BRAZILIAN REBELS OUTNUMBER FEDERALS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

BUENOS AIRES, July 12.—Trustworthy confirmation from Brazil indicates that the rebels are getting the upper hand around Sao Paulo. It is stated that the federal government has proposed to initiate "defensive operations" but the military chiefs do not entertain hopes of definite results.

An official bulletin issued by the Rio Janeiro government received at La Nacion states:

"Our troops continue executing important maneuvers on the entire front, aiming to provoke a decisive action. Our left wing has captured the police barracks in Vergueiro street, taking 30 prisoners. Our right wing has also progressed, capturing a number of machine guns and a great quantity of munitions. The commercial association at Santos and the mining congress there voted motions to support the federal government. According to reports received from other states complete calm prevails."

Unless a political compromise is reached, the Brazilian warfare, which now has been waged for nearly two weeks between the Sao Paulo revolutionists and the federal troops, promises to be long and drawn out. This is indicated by information filtering past the censor, corroborated by statements from various voyagers arriving from Rio Janeiro Santos and even Sao Paulo.

It is pointed out the rebels have at their command the resources of the wealthiest city in the country, where large manufacturers are centered, including arms and munition factories which are reported working day and night.

The defacto government in power is said to have the support of practically the entire population and to be functioning in an orderly manner.

While the insurrection seems to have begun as a military revolt, emphasis is placed on the prevalence of secessionist sentiment in Sao Paulo where the objection often is voiced that the city and state are paying more than 50 percent of the national taxation it is declared this disturbs to receive no proportional benefit.

So far as it is known, however, the rebels in establishing a provisional government, have not advanced the separation idea confining their demands to the resignation of President Bernardes and the partition of military men involved in the 1922 revolt.

Certain reforms are also asked. Most of the information thus far available seems to indicate that the federal bombardment of Sao Paulo aroused local patriotism and united the population in supporting the hostile government and defending the city.

SYNOD CONTINUES IN EUGENE CONFERENCE

EUGENE, Ore., July 12.—Today and tomorrow are educational days at the annual meeting of the Presbyterian Synod for the state of Oregon being held here, with the affairs of Albany college the principal business. The report of trustees were called and the trustees to serve the ensuing year were to be elected.

Dr. Robert E. Speer, secretary of the foreign mission board was to continue his series of lectures on mission work in China, and Dr. J. Duncan was scheduled to give his second address on "Makers of American Ideals."

Yesterday the Synod received the report of Rev. J. M. Cornwellson of Pendleton, who has just completed twenty five years of service among the Umatilla Indians.

Home mission problems in Oregon occupied the greater part of the afternoon session yesterday. Introduced as the "Bishop of Eastern Oregon" Rev. L. L. Boyd, of Baker described the problem of the small churches in the eastern part of the state.

A special committee was appointed to take up the resolution protesting the proposed closing of the Chawawa Indian school to Alaskan children and the resolution proposing that a native minister and field matron be appointed at the Tutuila Indian school.

Both resolutions were adopted by the Synod. The committee consists of Rev. Cornwellson, Pendleton; Gertrude Aiken, Halva; Rev. E. H. Pence, Portland; Rev. D. A. Thompson, Portland and H. Seely, Albany.

OREGON IS ASKED TO PASTURE CAL. CATTLE

SALEM, July 12.—The state of Oregon is asked by California authorities to give access to 6,000 head of California cattle whose food has been destroyed by forest fires in the Sierran mountains.

Governor Pierce today received a telegram from G. H. Herke, California director of agriculture, who asks permission of the Oregon Governor and the state livestock sanitary board to move the 6,000 head across the state line into Oregon for pasturing. The cattle, Herke says, would be under the safeguard of federal inspectors. Since the foot and mouth disease has never appeared north of Blackfoot, Calif., it is believed there would be no danger from the disease. The necessary vaccine feed of the cattle has been wiped out by fire.

Governor Pierce also received a telegram from Charles A. Park, head of the Oregon board of Sanitation, who is now in California. He said
