MANY DIE WHEN JAP BOAT SINKS

Fifty-Seven Go Down When
Liner Fails to Ride Out
Sea Disaster.

DRIFTED HELPLESSLY

Old Vessel, Full of Water,
Soon Sank—Crew Drifts
on Rafts, but Starve
When Not Rescued.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

TOKIO, July 22.—Fifty-seven persons were drowned July 11, when the Nippon Yusen Kaisha freighter Matsuyama Maru foundered off Goto Island near Kyushu, the Kobe offices of the line reported today. The liner had been overdue several days. Today's report was the first news of her fate, as she carried no wireless. The ship carried down with her all the members of her crew except one fireman who was picked up by a trawler and brought to Kobe. She carried no passengers. The Matsuyama Maru, an old vessel, left Keelung, Formosa, July 7, for Yokohama. Her owners had had vessels searching for her for several days along her regular route between Formosa and Japan.

The survivor, whose name is Fukuoka, said that a typhoon which the general unseaworthiness of the ship rendered her unable to ride out, caused the disaster.

Fukuoka who drifted helplessly on a raft near the scene of the disaster for a week and was picked up by the fishing vessel Chihaya. He had no food and but little water.

Fukuoka said the freighter began to fill with water soon after leaving Keelung, when she ran into rough weather. The crew battled desperately at the pumps, seeking to keep down the encroaching sea, but their efforts were unavailing and the steamer went down near midnight on the night of July 11, when she was two days out of port. At that time she was believed to have been within 10 miles of Nagasaki.

Several members of the crew survived the sinking. Fukuoka said and lived for a few days on rafts, but all perished of hunger or thirst before the trawler hove in sight. Fukuoka said he saw one British and one Japanese steamer pass during the time he was adrift on his raft, but that he was too weak to hail either.

The Matsuyama Maru had a cargo of 3,000 tons, mostly sugar.

WORD BATTLE OVER LIQUOR DEATH RATE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
CHICAGO, July 22.—Figures on the death rate from acute alcoholism ascribed to prohibition by A. W. La Forge, of Chicago, a recent advocate at Cleveland, before the American institute of homopathy was contradicted today by Dr. Deets Pickett, research secretary of the world's commission of the Methodist Episcopal church.

Dr. La Forge was quoted as saying:

"Unless prohibition is repealed American cultural ideals will decay soon. Prohibition is a gangrenous force, which corrodes and mortifies our cultural life and sloughing off leaves such pestilence and crime in its wake as to soon threaten the decay of American cultural ideals. Before this alleged prohibition the deaths from acute alcoholism were about two percent. Following the advent of dry legislation the death rate was advanced to 25 percent."

The statement issued today by Dr. Pickett says:

"In the registration area in the year of 1922 (the last available figures) the death rate from alcoholism, both acute and chronic was actually slightly less than one fourth of one percent. If it had been 25 percent there would have been 297 alcoholism deaths per 100,000 of population. Before prohibition the death rate from alcoholism was 5.8 per 100,000 it is now a little less than half that."

They can, however, bring in witnesses of experts who may testify bearing on their responsibility.

The defense was moved to cast aside the insanity plea, the fathers said, because if the youths were adjudged insane their families would be injured by the reflection for succeeding generations. A debt to public opinion, they said, impelled discarding the theory.

"We did not wish the public to believe we have gone into court and obtained the freedom of two boys who had committed murder on the plea of insanity," Clarence Darrow, chief defense attorney, said.

"Although we have thrown ourselves upon the mercy of the court because I fully believe that nowhere in this broad land could there be gotten together a fair minded and impartial jury to try the case. Some would say they had no opinions, but they would have, most of them subconsciously."

Young Leopold, an authority on ornithology, was said by the attorney to have been willing to plead guilty in the hope of receiving a life sentence when informed he would have scientific apparatus and books if he went to the penitentiary, both youths answered in the affirmative when asked by Judge Caverly if they realized their pleas might result in a death sentence.
