FIRES DESTROY MILL

Near Glendale Wiped Out Yesterday—County Has Bad Blaze.

Originated from an old dump ever in May of this year destroyed the Faun lumber mill six miles from the mill had not been in for some time, and consequently were no men present when it got into the fire. The mill had a capacity of 10,000 feet daily and insurance. In addition to the equipment the fire burned 15,000 feet of lumber.

Fire Patrol reports a number of fires in the county with considerable damage being done in some localities. There is a bad fire on Shively creek, between Perdue and Cow creek, which is giving much trouble. The fire covers about 100 acres and has been burning for several days. A force of eighteen men under Warden N. N. Wood have been battling the fire and today reported it under control.

Roy Beebe's logging yards at Comstock are said to be burning. About 160 acres being threatened. This fire is being battled and its spread will probably be prevented.

Three small fires are said to be burning near Hubbard creek. These were spotted yesterday and crews have been dispatched to handle them, and it is believed that they can be checked without doing further damage.

O. C. Houser, central fire dispatcher, on the Umpqua National Forest, reports that the forest is clear of fires and that no new fires have developed. One or two fires are being patrolled to prevent spread but no large fires are burning.
