A nation stands in silent grief with President and Mrs. Calvin Coolidge at the bier of their youngest son, Calvin, Jr., whose gallant battle against deadly blood poisoning aroused the admiration of those who love a fighter. The manly little fellow died in Walter Reed Army Hospital in Washington of poisoning which followed infection from a blister he suffered while playing tennis with his brother, John, on the White House courts. He was a great "pal" of his father, who is shown, helping him build a wagon just before Mr. Coolidge became President. The first Summer vacation after his father became ruler of the country Calvin spent on a tobacco farm in Connecticut, earning pocket money. In his last photograph he is pictured in a "seventh inning stretch" in the Washington ball park, only three days before he was stricken with the fatal illness.

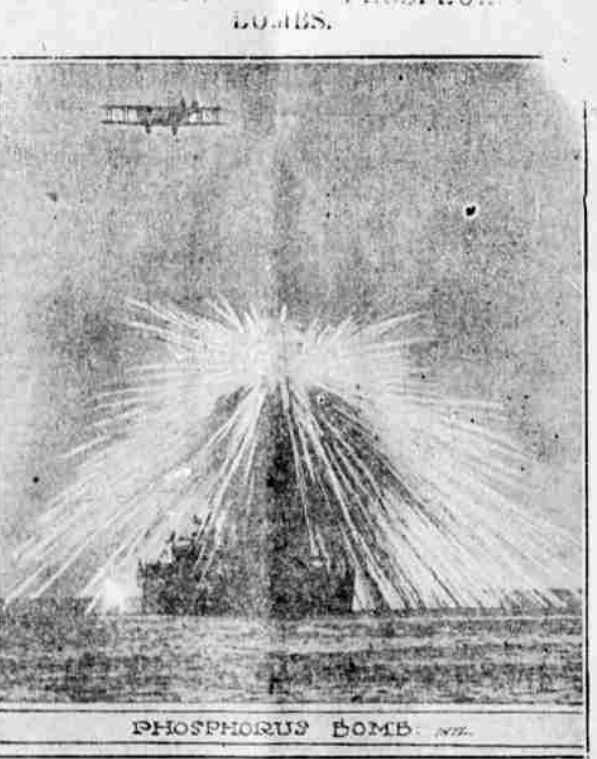

PHOSPHORUS BOMB.

This picture, made months ago, has been kept as a closely guarded secret by the U. S. Army Air Service, and has just been released for publication. When the army airmen bombed old ships that were scrapped under the disarmament treaty they used a new and deadly form of bomb—a 1,900 pound missile loaded with phosphorus, with its devastating effects. Nothing could be more illuminating as a test on the value of the airplane during war than this picture, showing a direct hit on the fire control platform of the old battleship. No one could have lived aboard the vessel.

CLARENCE O. DARLING, New York representative of a Minneapolis manufacturing concern, on trial in White Plains, N. Y., on charges of attempting to murder his wealthy wife by giving her poison pills, has been found insane and sent to Matteawan Asylum for the Criminal Insane. Peter Augustus Jay, American Minister to Rumania, has been recalled for a conference with Secretary Hughes on the Rumanian oil situation. As the United States has protested against the confiscation of American oil properties, the action is regarded as an additional form of protest.
