SINCLAIR FURNISHES BOND FOR APPEARANCE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

NEW YORK, July 14.—Harry F. Sinclair, put up a \$5,000 bond before United States Commissioner Hitchcock today to insure his appearance in Washington for trial for alleged conspiracy to defraud the United States government. The indictment is one of those growing out of the senate investigation of the Teapot Dome lease which also resulted in the indictment of E. L. Doheny, former secretary of the Interior and several others.

Sinclair was given 20 days to plead again. In reviewing the case, Justice Hoehling cited various precedents, and following the general rule in such questions declared the issue of the authority of congress should be resolved against the defendant and in favor of the existing power to compel pertinent testimony in aid of the exercise of its legislative function, but excluding self-incrimination.

On the claim of counsel for Sinclair that the senate if it had authority to ask the questions, had deprived itself of jurisdiction by the resolution to refer the oil cases to the courts for determination the opinion held that this was only a part of the subject matter of the senate inquiry, which he asserted still was uncompleted. In view of the far reaching questions involved, Justice Hoehling made the date for Sinclair's next move 20 days ahead so that if he desired, he would have reasonable opportunity to apply to the court of appeals for the allowance of a special appeal. This procedure, it was said would expedite the final decision by the supreme court of the United States where the case ultimately is expected to be settled.

MARKET AGENT DEPARTMENT.

The prune growers of Oregon and Southern Washington have combined to market their crop through a central selling association. Their plan is substantial. It can and should be worked out to the material benefit of all growers. Local units unite with the central association. The organization builds from the bottom.

The organization will have about 60 per cent of the growers under agreement to market through the association, so the managers state. They should have 90 per cent signed up.

One big obstacle to co-operative success everywhere is that too few co-operators, that 25 per cent of producers buy and hold the umbrellas over the outside 75. Those on the outside get the full benefit of the work and expense of the too few on the inside. After a time they become discouraged with carrying the expense load and doing all the work, and they quit. Then the whole co-operative movement gets a set-back.

Any producer, every producer, should be convinced by this time that the only chance he has to compete with the rest of the country is to play the game as the rest of the country plays it, and that is by compact organization and control of products. There are huge profits made from agricultural products, but they are made after they leave the growers' hands, and are made by organizations that have no part in the work of production.

The prune industry can be made profitable. There are abundant markets in the country for the entire production, but it will never be profitable for the growers so long as they simply pick and dump. That is the situation the middle-handlers like—that gives them their chance to make the profits the growers should have.

The production of prunes in Oregon is increasing and will increase for some years to come, as the many new orchards come into bearing. If there is any profit to accrue to the growers, it must come through organization and a selling plan that will distribute the fruit over the whole country, as the localities need it, and at the least expensive way. SEVEN MEN MAKE BREAK FROM JAIL

arrested after several months had elapsed, having escaped into the hills, and was only recently captured.

Joe Howling is wanted for forgery, being accused of passing a bad check in exchange for a garage bill. He claimed to have received the check in payment for work. He was being held for grand jury investigation.

H. C. Atkins was serving sentence for bootlegging. He was convicted at Reedsport of the crime of selling liquor and was serving out a term in the county jail.

A. F. James was the last man to enter the jail and was held under a charge of rape. James was accused by Fern Nye, who was recently arrested for possession of liquor, with having had illicit relations with her daughter, August Beals, now a ward of the juvenile court, during the time he was employed at the farm home of Mrs. Nye and her mother Martha Fate.

The case in which James is involved is a many-sided proposition and officers are inclined to believe that it is largely responsible for the jail break.

According to the story as told by the officers, James was employed at the home of Mrs. Fate and Mrs. Nye, and while there associated with the minor daughter of Mrs. Nye. One or both of the women, the officers claim, have been engaged in the manufacture of liquor for some time. Mrs. Nye having previously served a sentence for possession of liquor.

The officers also claim that a number of local men have been in the habit of going to the farm home and obtaining a supply of liquor and also participating in "parties" which have been held there.

The Beals girl, it is claimed, turned her attentions to another man and James became jealous. When she refused to leave the other man, James gathered up his belongings, but was refused a tent which he had been using. Mrs. Nye claiming the tent as security for a bill which she alleged to be due for board. James became angry and jealous and came to Roseburg and told officers where they would find liquor on the ranch, and they found several cases of beer and ten gallons of wine. Mrs. Nye then countered by having a charge of rape placed against James.

The officers, it is reported, have been furnished with some very interesting information, both by James and by the Beals girl of the activities at the home, and a number of men have been involved in various crimes. James would doubtless have proven a good witness for the state and officers are confident that a strong pressure, and possibly inducement, was brought to bear upon the young man to persuade him to leave. James apparently was willing to remain until late last week. He reluctantly submitted to arrest, and went to jail without any great complaint, and advised officers that he was willing to tell all he knew.

They are convinced then that someone persuaded him to escape and probably aided him in doing so.

All evidence in connection with the escape points to James as having been the one who did the actual work. James was brought up in a machine shop and is naturally a good mechanic. He knew how to handle tools and the severing of the bars and bolts indicated that the work was done by a skilled person.

The job was plainly one in which assistance was had from the outside. Two unbroken hacksaw blades were found by the officers, and broken pieces of another were secured, showing that some person, without doubt, slipped these tools in to the prisoners.

Telephone and telegraph were used to notify all police officers in the state and a sharp lookout is being maintained in an effort to apprehend the seven men.

The only two who remained were W. L. Hodson, and Walt Pegan. Hodson is serving a term for having liquor in his possession. He has a family living near Roseburg and consequently would not skip out. Pegan said the meals in jail suited him better than going hungry and hiding out.

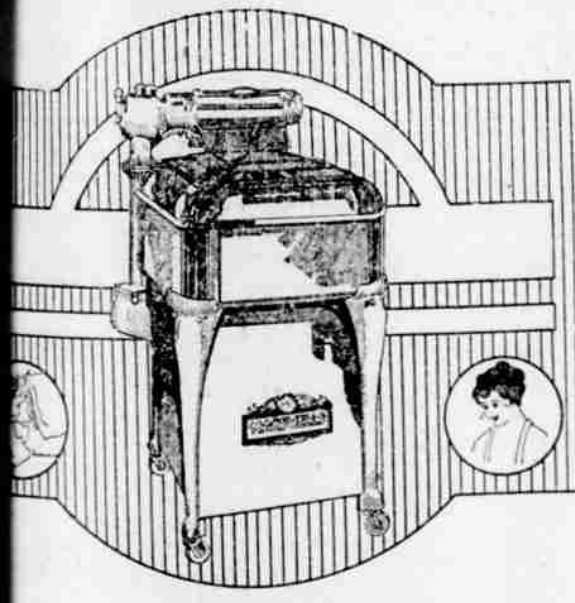
The trial of Fern Nye and Martha Fate, charged with possession of liquor has been postponed for one week because of the escape of A. F. James from the county jail. A continuance of one week was granted with the understanding that if James is not captured within that time that the trial will be held.

must be taken from the hands of the middle agencies and speculators. The organization must supplant these.

If enough of the growers realize these facts, the new selling organization will amount to something. If enough of them are selfish enough to think they can stay on the outside, let the organizers pay the expenses and do the work, while they get the same price for their prunes, then will another attempt to help agriculture have failed.

Farmers have the power to make their industry profitable. They produce what the world must have. By working together, selling together, standardizing and controlling their own businesses, they can get a large part of the profits that others now make off from them and be contented and prosperous. But until enough of them can think this way, and enough of them will act this way, co-operative movements will continue to fail, or function with little results. It needs 90 per cent of the growers of a product to say "hands off" to the army of middle men. With such organization the farmers would be as powerful to get profit prices for their products as the shoe manufacturers are to get theirs.
