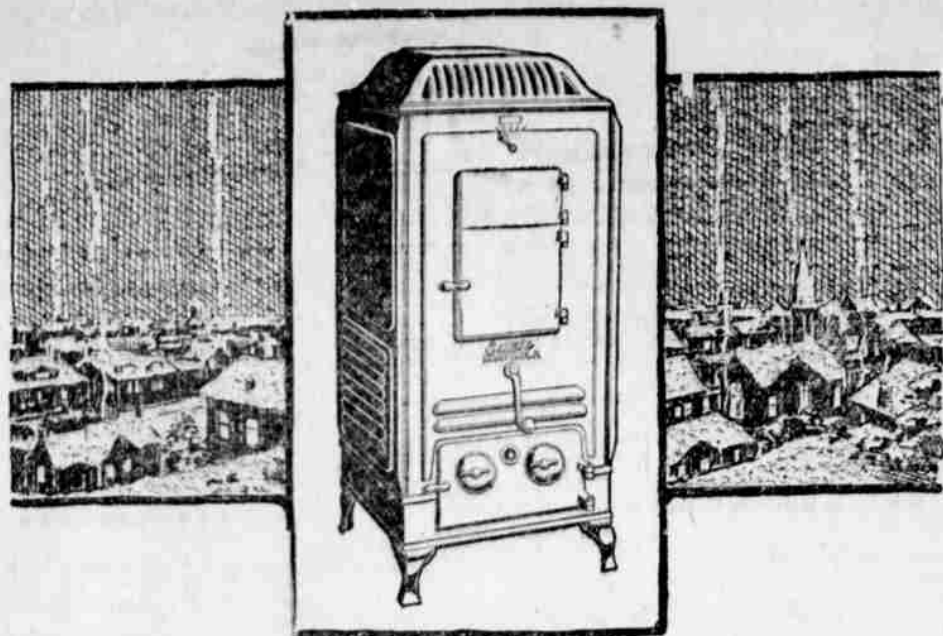

STATE PRESS COMMENT

The Democratic Ticket.

There will be no mud slinging in this campaign. The democrats have nominated for president a man of high character, clean life and patriotic purposes. He is a strong man. John W. Davis has been before the public for a quarter of a century and the people know him. Governor Bryan, the candidate for vice president, was a sop thrown to the progressives, but he was a good sop. Governor Bryan is a man of good character, and will make a good candidate.

Nothing can be said against the personnel of the democratic ticket. It represents outstanding American manhood, but the men nominated will not govern this country the next four years. There's a reason for that. The democratic party is not a constructive party. It is a destructive party. It will fuse with anything or anybody for the purpose of spreading muck, and discrediting the republicans.

If the democratic party were to run true to form, Walsh would be nominated for president and Wheeler for vice president. They typify the party, and if thoroughly respected men are nominated they are simply wooden horses put forth to catch the unwary and win the election.

The democrats are to be congratulated on the high character of their nominees, but there can be no confusion as to what their election means. It means that the Walshes and the Wheelers and the men of that type will have a real lining. What happened in congress will continue to happen. Walsh said he would rather be elected to the senate than be vice president.—Oregon Statesman.

Isn't It?

Choice Oregon cherries have been moving East from Portland to Chicago in solid express carloads.

The growers were paid 5 cents a pound. The express rate is 8 cents a pound. The selling price in Chicago is 60 cents a pound.

Five cents for the farmer, 60 cents for the consumer, 55 cents to those between the orchard and the final market!

There, in a nutshell, you have the explanation of why agriculture is prostrated, why more banks recently failed in farming districts in 14 months, than in any former five-year period, why merchants in agricultural localities have curtailed their orders, and why the farmers of America beat on the doors of the last congress for farm legislation.

The farmer gets 5 cents for cherries, the consumer pays 60! The people between the farm and the consumer's dining table get 55 times as much as the farmer gets. There is not another industry in America that is so plucked. No industry, much less agriculture, can stand up under such a system.

Men in the cities will have to begin to reflect on this thing. By and by the mines will be worked out. The oil will be exhausted. The timber will be gone. Only the fields will be left to create the new wealth on which cities exist and thrive.

Isn't it business for the cities to be helping build up agriculture?—Oregon Journal.

al life. But our knowledge of what was shouted at the voter in other elections is pretty much confined to personal observation. It is only the seasoned campaign veteran who knows that attempts to array class against class, to excite the prejudice of the haves against the have-nots, transcribe a political orbit as well defined as the orbit of any heavenly body.

In another campaign the term "calamity shouter" gained widespread usage. It is a good word for a type of politician who seems to bide the co-incidence of a general election year and the economic distress of some element of the population. The "calamity shouters" are always with us. They come nearest to coining their demagogic and professed alarms into votes when voters are in financial straits.

Mr. La Follette, in his formal statement to the Cleveland "conference for progressive political action" places the growth of occurrences which create that which he calls the paramount issue within the last quarter century. His paramount issue is the dominance of private monopoly. Yet during the twenty-five years preceding the last quarter century other La Follettes were raising the same paramount issue. Yes, and long before that.—Oregonian.

Fewer Lynchings

Another lynching record has been made on the favorable side of the report. During the first six months of this year there have been only five lynchings. The department of records and research of Tuskegee Institute has been keeping a careful record of lynchings for 40 years. This half-year's low mark is the best yet.

During the first six months of 1923 there were 15 lynchings; there were 30 in the same period in 1922 and 36 in 1921.

There are various causes for this improvement. Suffering backbones among the representatives of the law have helped to quell mob spirit. Education against lynching must have helped, a little, too.

Lynchings have been among the darkest blot on American life. Far from helping in the solution of our national race problem, they have aggravated ill feeling and have fostered all the evils represented by mob spirit and mob action. The slowly-diminishing number of annual lynchings seems to indicate a change for the better. That should mean a calmer facing of the situation, with reliance on sanity, tolerance and education, rather than intolerance and brutal violence, for eventual solution.
