 6 cases, each containing 24 quarts of home-made beer and 10 gallons of wine, together with several other bottles of liquor.

Further inquiry aroused a statement that the liquor had been prepared to furnish added fireworks for the Spanish American War Veterans convention and was being prepared in the hope that a ready sale might be found among the veterans who, having once tasted the concoctions prepared by the natives in the Philippines are fortified to try anything once.

With these facts in mind it is perfectly logical to explain the reason why Sheriff Starmer has declared his intention of remaining at home during the reunion of Uncle Sam's former embattled beef eaters next week.

A complaint charging Martha Fate and Fern Nye with possession of liquor was filed in the local justice court this afternoon.

It is understood that a complaint is also being made by the women against the young man. According to the story told by them to the officers, James assumed improper relations with the minor daughter of Mrs. Nye and was aroused to give his information concerning the liquor by jealousy when she turned from his advances. This side of the story is being investigated by officers and it is possible that a complaint will be filed against the young man also. It is alleged that Mrs. Nye also refused to surrender a check claimed by James, holding it as security for his board during the time he was at the farm. The case is being probed thoroughly by officers before any action is taken.

CAT SAVES LIVES

CITY PURCHASES STUTZ ENGINE

1200-Gallon Pumper Bought
at Meeting of City Council
Last Night.

COMPANY'S BID \$14,444

Includes Additional Equipment and Many Extras;
Four Close Bids
Are Submitted.

A triple-combination, 1200-gallon, 225 horsepower Stutz fire engine was purchased by the city of Roseburg last night after considering the close proposals of four of the largest manufacturers of fire apparatus in the United States, and two bids on additional fire equipment. The Stutz engine which the city has ordered is to be delivered in about 30 days, and is one of the biggest and best engines made, and with the additional equipment will cost the city \$14,444.

Bids were submitted by the Ahrens-Fox company, Seagraves company, American La France company, and the Stutz company. In addition bids were received from the Elkhart Brass manufacturing company and S. B. Crouch on the additional equipment needed to bring the fire department up to standard.

After considering the various proposals submitted, the city council decided that the 1200-gallon Stutz pumper was the best buy and entered into a contract for the purchase of this equipment.

The machine is a combination fire pump, hose cart and chemical engine, forming the "triple combination." It has a pumping capacity of 1200 gallons of water per minute operating on a ten foot lift, or in other words drawing water up an elevation of 10 feet from a reservoir. Pumping from a hydrant, it is increased. This capacity can be increased. The hose bed carries 1500 feet of hose, while most fire engines carry only 1200 feet. The horsepower of the engine is rated at 225, while other machines seldom give more than 140 horsepower.

The specifications given in the contract are as follows:

Gasoline system—Gravity feed. Clutch—Dry Multiple Disc. Steering—Screw and nut steering gear—22 in. wheel, irreversible. Transmission—Selective type, 3 speeds forward, 1 reverse. Front axle—"I" beam construction. Rear axle—Specially designed worm drive type.

Service brake—Internal expanding bands on rear wheel. Emergency brake—Internal expanding bands on rear wheel. Wheels—Artillery. Tires—40 in. x 8 in. pneumatic. Wheel base—175 in., tread 62 in. front, 72 in. rear.
