CAL COOLIDGE, JR. DIES LAST NIGHT

(Continued from page one.)

House guest with her husband. The president and Mrs. Coolidge, who were said to have borne up bravely, went at once to their rooms and at midnight the White House was entirely darkened. John, the elder son, who had shared the ordeal of the last hours at the bedside of the brother who had been a constant companion, was in his room when his parents returned. He remained upstairs.

Those who watched the struggle of the 16-year old lad against the terrible odds of the disease which swept through his system were agreed that only a fortitude of will and cheer unusual at any age had kept him alive so long. It was on Saturday that the venomous nature of the infection was definitely disclosed. The trifling abrasion that had resulted from the blister on Monday was so little thought of that he had appeared that night with his father at the public budget meeting of government officials where he saw much to smile and jest about with his elder brother.

By Wednesday, however, the onslaught of the infection had commenced and on Saturday, in a plain ambulance, with his mother at his side, Calvin Jr., was hastened to Walter Reed hospital, outside of Washington, for an operation which it was hoped might reduce to a new focus the bacteria which were building in the tissues of his leg.

The operation was successful, in that it established a drain for accumulating septic matter. Although the youth showed a slight improvement after it, he was said by his physicians to have really been sustained in his repeated rallying from an almost hopeless progress of the disease by his determination to live and his refusal to yield.

It was shortly after 6 p. m. that the collapse came and he lapsed out of consciousness. At that time a military guard had been thrown about the quarters assigned for the care of the boy and through this the only meagre news obtained was that brought out at infrequent intervals by E. T. Clark, the president's personal secretary. With oxygen and restoratives, his attendants were holding some glow of the spark of life in his wasted frame, but with no hope. At eight o'clock it was announced that he was dying, but it was not until two hours and a half later that the physicians pronounced the end.

The boy's courage met the test many times when it was required that he submit to pain in the operation of blood tests, the use of hypodermics, and finally the stomach washing as a last resort to make the taking of nourishment possible when the accumulation of gas began. It was only necessary, it was said to tell him when and where the hurt would come and it would be suffered without complaint or protest.

Messages of sympathy were received by President and Mrs. Coolidge today from persons of all lands and all walks of life. The tragic death of their son had touched the heart not only of this country, but many others who wished to convey their sympathy and condolences. Calvin Coolidge Jr., according to the White House attaches, is the first son of a president to die while his father held that office since Tal Lincoln died in his father's arms in the White House near the close of the Civil War. The death of a son of President Coolidge marks the third successive administration in which the family occupying the White House has been visited either by death or critical illness. The first wife of the former President Wilson died in the White House and later Mr. Wilson suffered there the breakdown which left him an invalid until his recent death. Services for President Harding were held in the White House after his sudden death in San Francisco. Previously Mrs. Harding had suffered a critical illness there.

At the White House this morning, Calvin Coolidge Jr., said President Coolidge was bearing up under his grief, and that there had been no break down on the part of Mrs. Coolidge. In the east room a sailor was stationed at the head of the casket and another at the foot, while a marine was on each side, all with bayonets drawn and at parade rest. The guard of 12 men stood by in alternate shifts. A few intimate friends will be invited to attend the funeral at the White House tomorrow afternoon and the funeral party will be held on Thursday morning in the Edwards Congregational church, of which Calvin was a member, at 10 o'clock. From there the party will proceed immediately to Plymouth where interment will take place at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. The family will return immediately then to Washington.

Interment will be made at the family lot in the Little Plymouth cemetery where also are buried the president's mother and sister. At the wish of the family the services will be very simple, consisting of prayers and scripture reading by Reverend Jason Noble Pierce and the singing of hymns by a quartet.

LONDON, July 8.—The death of Calvin Coolidge Jr., caused general sorrowing here not alone among the American residents, but also among the English people and in the various foreign quarters of the city. The flags on the American embassy and consulate were placed at half mast while many flags on hotels and other buildings throughout London also were half-masted. By noon, Ambassador Kellogg had received many messages of sympathy for president and Mrs. Coolidge, from British officials, foreign embassies and legations, and members of the American community.

LONDON, July 8.—King George today sent a message of condolence to President Coolidge over the death of Calvin Coolidge Jr. The monarch said in his cablegram: "The Queen and I have heard with

most sincere regret of the grievous loss which has befallen you and Mrs. Coolidge in the death of your dear son and we assure you both of our heartfelt sympathy in this time of your deep sorrow."

WASHINGTON, July 8.—Very little had been seen in Washington of the Coolidge boys, John and Calvin, since their father became president. Calvin was working on a farm in Massachusetts when President Coolidge took the oath of office. He then contended that he had a contract which he had to fulfill and he kept at his job.

During their time here between school terms, the boys played tennis a great deal on the White House courts and indulged in other sports of interest to the two healthy American youngsters. Calvin had become a great favorite with White House attaches who long ago decided that he was a "regular boy."

At the early age of 11 years, it is told of Calvin, he decided to carve out his own fortunes and induced his father, then Governor of Massachusetts to help him get a job on an onion and tobacco farm in Massachusetts. He walked three miles each morning to save carfare on this job, keeping in his mind a bike he wanted to buy.

When he had saved \$35, Calvin received his first lesson in thrift from his father, who declared that the money must be deposited in a bank. Father and son made the trip to the bank and later the father helped with advice in the bicycle purchase. The boy gave his first check in payment.

When Calvin first visited Washington during the vacation of his father's first year as vice-president, he was not so tall as his father by a head, but during the last year he had grown to be the tallest member of the White House family. He had a clean-cut pleasing face. He was a mischievous boy and a good natured tease at times.

NORTH AMPTON, Mass., July 8.—The flags of this city, home of the Coolidges were at half mast today as a mark of its sorrow over the loss of Calvin Coolidge Jr., son of the President and Mrs. Coolidge, at the same time North Ampton folk sent their personal tributes to the White House and discussed the fine qualities and traits of the boy. The city through acting Mayor Richard E. Pierce expressed in a formal message to Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge the sorrow that is in the hearts of its people. In the Coolidge home, one half of a two-family house on Massachusetts street, young Calvin's maternal grandmother, Mrs. L. A. Goodhue, was notified this morning of the death of her favorite grandson. She was not alone in her grief, because neighbors came to extend their condolences and Miss Alice Rockahn, housekeeper for the Coolidges for many years, has continued there while the family had been in Washington.

"A kindly, generous, manly boy and a quiet one," was the housekeeper's estimate of the youngster who is gone—such occasions for scolding over stolen cookies, soiled floors and tardiness at dinner having been forgotten.

Carl Norton who was Calvin's Sunday School teacher at Edwards Congregational church, saw another side of the youth. He knew what he was talking about in class, learned his lessons well but he was always up to some prank, the teacher said, adding that he was a fine type of a boy.

SMALL BOY DROWNED (Associated Press Leased Wire.) MARSHFIELD, Ore., July 4.—Lyle R. Peterson, a year old son of Ernest Peterson, was drowned today when he fell between two logs in Kentucky inlet while playing on a raft. A two year old brother tried to tell his parents of the accident, but could not be understood until it was too late to rescue the boy.

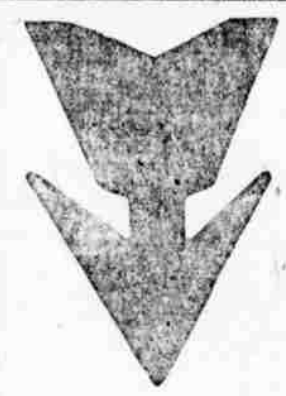
