## AND THIS IS GRATITUDE.

Picture yourself on the battlefield, enduring all the hardships, pitting your life's blood against the enemy for the sake of your country—away from friends and family—your uppermost thoughts centered on victory for America and its people. You are just one of the common herd that go to make up an army of red-blooded, aggressive and patriotic soldiers. You are fighting for a principle—you are fighting for American freedom—that freedom that is extended to every citizen of the United States regardless of any particular degree of society or rank in every day life, and those who had no part in past struggles between this nation and other countries are today enjoying the unbounded freedom brought about by the soldiers who fought your battles on the firing line.

Then, fathers and mothers, picture your soldier boy after the great conflict had ended—after the horrors of war are almost forgotten. Compare a likeness to present day gratitude and appreciation for services and look to the future for a possible solution. Could you imagine anything like the following:

Today, we exhibit to the people of Roseburg one John Maurer, Spanish American war veteran, with an honorable discharge and an army record above reproach. He fought bravely during the conflict between this country and Spain with no motive other than to establish a principle and make America and her people and safe from all foreign entanglements and domination. He is broken in health, unable to perform manual labor of any kind to aid in sustaining body and soul. The government allows him the pitiful sum of \$30 per month, quite inadequate for sustenance, and his only hope has been to gain permanent entrance to the Oregon Soldiers Home in this city that he might receive proper medical treatment and care to restore his health.

This has been refused and he is now an outcast, thrown upon his own resources with only a meagre allowance, too small to defray the actual necessities of a humble livelihood.

There is no question about his services to his country. There is no doubt as to the seriousness of his affliction. His army papers are regular in every particular and he has a clean, untarnished record as a participant in the Spanish-American war.

But, regardless of these facts, he is refused admittance to the Oregon Soldiers Home. He was ordered to leave that institution today. Having no other alternative he took all his earthly belongings and is now being cared for by former comrades in this city and a determined effort will be made to present the bare facts to the governor of this state that he may be reinstated and given the care that he rightfully deserves.

Here is a fine sample of gratitude. Here is a blot on the escutcheon of a public institution that breeds contempt for the state, the nation and those who have the authority to dole out this sort of "justice" to all ex-service men.

How about your own son in the future? The boy that pitted himself against all the fiendish inventions of modern warfare in the late world war? Will he be a common subject of charity in the years to come? Will like treatment be his only solace and reward for defending his country in time of foreign invasion. Will the only home for disabled soldiers in this state be closed to these worthy lads when old age and disease has stripped them of their strength to gain an honorable existence?

These are matters of intense interest to every patriotic citizen. They should not be considered lightly. It may be your boy of today who in years to come will be subjected to just such treatment that has been accorded this Spanish-American war veteran.

Now is the time to right the wrong and set an example that no recurrence will again develop that will so humble any man with a clean war record to be thrust upon the world to eke out an existence through the channels of public charity.

## BONUS BLANKS ARE FILLED OUT

### Legion Posts Aid Veterans in Preparing Applications for Compensation.

### WORK WILL CONTINUE

### Clerks Will Be Present at Armory Again Tonight to Assist in Task of Getting Applications In.

Federal bonus applications were filled out last night for several hundred ex-service men at the Armory. Through the efforts of Umpqua Post of the American Legion free service was given former veterans in making out these blanks, and from 5 o'clock in the evening until midnight the Armory was filled with men getting the applications in proper shape to send in to Washington as a claim for the adjusted compensation allowed by the government.  
The work will be continued tonight and those who did not get their applications filled out last night are invited to be at the Armory this evening. A large force of typists filled out the blanks, which were then witnessed and finger prints taken and checked to see that no inaccuracies existed. These applications are forwarded at once to Washington where they will be checked against the service record.  
Veterans for whom applications are being prepared are asked to have their discharge with them when they call at the Armory. It is not necessary to send the discharge to Washington as the application blank carries all of the data appearing upon the discharge and necessary for the granting of the bonus, and the government has agreed to accept the word of the legion for the correctness of this information.  
If the discharge has been lost the veteran should be prepared to give his army serial number, the organizations with which he served and the approximate date of transfer, the date and place of birth, and the full name of his beneficiary. Every veteran must have his application witnessed by two persons who know him to be the person making the application for the bonus.  
All applications must be made out through the American Legion. Umpqua post is doing this work free of charge and is inviting all veterans to use its organization in making out and sending in their applications. The blanks are available together with properly addressed envelopes, so that there will be no difficulties encountered.  
All of those who desire to have their applications made out and who were not present last night, are asked to meet at the Armory this evening where clerks will aid in the preparations of the application.
