AL SMITH LEADS McADOO IN FIGHT

parts of the hall and amid shouts of "sit down," and "throw him out" the motion was ruled out on a point of order.

As the 53rd ballot was being completed negotiations were on for an adjournment until 9 o'clock tonight with a conference in the meantime to which the others hoped to get the McAdoo people. Empty chairs were being voted all over the convention hall on this ballot. As the calling of the ballot went on word came that the adjournment plan with time for a conference in the meantime had been agreed to by the leaders.

At the end of the 57th ballot, after which the convention adjourned last night as an expression of sympathy to President and Mrs. Coolidge in the death of their son, McAdoo strength had been cut to 224 votes leaving him short, temporarily at least, of his one-third veto power over the nomination of any one candidate and 25 votes behind Governor Alfred E. Smith.

The Smith total fluctuated between 360 and 368 throughout the day and stood at 361 at the finish, while that of Senator Ralston, of Indiana, put back into the dark horse ranks despite his insistence upon maintaining his withdrawal, was pushed up from five on the 18th ballot to 95 on the 87th. Senator Glass of Virginia, also given a "run," climbed from 21 to 78, held third place for a few ballots and wound up fourth with 71. Senators Ralston and Glass, both passed John W. Davis, whose totals slowly declined from 764 Saturday night to 684.

The offensive against the McAdoo line began during the day yesterday as a sequel of the concord reached by the representatives of the other 15 candidates Sunday in releasing their supporters and recommending the action taken by the convention after several more futile ballots freeing all delegates from pledges and instructions. Before the drive and the McAdoo column had lost Mississippi, Missouri, Kansas, Iowa, Oklahoma and Nevada, this total had been brought down 1794 votes from its Saturday closing point, and 874 less than it was at the beginning.

The Smith captains made no great effort to build up their strength, being content to hold their own with striking distance of the veto power, the delegations lost by McAdoo went in the main to Senators Ralston and Glass, Governor Jonathan Davis, of Kansas, Edward T. Meredith, of Iowa, and Governor Ritchie of Maryland—favorite son stopping places apparently until they made up their minds along with the other undecided delegations.

Called to order at 11 o'clock, today's session began with an invocation by the Rev. Francis Potter of the Westside Unitarian church, New York City, followed by the singing of the Star Spangled Banner by the Japanese opera star, Madame Tamaki Miura. A resolution expressing the grief of Calvin Coolidge, Jr., was offered by Rabbi Stephen A. Wise on behalf of Franklin D. Roosevelt and was adopted by a rising vote.

The convention started its day's work with the 88th ballot. In North Carolina on today's first roll call McAdoo suffered a loss of a dozen votes when the state went almost solidly to Josephus Daniels.

Total for 88th ballot. McAdoo 315; Smith 362; Davis W. V., 594; Underwood 39; Glass 664; Ralston 98; Robinson 23; Ritchie 22; Davis of Kansas 20; Walsh 5; Saulsbury 6; Owen 20; Meredith 26; Daniels 23; Bryan 9; Roosevelt 1. Total 1,996. Absent.

On the next roll call McAdoo got back some of the votes he just lost. Franklin Roosevelt, field marshal for the Smith forces, issued a statement declaring the delegates now released that McAdoo never could be nominated and were convinced also that Smith is "the logical man."

Issuance of Roosevelt's statement forestalled the various futile attempts of the compromise candidate promoters to get some of the Smith delegations to break to Ralston.

Senator Pat Harrison of Mississippi circulated under the direction of Taggart among delegates urging them to "get on the band wagon."

Everywhere, however, Smith men said they were going to stay with the governor.

This announced, the Smith forces coupled with the determination of the McAdoo forces to stick by their man, rather non-pulsed the compromise camps.

A poll of the Oklahoma delegation resulted in ten votes for Owen and seven and a half for Ralston, with the remainder of the delegation absent. Under the unit rule the states twenty votes were cast for Owen. After a poll, Kansas went solidly to Ralston on the 91st ballot.

The Ohio delegates after a poll reported 16 for Ralston and 194 for Smith with the rest scattering.
