EFFORTS DROPPED TO CONTROL PRUNES

SALEM, July 29.—Decision of the backers of the movement to organize prune locals to eliminate the 70 per cent clause and go out after such signatures as may be secured and organize regardless of the size of the membership, goes away with all idea of securing control of the prune situation in Oregon this year through co-operatives.

Two distinct plans now run through the co-operative ranks, as far as control is concerned. The California association, which is the largest of all prune associations, has reached the viewpoint through its manager that the reason the association has not done better with its prunes is because of unorganized acreage and that there should be fully 20 per cent control to make the association a practically perfect working organization.

On the other hand sentiment is developing here among many leading men interested in the game that such extensive control is unnecessary and that the time for Oregon co-operatives to do is to handle the prunes coming to them as rapidly as possible and get them into the market and clean them up at a profit to the growers, and clean them up early. It is generally admitted that one of the biggest factors which militated against the old Oregon growers was failure to get money to the growers in a reasonable length of time. Growers say what they want and what they need is their money. They declare it is all very well to hold for higher market prices, but that doesn't pay the grocery bills over a period of a year or two and what advances are made are eaten up by picking costs and such expenses.

Those backing the locals, or at least a good percentage of them, are reaching the conclusion that the locals must make themselves a proved success before they can hope to get a 70 per cent sign-up, or even a 40 per cent sign-up.

They believe that if the locals can organize on a small basis, market their prunes rapidly, get the money to the growers, and have a satisfied bunch of growers under contract, that the final control will take care of itself, and that other growers will rush to get in.

The situation as far as co-operatives are concerned is in such a complex state many growers have no idea as to just what it is. So many different propositions have been put up, so many suggestions offered, so many plans outlined, that the man with the prunes is literally up one of his own prune trees, so to speak, and can see nothing but ideas. He doesn't know which limb to grab.

Leaders in the plan to organize the locals and the exchange are beginning to admit that the idea must develop gradually. Consequently they are as long as they get a reasonable number of pruned growers to sign up in the various districts. They admit their job will be to handle what prunes they receive at a fair profit to the grower and a quick turnover. They insist if this is done the future of the exchange and the locals will be assured.

AVIATION EXPERT PREDICTS CHANGE

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 29.—England to Australia by crude oil burning Zeppelins type airships in ten days is a commercial possibility within the next two years, according to Sir Keith Smith, noted Australian aviator. Sir Keith gave out his views of the rapid strides in aviation prior to sailing from here today for Australia as general supervisor for Vickers, Ltd.

"Rapid strides of invention have almost eliminated the dangers of flying," said Sir Keith. "Two large airships for the England-Australia and the Australia-India services being built by Vickers, Ltd., will use crude oil instead of gasoline. They will have a capacity of 100 passengers. The first two built will be used for obtaining necessary data before the actual starting of either service by two other airships."

CONFESSION MADE BY MYSTERY MAN

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) LOS ANGELES, July 29.—Police are investigating the discovery of a note enclosed in a bottle presumably cast up by the sea in which "Waldo Waterhouse" describes himself as the real murderer of Charles A. Chapman here last November the crime for which Jack Ferdinand, George Geragac and John Sears have been sentenced to hang.

Inasmuch as "Waterhouse" adds in a post the note that "you will find me somewhere on the ocean but not on the bottom," the detectives are inclined to regard the missive as an attempt by some friend of the condemned man to delay their execution by producing a confession designed to encourage a worldwide and time-consuming search for new evidence.

THUEMLER TALKS ABOUT GOOD HEALTH

PERMITS FOR NEW HOMES CONTINUE

A number of new building permits have been issued during the past few weeks, adding much to the year's total, which has already set a record for the construction of new residences. The first six months of the year were almost double any preceding like period from the standpoint of the construction of new homes, and from the rate new permits are being granted it appears that there is to be no slacking up in the program. Permits have been issued to C. T. Patterson for a \$3,000 residence at the corner of Pine and Spring streets; W. F. Chapman for a \$14,000 residence in Laurelwood; H. E. Wells, for a \$100 garage on Fullerton street; G. M. Denton for a combination store and dwelling costing \$2,000 on Stephens and Waite; and J. H. Wolford for a \$2,000 residence on South Main street.

TO HAVE DAIRY AT DIAMOND LAKE

A dairy concession at Diamond Lake is to be granted by the forest service in the near future, and a number of applications have already been received. A grass area suitable for pasture of about 100 acres, bordering on the upper end of the lake and located on both sides of Silver creek, has been set aside for this purpose, and suitable land adjacent can be used for headquarters. Only one permit will be issued and it will be upon the following basis:

Charge 50 cents per acre annually for the area under permit plus the regular grazing fee for the cows and season grazing. This now amounts to about 13 cents per head per month.

The area must be enclosed with a type of fence acceptable to the supervisor. It must be neat in appearance and capable of holding
