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## EDDY FOLLOWERS ASK DISMISSAL

(Associated Press London Wire.)  
CONCORD, N. H., July 24.—A petition seeking the removal of John V. Dittmore of Boston as a trustee of the fund created by the late Mary Baker Eddy of this city for "promoting and extending the religion of Christian Science as taught by her," was filed in probate court here yesterday by the five other trustees.  
The petition asserts that Mr. Dittmore's relations with the other trustees "have become unharmonious and unfriendly," and that "lack of agreement and cooperation," among the trustees "has become frequent and apparently permanent."  
The petition says that Mr. Dittmore has "ceased to be a director or even a member of the church named by Mr. Eddy," and that he has "ceased to be a follower of Mrs. Eddy."

## FARM NEWS

### IRRIGATION IS NEEDED

(By B. W. Cooney.)

This year has been set down as one of very short moisture, and from just casual observations it would seem that it had been correctly catalogued.  
Hundreds of farmers have been standing upon the banks of the Clinqua and pondered the reason for millions of gallons of water rolling past their famished crops to the sea. The solution of this problem is irrigation. Many hundreds of acres can be placed under water at reasonable costs of twenty to forty-five dollars per acre. An examination of costs per acre on many large irrigation projects of the west is \$5 to \$15. The farmers of Douglas county are not taking hold of their full opportunities until every acre of good river bottom land is covered by water rights.

The county agent has arranged to hold irrigation meetings early next month at Mr. Geo. W. Burt's ranch in Happy Valley and Mr. Geo. Neumer's ranch at Riddle. Several speakers who know irrigation will be present and discuss these subjects with interested farmers.

## NEW ANAESTHETIC SAID MARVELOUS

(Associated Press London Wire.)  
PARIS, July 24.—A new anaesthetic known as "somnifer," said to be far superior to any hitherto anaesthetic is being used by Dr. Fred of the hospital De La Nouvelle Pitié. In doses of 10 to 15 cubic centimetres it is injected in the veins after previous injections of morphine or scopolamine.  
According to the account given by the French surgical society, the resulting anaesthesia is complete, permitting the longest and most serious operation the patient remains plunged for 24 to 36 hours afterward in a stupor from which, however, he can be aroused from time to time for food. There is no sickness and no ill effects on the liver and kidneys. It is said surgeons believe the new method is likely to become general.

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Ore., July 23.—Housewives of Roseburg are invited to become members of the homemakers' institute for the women of southern Oregon, to be held at Grants Pass, July 28 to August 1.

The meetings will be in the pavilion on the county fair grounds which adjoins the city park and auto camp. This will give those who come from a distance a chance to camp if they wish. Mrs. Jessie D. McComb, state home demonstration leader, will be in charge of the program, and local organizations will co-operate. On Wednesday night, the chamber of commerce and women's club of Grants Pass are to give a picnic dinner to all those who attend, at the city park.

The program will be varied and is to include daily health talks by Dr. Estella Ford Warner, state board of health, and a discussion of clothing problems every day by Miss Esther Belle Cooley, clothing specialist of the extension service. Other speakers from the college are Mrs. Kate W. Jameson, dean of women, Prof. J. L. Fairbanks, head of the art department; Prof. Frederick Herchold, head of the English department; and Prof. Edwin T. Reed, college editor. On Wednesday, July 26, Mrs. C. W. Hayhurst of Portland, formerly president of the Parent Teachers Association and prominent leader in the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs, will talk on the Pastoral Play.

George N. Angell of the Oregon Farmer will have charge of the community singing. Organizations of Grants Pass are also to furnish a daily musical program. One hour each day will be devoted to lectures that are not at all educational in their nature and a recreational specialist will be present to teach the women to play.

Hand-work for home decoration will be in the hands of experts, and will include work in tie-die, basketry, curtains, and perhaps other subjects if the women attending want them.

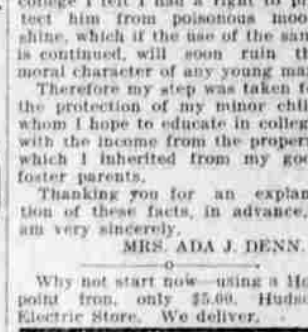
