DOAH MAY ME TO COAST

July 29.—The plan of the Doah May, a Pacific coast steamship, is to sail from Seattle to San Diego, via Fort Worth, 7 days.

San Diego to Pearl Harbor, naval base in Hawaii—3 days.

Maneuvers with the fleet, using the U. S. S. Dakota, a ship especially equipped with a mooring tower for the Shenandoah, and Pearl Harbor as bases—10 days.

Pearl Harbor to Seattle—5 days.

Seattle to San Diego 14 days.

San Diego to Lakehurst, via Fort Worth—7 days.

The Shenandoah has been placed with the Atlantic fleet and during the remainder of the year, will be directed by the commander of that fleet to save for the time needed for the western flight.

In maneuvers with this fleet, several new phases of dirigible flying in connection with naval fleets will be worked out, first of which will be experiments with the U. S. S. Dakota to determine the feasibility and capabilities of a mobile base. A new radio set will also be tested thoroughly.

It is on the assumption that all tests to be made by the Shenandoah will be completed that the Pacific flight is being planned, according to Admiral Eberle.

Mooring masts for the gigantic craft, however, have already been ordered for Seattle and San Diego through practically assuring the flight to be a certainty.

NEW PLANES EXPECTED

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 28.—Seven dual control airplanes for instruction purposes will arrive at Vancouver barracks the latter part of August, according to Oakley G. Kelley, air officer of the 96th United States army division.

The planes will replace three which have been wrecked during the past year, while the additional planes will furnish much needed equipment for the local federal flying field.

MINE CONVENTION WILL BE HELD

SACRAMENTO, Cal., July 29.—(United Press.)—Curiosity over how gold, silver, copper, coal, iron and steel ores and other metals and minerals are dug out of the earth under modern conditions will be satisfied in Sacramento the week of September 29-October 4, when the National Exposition of Mines and Mining Equipment is to be staged in connection with the twenty-seventh annual convention of the American Mining Congress.

The department of mines and mining of the Sacramento Chamber of Commerce has secured a site between the two new capital buildings, facing the state capitol, where the convention session will be held, for the huge tent which will house the exposition.

E. C. Porter, convention manager of the Mining Congress has arrived in Sacramento to take active charge of plans for the exposition which will be the greatest display of mining equipment ever gathered together on the Pacific coast.

Besides mining, there will be exhibits of industrial machinery in kindred lines and a central display of gold nuggets, bars of silver and precious stones totalling \$1,000,000 in value. The machinery on display will represent a value of more than \$750,000.

The exposition will be open to the general public and it is expected to draw to Sacramento many not connected with the mining industry because of its educational value. There will be demonstrations of how miners actually work far underground, how gold is panned from the gravel or creek beds and the United States bureau of mines will stage a daily demonstration of how miners are rescued when a great mine disaster occurs.

Manufacturers throughout the country have become interested in the success of the exposition and already more than half the available exhibit space has been contracted. Mining counties of California and other western states are arranging to place comprehensive displays of their mineral and metal resources.

SOVIET RUSSIA TO BROADCAST RADIO

MOSCOW, July 29.—Soviet Russia will join the United States and other countries in broadcasting news, speeches and entertainment programs to the public and the council of commissars is expected shortly to issue a decree permitting the installation of receiving sets in the home at a moderate license fee.

The government will not only allow radio users to construct their own receiving sets, but will undertake itself to manufacture amateur apparatus for Russia's millions.

There are forty sending stations in Russia, eight of which have a radius of 2,000 miles or more. The government is completing a powerful receiving station at Loubertay the site of the International harvester's plant near Moscow, which will be capable of picking up the principal American stations.

Broadcasting from Russia to the United States will become possible. It is hoped when the government has finished the great Rhyolite station on the outskirts of Moscow, it will have a capacity of 150 kilowatts and an estimated sending radius of 5,000 miles.

At present Moscow listens regularly to Arlington, Annapolis and the powerful Long Island station.

SARDINES PACKED

SAN PEDRO, Cal., July 29.—Sardina pichardus—the high sounding name of the lowly sardine—which is made into a most acceptable viand by preserving in oil, is fastly becoming a major product of the fish and sea-food canneries of San Pedro and Long Beach, Cal., according to a recent survey made by the California Fish and Game Commission.

The sardine pack in this vicinity for the 1924 season amounted to 700,438 pounds, the survey discloses, and represents a considerable increase over previous years. Government experts consider the supply is practically inexhaustible here and even larger packs are anticipated.

San Francisco, Monterey and San Diego are other centers of the sardine packing industry in this state which has an annual value of \$15,000,000, according to the survey.
