tained affidavits alleging to reveal a  
conspiracy through which the gas  
bomb was placed in the senate cham-  
ber recently, causing sickness to sev-  
eral members.

## MAN WHO ATTEMPTED SUICIDE NOT SLAYER

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., July 18.—  
Oliver Cameron, who attempted sui-  
cide at Portland, Ore., in a fit of  
remorse for the fabled slaying of  
W. J. Gay, January 2, 1902, near  
here, tried to expiate a crime which  
never was committed, authorities  
say. It was learned today from  
Gay's sister, Mrs. H. S. Bowden of  
Birmingham that Gay still is living  
and his home is at Sharpburg,  
Georgia. He is 81 years old, Mrs.  
Bowden said.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Hill an-  
nounced today he is preparing re-  
quisition papers and will make every  
effort possible to have Cameron  
brought back here to face a charge  
of assault with intent to murder,  
which was made following an indict-  
ment returned 22 years ago when  
the shooting occurred.

Mrs. Bowden said that Gay did  
not attempt to stab Cameron as re-  
ported, and that her brother was  
shot five times in the back.

PORTLAND, July 18.—Oliver  
Cameron, in a hospital here showed  
little interest today when informed  
that W. J. Gay, whom he supposed  
he had slain in 1902 was still liv-  
ing. Cameron was suffering from  
shock of his attempted suicide in  
jumping into the Willamette river  
from a bridge here, and was in such  
weakened physical and dejected  
mental condition that he did not dis-  
play any reaction when the news  
from Birmingham was given him.  
The local police are holding Camer-  
on for Birmingham authorities.

## HUGE SUM PLACED FOR OREGON DEVELOPMENT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PORTLAND, July 18.—The sum  
of \$110,000 for a greater Oregon  
was made available yesterday by ac-  
tion of the trustees of the Oregon  
development fund. This was the  
amount allotted as a budget for the  
second year's work under the \$300,-  
000 fund raised last year by the  
Portland chamber of commerce for  
state development.

The budget allows \$30,000 for the  
marketing committee, \$30,000 to  
land settlement work, and \$40,000  
for publicity.

## HEAD FARMERS UNION OPPOSES BIG MERGER

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

OMAHA, Neb., July 18.—C. J.  
Osborne, president of the Nebraska  
Farmers' Union, warned members of  
the union against purchase of stock  
in the \$26,000,000 elevator merger  
now being perfected at Chicago with  
the consolidation of five grain-  
handling companies into a coopera-  
tive marketing organization and as-  
serted that it is "suicidal for farm-  
ers to dream of entering into such  
a gigantic plan at this time."

"True cooperation," Osborne as-  
serted, "starts at the bottom in the  
purchase of small elevators by the  
farmers. That is the plan we have  
followed in our organization and we  
still have much to learn at the bot-  
tom. "Right now a number of our  
smaller elevators have gone to the  
wall. This is because we had not  
learned the game thoroughly at the  
bottom. The next step in cooperat-  
ing is to join the grain exchange and  
to learn to operate them success-  
fully, then it will be time to handle

large elevators and delve into export  
trade.

"It is suicidal for farmers to  
dream of entering into such a gigan-  
tic plan at this time. They should  
remember that they are purchasing  
the holdings of these five big con-  
cerns at reproduction cost minus de-  
preciation. Under this plan farmers  
would acquire elevators at the sel-  
lers' own price and in a few years  
would learn that they could not re-  
alize on the investment."

"Furthermore, there is a question  
in my mind whether the concerns  
are not really combining and taking  
advantage of cooperative marketing  
laws to evade obstructions set up in  
anti-trust laws. To my mind, any  
farm organization that uses its in-  
fluence and publicity sources to sell  
stock to its members in this scheme  
is betraying its trust and calamity is  
certain to follow."
