pol. Some of the notes were in shorthand and others in writing. "You carried some of these things in your head for a week before reducing them to writing?" Mr. Darrow asked.

"That is correct," said Gortland. The witness said he had never written up into a report any of his conversations with Leopold.

"Have you notes on your first conversation?" he was asked. "No sir."

"On the second one?" "No sir."

After an hour's cross-examination Gortland was temporarily withdrawn from the witness stand and ordered not to converse with anyone in the court room while Jacob Weinstein, general manager of an optical establishment was called by the state to identify the glasses found near the railroad culvert which yielded the "friendly judge" remark.

Gortland said he started about a week after his last interview with the defendant "to write up an account of my whole connection with the case." He produced a document of several typewritten pages.

Gortland said he had "refreshed his memory from these notes right along," but had not consulted them yesterday before taking the stand.

"I went over them Thursday night," he said.

Gortland was asked to explain the actual process by which he refreshed his memory from notes. He took some of them and illustrated.

"The first notation here on this paper is about confessing," he said.

"The next one is about motive," he then showed Mr. Darrow the shorthand, longhand and typewritten accounts he had made under these subjects.

In the same way Gortland pointed out his records on "not guilty defense" and "insanity defense."

Another heading was "sorry for crime." Gortland sorted miscellaneous sheets of papers, scraps of envelopes and searched stenographic note books, seeking his account of this aspect of his talks with Leopold.

Finally he found it on a loose sheet covered with pot-hooks.

"Who was with you when you had your conversation at the Leopold home when you got the spectacle case?" asked Mr. Darrow.

"Mike Leopold was there," said Gortland.

He said this was the only time he had talked with the defendant at the Leopold home and was positive only Michael Leopold took part in the talk.

"Was Nathan there when you found the guns?"

"No sir."

"Did anyone tell you that one was Nathan's and one Mike's?"

"No sir."

"The were in different bur-

causts?"

"Yes."

"Were there two single beds in that room?"

"No, but there were in an adjoining room."

Gortland corrected himself remembering that Nathan was present on another of the sergeant's trips to the home.

Mr. Darrow tested the sergeant's memory as to the minute details of his movements with Leopold. He elicited that the third conversation took place in the state's attorney's office.

"Who else was present?" asked the attorney.

"Nobody but he and I," said Gortland. He pointed out his notes on this and typed accounts on "pages one and two" of his official record.

"Where did you have the conversation about going before a 'friendly judge' so he wouldn't be hanged?" asked Mr. Darrow.

"At that time," said Gortland. "You and he alone?"

"Yes."

Gortland read from his notes: "Leopold said: 'If my folks want me to hang I will go before a jury and they'll surely hang me. If I go before a friendly judge and plead guilty I will get off with life imprisonment. You know I've some ideas that would help the world.'"

Mr. Darrow brought out that this was typed at Gortland's home with no one else present.

"You never gave a copy to any one?"

"No sir."

You talked this over with others?"

"Yes, with newspaper reporters."

"When did you talk with Assistant State's Attorney Savage about it?"

"About the time the conversation happened."

"When to Mr. Crowe?"

"Day before yesterday. I told it to whoever asked me about it," said Gortland.

Mr. Darrow consulted with Mr. Bachrach and Leopold listened intently.

"There is no memorandum on this in any of your official reports?" asked Mr. Darrow of the witness.

"I made a report to the general superintendent of police, on this case but don't remember whether the 'friendly judge' remark was incorporated in that report," said Gortland.

The witness was asked to look for it in that report, but found no mention of it.

There were a dozen single space paragraphs of typewritten matter in the document. While the attorney read it Judge Caverly paced around the enclosure about his seat. Finally Gortland was excused temporarily, Judge Caverly warning him:

"Don't talk with anybody."
