SOCIALISTS HAVE NO NATIONAL TICKET

(Associated Press United Wire.)
 CLEVELAND, Ohio, July 8.—Adjustment of the affairs of the Socialist party of America to the lack, for the first time in its history, of a national ticket, occupied the sessions here today of the party's 1924 convention. This condition resulted from the action of the party's executive committee last night with the conference for progressive political action in endorsing Senator Robert M. La Follette as a presidential candidate on his own platform. It was indicated, however, that while this action precludes nominations by the Socialist party, it did not prevent it from adopting a platform just as the conference for political action voted itself a structure of economic plans after endorsing La Follette's stand. Whether the Socialists would take this action was to be decided today by the resolutions committee. A statement of principles was presented by that committee yesterday, but it was explained that this was only a partial report. There was nothing in it either to arouse discussion or to proceed to be a re-statement in more concise form, of the principles used as a basis for party propaganda for several years past.

Election of a national executive committee of seven members and as many alternates was also on the program.

Eugene V. Debs was elected national chairman of the socialist convention, a new office, by the national convention of the party. Debs will continue his activities with the national executive committee. Debs was given the new place by acclamation after Morris Hillquit, New York, had explained that the federal election laws required the election of such an office.

- All of the bids received were quite close. The Ahrens-Fox company, represented by the Pacific Fire Extinguisher Company, really had the lowest bid. This company offered a 1,000 gallon pumper for \$13,300, with a 5 per cent discount for cash in ten days. They offered a 6 cylinder 750 gallon pumper for \$690 less, and a 4 cylinder 750 gallon pumper for \$1,000 less. Their 6 cylinder engine, with which the 1,000 gallon pumper is equipped is rated at 110 horsepower. They promised delivery in 60 working days. They also submitted a bid of

\$1,654.55 on the additional equipment.

The Elkhart Brass Manufacturing company put in a bid of \$1,238.50 on the additional equipment with a 2 per cent discount for cash, and by a combination of bids, accepting the Ahrens-Fox engine with the discount, and the Elkhart Brass Manufacturing Company bid with the discount on the equipment, the Stutz proposal was bettered, but the council in considering the reserve power offered by the Stutz 225 horsepower engine and the larger pumping capacity and hose bed and the quicker delivery, decided upon the Stutz offer.

The Seagraves company offered their 1,000 gallon pumper for \$13,500 and their 750 gallon pumper for \$13,000, and made a bid of \$1,200 on the additional equipment, with a 50 working day delivery guarantee.

The American-La France Company, through the A. G. Long Company, distributors, made an offer of \$13,500 on their 100 gallon pumper and \$13,000 on their 750 gallon engine, and included a bid of \$1,710 on the equipment with a discount of \$710 provided the equipment and truck were taken together.

The proposal made by the Howard Cooper corporation for the Stutz people was \$13,194 for the 750 gallon pumper, 125 horsepower; \$13,944 for the 750 gallon 140 horsepower engine; \$14,444 for the 1,000 gallon, 140 horsepower pumper and \$14,444 for the 1,200, 225 horsepower machine. These prices included the additional equipment.

A bid of \$1,558.50 was submitted by S. B. Crough on the additional apparatus.

After all of the bids were submitted Mayor Rice gave each of the representatives of the various companies ten minutes each in which to present any matters connected with their apparatus. The representatives drew straws to decide the order in which they should speak and each then endeavored to convince the council of the merits of his respective apparatus. After the oratory was over the council went into executive session to consider the proposals.

One feature of the Stutz contract which attracted the council was the early delivery date. It is promised to deliver the machine to the railroad company at the factory in Indianapolis within 15 days. During those 15 days the machine will be given its final finishing in the way of painting and lettering, brackets will be made and placed to carry the equipment ordered by the city, and the additional supplies provided placed on the truck. This should make the date of final delivery not later than 30 days. This will bring the machine here early in August when it will be badly needed.

Ray Nelson, the Howard-Cooper corporation representative, spent today arranging the final details of the contract, and agreed to furnish a soft suction hose in addition to the other equipment. This soft suction hose is used in pumping from a hydrant, the hard suction hose being used in pumping from a reservoir or river. Mr. Nelson states that the motor which the Stutz apparatus is now using is the same valve-in-head radial type, which won the recent Memorial Day contest at the Indianapolis show.

Members of the city council who have seen this Stutz apparatus in operation are well pleased with the way the bids came in and with the city's purchase. This machine is practically vibrationless, they state, and when pumping at almost full capacity there is scarcely a quiver to the machine. A committee of the council recently made a trip to Birmingham to see the demonstration given by the Stutz company where a machine of the type bought by the city was fully demonstrated for their benefit.

COUNTY PAYS FOR UMPQUA ROAD WORK

The county court is today scraping the bottom of three road funds in an effort to dig up enough money to make the final payment on the Butler section of the Scottsburg-Rosedale road. In spite of the efforts to make the payment the county is still \$4,000 short and is making a payment of only \$28,982 although the government asked for \$40,000. Additional taxes coming in are expected to make up the amount necessary to match the government. This section which the bureau of public roads is doing is practically complete and the county is now being asked to make the final settlement, which is estimated at \$40,000. Special tax money, market road funds, and general road money are being used to make up the payment.

TWO SMALL FOREST FIRES REPORTED

Two small forest fires were reported to be burning on the Umpqua National forest today. A class B fire of about 12 acres was reported in the Quarrs mountain district on railroad land, the location being known as the George Williams place. The fire started yesterday morning, apparently man-caused and spread rapidly in green timber. Firemen Brooks was dispatched to the scene with a crew of eight men and reported the fire under control today. The blaze covered about 12 acres, it was reported. Another small fire was "pegged" on Drew Creek in the South Umpqua district at 11:29 this morning. C. F. Ritter and a crew were sent to this blaze, but it is small and will be easily handled. O. C. Houser, central fire dispatcher at Glendale, is in touch with all points of the forest by telephone and all districts are being well protected, so that it is difficult for a fire to get a very large start.
