Mr. MacDonald said the documents he had drawn up with M. Herriot constituted the joint note which explained how the Dawes plan might be settled at the inter-allied London conference, which remained for July 6. He declared there was no thought of postponing the conference.

BRIDGE SITE IS BEING SURVEYED

County Roadmaster Floyd Frear left today for Reedport where he will start the work of surveying the Mill Creek bridge site in an effort to make an estimate on the cost of the construction of a bridge at that place. The county court has been petitioned to borrow \$25,000 from the over Mill creek and to match the government on the North Umpqua road, and before borrowing desires to know exactly the sum needed to complete county house fund to build a bridge the work.
