BRITISH FLIERS ON AMERICAN'S ROUTE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
KURASHIRO, Island of Hokkaido, Japan, July 14.—A. Stuart MacLaren and two companions, on their way around the world by air, arrived here early today from Misato on Honshu, the main island of Japan. The next stop of the British fliers at Hito-kappu anchorage on Yutorofu Island, one of the Kurile group. The Americans round the world fliers stopped at Hito-kappu, but instead of retracing their route toward the MacLaren party will make a detour from Hito-kappu to Atsu Island, the westernmost of the Aleutians, where they again will pick up the American's trail.

This detour will lead the Britishers to a small lake near the southern end of Paramashiru Island, the most northerly but one of the Kuriles instead of to the anchorage at the northern end of the island used by the Americans as a landing place. Thence they will fly to Petropavlovsk, on the western coast of the Kamchatka peninsula to Bering Island, Copper Island and Atun. Except Atun, all these stops are in Russian territory, their use will shorten the over-sea jump considerably as compared with the hop of 856 miles made by the Americans from Atun to Paramashiru. Landings at them are possible for the British fliers, though the Americans could not come down on Russian territory because America has not recognized the soviet Russian government.

After leaving Paramashiru the fliers probably will be out of direct communication with Tokyo and any word of their progress is likely to be delayed until they reach American soil.

HARD TIMES BRING BRITISH TREASURES TO AUCTION ROOMS

LONDON, July 14.—(A. P.)—Sir Rider Haggard writes to The Times depicting the roots of old English country mansions are rotting and falling in because the owners cannot afford to keep them up and there is no one to buy them, and that with them disappears the old English country life of which they were the center. The contents of these old houses are pouring out the market as they have never done before, and popular belief is that most of these valuables are brought in by London art dealers for the American customers.

Even some of the old families which are known to be immensely rich, according to English values, are taking advantage of the high tide of art pieces. For example, for sale soon at the famous Christie auction rooms is a group of old masters of world reputation, put up by the Duke of Westminster, which includes three pictures by Rubens forming part of a series said to have been painted by order of Philip IV to decorate a Carmelite convent, also a Virgin and Child by Van Dyck.

Others listed at Christie's, which combine the value of patriotic associations with art, are "Old English Furniture and Needlework, the property of Her Grace the Duchess of Wellington," and carved oak furniture "the property of His Grace the Duke of Marlborough and removed from a farmhouse on the Marlborough estate." Also porcelain belonging to the Right Hon. Earl Howe, G. C. V. O.; the Stafford heirlooms from Kenilworth, Staffordshire, which have a romantic flavor and consist mostly of old silver, furniture and porcelain; a valuable collection of pictures left by the late Earl of Harford; furniture belonging to the Earl of Sandwich; and a few old master pictures put up by the Right Hon. The Earl of Canden, P. C. G. C. B. G. C. V. O.

Among the offerings at Sotheby's within the next month are valuable pictures the property of Lady Edward Grosvenor; Sir John Hippolyte; and other articles belonging to the Countess of Gresham and Countess of Strathford.

It is many years since any of the Duke of Wellington's collection of old master pictures has appeared in the auction rooms, although some star pictures have occasionally been sold by a private bargain, and treasures from Marlborough have rarely been obtainable in the lifetime of the present Duke of Marlborough.

The belief that nearly everything sold now in America is not authentic, true. The good old reliable, but unimpaired British landscape artists of the 18th and 19th centuries have been enjoying a boom in

prices such as they have never before been honored with. The majority of them are practically unknown in America, and are not in demand there, yet the swiftness with which \$2,000 or \$3,000 are bid for pictures that went begging on the painters' hands, shows that there is yet money in England for art.

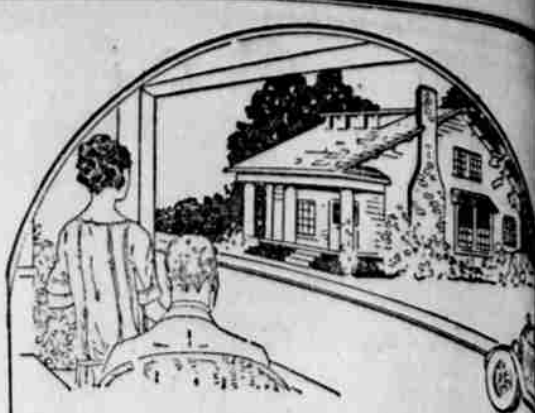

ADVERTISING MEET OPENS IN ENGLAND

LONDON, July 14.—A royal welcome was given to the 4,500 delegates of the international advertising convention by the Prince of Wales when he opened the official sessions at Wimley. In anticipation of the prince's arrival, American delegates were present long before the meeting was scheduled to begin. When the British heir appeared wearing a lounge suit with a conversation button in the lapel of his coat the American delegates broke into enthusiastic cheering, stamped the platform and kept up their ovation for 10 minutes.

Then the prince delivered a short address and declared the convention open. The delegates tossed up their pent-up enthusiasm, cheering for
