Ore., July 10.—Mrs. Helen Jones, 33, shot herself in the heart in the bathroom here early today after she received the news of the death of her husband, George Jones, master of the Brooks-Seander bend. She died instantly.

She died early today as the injuries she received when the which he was riding was off a sharp grade by a passenger. Physicians performed operation late last night in an effort to save his life, but he died.

Jones, according to friends, after eaten or slept since her husband was injured.

Jones is survived by her mother, Mrs. O. Johnston, and her sister, Mrs. Romley. Her father is a pioneer irrigation engineer in this district. Preparations are made for a double funeral.

REPRIEVE GIVEN

WM. MAHAFFAY

Wm. Mahaffay, 75-year-old resident of the Douglas county jail, was today granted a reprieve by Governor Pierce. Mahaffay was arrested on March 17, charged with possession of intoxicating liquor. He entered a plea of guilty and was fined \$400 and given 30 days in jail, and started serving his fine on the 20th of the month. During the period of his confinement he has been constantly under the care of his physician and his health is such that further imprisonment, it is feared, will result fatally. He is afflicted with chronic heart trouble, asthma and high blood pressure, according to Dr. Belt. The county officers recommended his release and Governor Pierce granted a reprieve between the dates of July 10 and January 10, 1925. Mahaffay was released from custody this morning.
