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AMERICAN COWBOYS RETURN FROM GAMES

NEW YORK, July 22.—Monocles, spats, malacca canes and gaily colored English sweaters were among the accoutrements of the 117 members of the American rodeo company which returned on the steamer Menominee late yesterday after four weeks of performing at the British Empire exhibition at Wembley, England. The company left immediately for Cheyenne, Wyo., where it will take part in the annual rodeo there.
