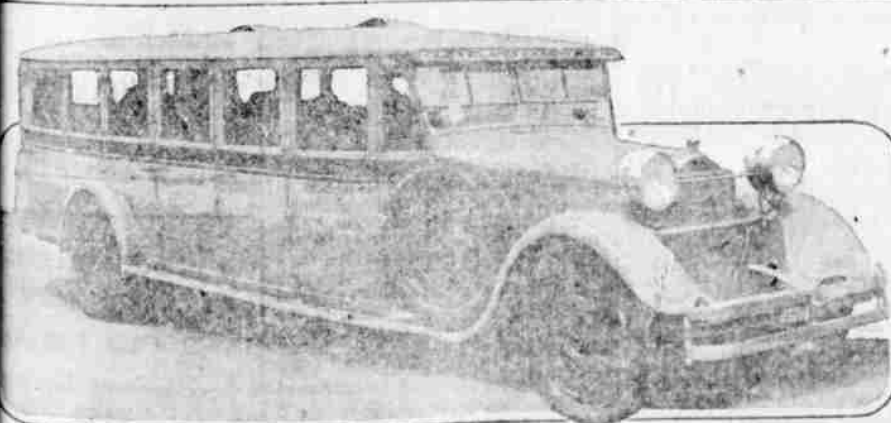

MILWAUKEE, July 16.—One man was killed, another became a human sky rocket and was shot over a house and into a street, suffering probably fatal injuries and a boy was seriously injured late yesterday when a fireworks plant exploded.

Joseph Cinkubum, 38, owner of the plant, was killed, and Paul, 23, a brother was catapulted high into the air and probably will die.

EXTENSION IS MADE PAYMENT OF TAXES

The gasoline on the outside of the bottle ignited and caused the contents of the bottle to explode. The father was badly burned about the hands and face in attempting to extinguish the flames.

RELIGIOUS LIBERTY RUSSIA RESTRICTED

CASHIER COAL COMPANY SHOT AFTER ROBBERY

ROCKSPRING, Wyo., July 16.—Clude N. Fisher, cashier of the Gunn county coal company here who disappeared yesterday at the same time that the semi-monthly payroll of the company vanished was shot and fatally wounded early today by J. Walker, mine foreman, and friend of Fisher.

Fisher was making for a cache of food, water and blankets in the mountains two miles from a coal camp where he had previously worked, when he was shot. He died a few hours later in a local hospital.

Two airplanes following his disappearance returned last night without finding any trace of him.

OPERATIONS TO START ON BIG GRAIN MERGER

CHICAGO, July 16.—Immediate operation will be begun by the Grain Marketing company, the merged \$26,000,000 capitalized concern which amalgamates four Chicago and one Kansas City grain companies and which is destined eventually to be farmer owned, controlled and operated.

The company will start without delay to handle the grain crops now coming to market in the elevator, its controls and at other grain centers, according to John Callon O'Laughlin, spokesman for the grain merchants.

POLISH WRITER BEGS FIANCEE SHOOT HIM

PARIS, July 16.—Slowly going from an incurable insanity, Jan Zdzienkowski, well known Polish writer, repeatedly begged friends and attendants at the sanatorium at Ville Juif to put an end to his suffering. Today his fiancée, Mile Stanislawka Unikowska, visited him and was overcome at the sight of his agony she could not resist his pitiable pleadings. She shot him in the head and he is not expected to recover.

Following the shooting, Mile Unikowska collapsed and officers sent to arrest her left her in the charge of the sanatorium.

FEDERALS WINNING FROM BRAZIL REBELS

RIO DE JANEIRO, July 16.—Authoritative advice received here today from Rio de Janeiro that the Brazilian government yesterday stopped the American press associations from sending or receiving news in Brazil.

RENCH ALIERS, July 16.—An official telegram from Rio de Janeiro received by the American press associations that the federal government won an important action against the rebels, capturing many prisoners.

The bulletin announces that telegrams are continuing to arrive indicating that "patriotic battalions" have been organized in nearly all cities of the state to battle the insurgents. It also states that the federal government is preparing to take action against the rebels.

A dispatch to La Nación from Rio de Janeiro contains the following official explanation given out last night about the revolution movement:

The activities are proceeding actively on all fronts. We continue to advance and to occupy more advantageous positions. The superiority of our military over the rebel army is irrefragable.

A wireless message received from the German steamer General Belgrano said the ship had received a radio communication from the Brazilian foreign office denying a report that the Sao Paulo insurrectionists had advanced to within eight miles of Santos.

The censorship imposed by the Brazilian government has prevented any authentic news coming out of that country concerning the revolutionary situation at Sao Paulo. It is feared in some quarters the revolt is much more serious than at first believed.

STREET FIGHT STAGED BETWEEN INDIA SECTS

DELHI, British India, July 16.—Six persons were killed and more than one hundred wounded in rioting yesterday between Mohammedans and Hindus. The disturbance was caused by what is described as the aggressive attitude of the Mohammedans, who persisted in carrying cows for sacrifice through the prohibited area where the Hindus lived.

The Mohammedans are declared to have entered the Hindu streets, breaking open and setting fire to the houses and desecrating idols. The militia was called out with armored cars and forced to fire on the mob. There were no casualties from this fire. The casualties occurred in the street disturbances. Order was restored after four hours by cavalry reinforced the police pickets.

DEVICE PERFECTED TO PREVENT LISTENING IN

NEW YORK, July 16.—A device to eliminate "listening in" or interference in radio transmission was described today by John Hays Hammond, Jr., who returned yesterday from Italy, where he had spent two months in radio work.

Complete isolation of sender and receiver is afforded by method of sending out rays which have curves and dents in them, similar to the rise and fall of the pulse on a nurse's chart, according to Mr. Hammond. Only the receiver familiar with the wave type can read the message.

The new method of transmission will also make it possible to flash complete pages of print across the Atlantic ocean by radio, Mr. Hammond predicts.

PRESIDENT TO SPEND SUMMER AT CAPITOL

WASHINGTON, July 15.—President Coolidge will spend the remaining part of the summer in Washington unless something unforeseen develops.

Mr. Coolidge declared against establishment of a temporary White House before the advent of hot weather, but at the time those who have had more experience with Washington summers than the chief

executive predicted he would not hold to that resolution. The summer so far has been cool—that is, cool for Washington—and the president has told friends that he and Mrs. Coolidge had found the White House quite comfortable and have made no plans other than to remain there.

Week end trips on the Mayflower afford more real rest, in the president's opinion, than would a stay of several weeks outside the capital.

Inasmuch as Mr. Coolidge is not to be formally notified of his selection as the republican presidential nominee until August 14, it is not probable he will leave Washington for any purpose before the first of September. He plans no addresses before his notification ceremonies and will begin work soon on his acceptance address, probably utilizing free hours in the afternoons to draft it.

SENATOR EDDY TO ATTEND SYNOD

State Senator B. L. Eddy left for Eugene today to represent the Presbyterian church of Roseburg at the annual meeting of the Synod of the Presbyterian church in the state of Oregon. The meeting is held on the campus of the University of Oregon, and will be attended by ministers and lay delegates from the various churches of the state. It has been announced that Rev. W. A. (Dilly) Sunday will preach the opening sermon. Mr. Eddy was accompanied to Eugene by Mrs. Eddy and his grandson Alfred Lee, and also by Messrs. W. C. Harding and Ernest Hellwell, who will visit the Synod.
