The thermometer registered 80 degrees, the highest for several days. Eighty degrees is the maximum for today with higher humidity, is expected to relieve the fire situation.

HAVANA, July 25.—The first daylight bank robbery in the history of the Cuban republic police officials believe, occurred here today at noon when six bandits held up the Banco del Comercio and escaped with loot estimated at \$30,000 in currency.

21 Carloads of Sheep Shipped

R. O. Goff will ship another carload of sheep to Portland on Saturday of this week, and this will make twenty-one carloads which have been shipped from Sutherlin during the past several weeks by Mr. Goff and Herman Werner, says the Sutherlin Sun. Of these shipments, 15 carloads were consigned to Portland buyers and 6 to San Francisco. Sheep are bringing a good price this year and the industry is becoming quite profitable to growers.

Order for Fresh Prunes

Frank J. Norton, who recently leased the local packing plant of the Oregon Growers Association, announced yesterday that twenty-five carloads of fresh prunes would be shipped from Sutherlin this season, and that the cash was on hand to pay growers on delivery of the fruit at the packing plant, says the Sutherlin Sun. Mr. Norton secured this large order through his business connections with several large buyers in the east, and he has already made contracts with a number of local growers for their entire crops.

Lecture Will Defray Expenses

Rev. Joseph Knotts will give a lecture at the First M. E. Church for the benefit of the Epworth League tonight. Next Monday a number of the young folks leave for Ashland, Ore., to attend the annual Epworth League institute and the proceeds of the lecture are to help defray the expenses. Rev. Knotts was a missionary teacher in Peru, South America, for five years. He spent two years on the coast and three years in the interior on the eastern slopes of the Andes at an altitude of over 10,000 feet. His lecture will be on "Life in Peru." A small admission will be charged.

Large Orchard Sold

C. A. Lilliburg, of Roseburg, closed a deal Wednesday for the purchase of Mrs. Scadding's large apple orchard, located a short distance east of town, says the Sutherlin Sun. The orchard, which is considered one of the best in Sutherlin Valley, comprises 25 acres of Spitzenberg and Newtown trees, all in full bearing. This is the second orchard which Mr. Lilliburg has purchased here recently, the other being a 20-acre tract just west of the local S. P. depot. It is understood that Mr. Lilliburg will take up his residence in Sutherlin and give his personal attention to these orchards. He is a practical orchardist, and at one time operated extensively in Wenatchee and Hood River.
