LOCAL MAN WILL HEAD NEW SERVICE

Charles I. Dague, local weather observer, who is taking the place of Wm. Bell, while the latter is away on his annual vacation, has been assigned to the position of superintendent of Oregon of the new branch of the weather bureau to be established soon. This department which is being organized as an emergency measure, will furnish forecasts and reports to logging camps, timber companies, fire patrols, forest service and protective agencies in Oregon and Washington, as an aid in the handling of the forest fire situation.

Humidity will be watched and forecasts will be sent by telegraph to all points. This will enable the logging companies to place men at strategic points when danger to their logging lands necessitates additional protection.

The relation between humidity and fire hazard has been closely worked out by scientific experimentation and through the weather bureau warnings it is expected that much valuable protection work will be done.

RAILWAY ORDER TO ENDORSE LAFOLLETTE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) CEDAR RAPIDS, Iowa, July 15.—The board of directors of the order of railway conductors which meets in semi-annual session here tomorrow is expected to endorse the candidacy of Senator Robert M. La Follette of Wisconsin for president, according to L. E. Sheppard, president of the order who returned from the Cleveland convention today.

Mr. Sheppard declared all the railroad brotherhoods and farmer organizations of the west would "get behind the candidacy of La Follette."

"While they do not expect him to win," he said, "they do hope to elect a sufficient number of congressmen to insure his choice in the event the house of representatives was called upon to select the president."

Mr. Sheppard predicted that the La Follette vote would prevent a presidential choice at the November election.

NEW YORK, July 15.—By virtue of a knockout in the eleventh round of a scheduled 15 round bout at the Queensboro, A. C., Little Vincent, of Chile, today has the call in light-weight circles over Rocky Kanaz of Buffalo. Vincent's decisive victory, which came after two minutes and 15 seconds of fighting in the eleventh round, was entirely unexpected, but met with the hearty approval of the spectators.

CHICAGO, July 15.—Grover Cleveland Alexander, veteran pitching ace of the Chicago Cubs, suffering from a broken wrist, will not pitch for at least a month and probably not at all this season. Alexander, it was discovered today has a fracture of the wrist which two x-ray pictures failed to reveal since he was injured in Pittsburgh.

The pitching veteran has won nine of twelve games thus far this season. His injury is the first serious accident in the club this year, but it has almost ruined Chicago's hopes of a pennant.

PORTLAND, July 15.—Bud Ridley of Tacoma was awarded the judge's decision over King Leopold of Oklahoma in a 10-round fight. Leopold lost the fight by a 10-0 decision.
