SHERIFF POSTPONES HANGING OF TWO MEN

(Associated Press Licensed Wire.)
ST. LOUIS, Mo., July 15.—Respond-
ing to the ardent pleas of the two men,
reinforced by those of their spiritual
advisers, Sheriff George Stradtman,
early today announced he had post-
poned until four o'clock this afternoon
the executions of Charles Merrill and
Hugh Pinkley, who were to have been
hanged at 6 o'clock.

The sheriff's decision was made af-
ter he had been called to the prison-
ers' cells and had been handed a note
in which the men requested a stay un-
til 4 o'clock that "we may better pre-
pare ourselves more, materially and
spiritually."

"If this earnest request is granted,
we will die much happier," the note
added.

The two men were sentenced to die
for the murder of Patrolman Michael
O'Connor.

MYRTLE POINT MEN ARE GIVEN FINES

J. A. Dishman, J. Stone and R.
Stone, all of Myrtle Creek, were fined
\$100 each this morning following
their arrest on a charge of posses-
sion of intoxicating liquor. Dishman
is the owner of a garage in Myrtle
Point and the Stone brothers are loc-
ated out of town last night and consumed
a quantity of moonshine which they

had purchased. Night Officer Ray-
mond Rausch received a "tip" on
where they were parked and arrested
the trio, appropriating almost a quart
of liquor. The men were turned over
to the county officials, as they were
arrested outside the city limits, and
were arraigned before Justice of the
Peace George Jones, who fined them
\$100 each. The Stone brothers made
an appeal for time to pay their fines,
being married men with no support in
sight for their families if they were
required to go to jail. They were given
a few days in which to raise the
amount. Dishman agreed to pay his
fine as soon as he could return to
Myrtle Point and sell some of his
equipment in his garage.

NO TIME WASTED IN REPAIRING PLANES

BROUGH ENGLAND, July 15.—
Despite the fact that they had prom-
ised themselves a rest in England,
the American round the world fliers
were up early today and busy work-
ing on their planes in preparation
for the jump to Greenland and Ice-
land. Already rapid progress has
been made in dismantling the old
engine.

In the meantime Lieutenant Leigh
Wade and Major Howard C. David-
son, the latter associate military at-
tache at the American embassy,
went to London where they will con-
fer with naval officers regarding
the destroyers which will carry
stores for the aviators to Green-
land and also will be placed along
the route.

BANKERS CONVENTION DISCUSS AGRICULTURE

CORVALLIS, Ore., July 15.—The
agricultural outlook and steps that
bankers can take to improve the sit-
uation were considered at a confer-
ence today of members of the agri-
cultural committee of the Oregon
bankers association and other lead-
ing bankers. D. H. Otis, director of
the Agricultural Commission of the
American Bankers Association and
L. H. Russell, dean of agriculture
at the University of Wisconsin, were
among the speakers listed on the
program. O. D. Rorer of the Eu-
gene Bank of Commerce and direc-
tor of the agricultural commission of
the American Bankers Association
from the twelfth federal reserve dis-
trict to aid the passage of the Amer-
ican banker movement in the west-
ern states.

today. Garrett resides near Glen-

crop, which is now ready for thresh-
ing. He was advised that unless the

go to jail regardless of his crop.
