SALEM, July 28.—A sentence of one year in jail and a fine of \$400 against Hugh Kizer for the violation of the law against corner cutting, meted out Saturday by Justice of the Peace Baker sets a new record in sentences for minor traffic violations. BRIDGE AT ONCE

The county court met this morning for a few hours and took up a number of important matters. Representatives of the Gardner Mill company were present and discussed with the court the plans for the Mill Creek bridge. The Gardner Mill company owns the timber rights on Mill Creek and in future years will float large log rafts down the stream, and consequently insisted on a center span of 220 feet. However, in order to get immediate action on the construction of the bridge, and to prevent any delay in the opening of the road, the company has agreed to a 120 foot span, which will greatly reduce the cost of the bridge and will enable the court to advertise the bridge at once.

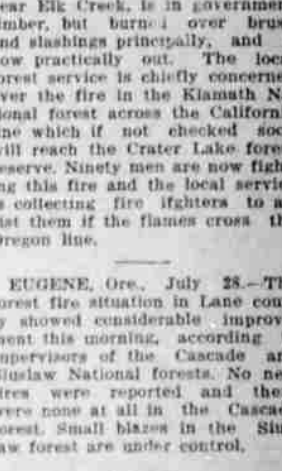
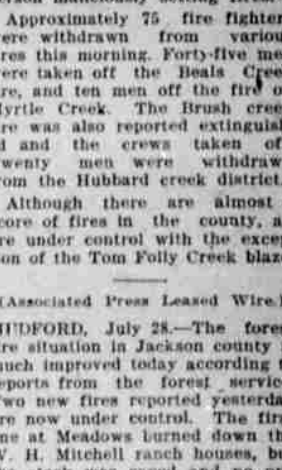
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
